The location was between Greenland and Iceland, within the defense waters mentioned by Mr. Roosevelt. The President's speech, Berlin dispatches said, reached official desks here before the broadcast—and his order was immediately obeyed.

CLARK TO SPEAK AT JEROME FAIR

JEROME, Sept. 12 (Special)—Gov. Chase A. Clark has accepted an invitation to appear here the first evening of Jerome county's district fair, it was announced this week. Gov. Clark answered an invitation this week, telling that "he will appear here Sept. 17 at 8 p.m. speaking before the grandstand."

The three-day celebration begins that day and concludes Sept. 19. In cooperation with Jerome county merchants, the public, and 20 young Jerome misses in the country, there will be another big attraction for everyone that first evening when the crowning of a national defense bonds and stamps queen will be a part of the evening's entertainment.

Aid Bond Sale
Arranging the project were members of the Jerome Chamber of Commerce, and the plan was started here to aid in the sale of these government stamps and bonds. Upon the purchase of an amount of merchandise, valued from \$1 up, the purchaser is allowed to cast 100 votes for every dollar spent for his favorite candidate for the queenship, the young county girls being the candidates. The girl receiving the highest number of votes will be the highest number of votes will be crowned Wednesday evening.

It is also planned to close schools Friday afternoon, final day of the fair, in order that all Jerome school children may attend.

At the fair board meeting this week superintendent and other officers made reports. Marvin W. Cole, superintendent of the program, stated that in addition to the world famous horseboe pitching team, he had engaged "Yakins Kid," a strong man to do intricate feats before the afternoon's events each day, and also stated that he plans a number of other attractions of major interest. There will also be the horse pulling contests, between lightweight, middleweight and heavyweight teams every afternoon, Mr. Cole stated.

DEFENSE BOND QUEEN TO BE NAMED IN JEROME CONTEST

Defense Bond Queen
Plans for national defense week program was again discussed for members. It was announced that to further the program in this community and in the east end, Jerome merchants and the public will participate in a project for selection of a national defense bond and stamp queen. She will be chosen by vote, and will be formally crowned Wednesday evening before the grandstand.

For every dollar's worth of merchandise purchased in this county, the merchant will give 100 vote tickets to the purchaser who may

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REDS CLAIM SUCCESS IN LOWER DNIIEPER RIVER AREA

COUNTER DRIVES IN SOUTH RESULT IN NEW VICTORY

MOSCOW, Sept. 12 (U.P.)—Red army forces were reported today to have smashed back across the lower Dnieper river at four points, inflicting heavy casualties on German and Rumanian forces and winning new footholds on the west bank of the stream.

A dispatch to the Red army organ, Red Star, reported that the troops of Marshal Semenov suddenly have recaptured the important Dnieper river island of Khorlisa in the Dnieperopol region and are advancing west, have recaptured the village of Olkha.

Many Casualties
The reports said that both German and Rumanian units were killed in heavy fighting in which they lost many killed and wounded.

The Soviet successes on the lower Dnieper were matched by new achievements on the central front where break counter-attacks were said to have broken up the German 47th tank corps and supporting infantry and artillery units.

79 Tanks Destroyed
In only one of several individual engagements in the Russian attack, it was asserted Russian tanks destroyed 79 German tanks and eight field artillery batteries containing 32 guns. The German tank units, said here this afternoon as final plans were completed for the Idaho presentation policy session, in Twin Falls Saturday.

ECONOMIST RAPS FILM MONOPOLY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (U.P.)—John T. Flynn, economist and columnist, asserted before a senate investigating subcommittee here that the motion picture industry has "suppressed one side of the national debate over war and has created a tremendous engine of propaganda for controlling and intimidating the public."

Flynn, testifying on a resolution for an investigation of alleged war propaganda films and radio programs, charged that eight major companies control the production and distribution of films and are lending their efforts to the interventionist cause.

He quoted Supreme Court Justice Robert H. Jackson, Walter Lippmann, a columnist whom he described as set "all-out interventionist," Frank Capra, film director, and others to the effect that the picture industry is a closely-held monopoly.

Flynn derided the industry's claim, presented by its counsel, Wendell L. Willkie, Republican presidential candidate in 1940, that it has merely depicted Nazism in its own terms.

WENDELL, Sept. 12 (Special) — Wendell high school Trojans have been more or less the door-mat for the stronger Class B athletic teams for the past several years.

But we can advise the coaches of the Class B 11-man schools right now that they had better watch out when the men of Troy take the field this year.

Because Coach Bob Childs, the former Allion and University of Utah football player, has a squad of veterans back on the club—with 32 men reporting for practice.

11 Lettermen Return
Of this group, 11 are lettermen and for a Class B school the Trojans will probably find as hunky a squad as there is in southern Idaho.

While Childs makes no promises—in fact he is strictly silent on the future—the fact still remains that there aren't many football clubs in this area getting ready for the 1941 campaign with 11 lettermen back.

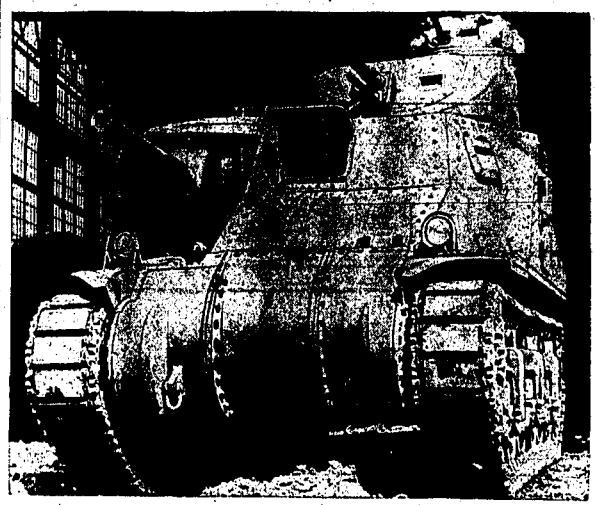
RED TANKS HOLD BACK FIRE UNTIL 50 YARDS AWAY

Leningrad, Sept. 12 (AP)—German reports today said Russian tanks have launched twin counter-attacks across the Volkhov and Luga rivers south of Leningrad and have renewed their central operations.

The heavy counter-attacks reported of offensive operations are advancing "well" despite bad weather and difficulties of terrain.

Strong Attacks
The official DNB news agency told of a strong attack by Russian infantry and tank forces against German positions on the Luga river south of Leningrad.

Five Tanks Daily Roll off Assembly Line in Detroit

DETROIT—Whether the Yanks are coming is still a matter of active debate, but be sure of this: the tanks are coming.

Most newspaper stories don't have a sequel, or the sequel remains unfulfilled. But here is a sequel to the story told last January to Milton Bromer, NEA Service Idaho Evening Times staff correspondent, by Edward J. Hunt, of Chrysler.

Today Hunt stood at one end of the vast five-block-long tank plant, and watched medium 30-ton tanks come slowly clanking and lumbering down three parallel assembly lines.

Schedule Surpassed
Here's how the sequel worked out: The plant has turned out 25-ton tanks. These are better than 30-ton. They are talked of 5,000 men. Six thousand are already working and 200 a day are being hired, looking toward 10,000.

Non-Interventionists Attack FDR's Shoot-on-Sight Policy

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (AP)—Non-interventionists today charged today President Roosevelt's shoot-on-sight speech was tantamount to an unauthorized declaration of war against the axis, but supporters of his foreign policy said it was qualified approval.

Sen. Gerald P. Nye, R., N. D., said the new policy is putting us a whole lot nearer to a shooting war by presidential proclamation. It means conveyance of the law, he said, and the President has been issuing engraved invitations for trouble and when he gets the trouble he becomes blind to experience and to fact.

Chairman Tom Connally, D., Tex., said the Senate foreign relations committee had already passed a bill which would prohibit the President from making any such declaration of war without the consent of Congress.

In another vast new plant with 65,000 feet of floor space Chrysler is also beginning installation of machinery to build the nose and center sections of Martin medium bombers, which will be faster than most of the pursuit ships now being used in Europe.
