# GERMANS CLAIM RING TIGHTENED AROUND LENINGRAD

## COUNTER-DRIVES BY SOVIET DELAY STEADY ADVANCE

By FREDERICK C. OCHSNER-BEHLIN, Sept. 15 (AP)—The high command claimed today that the German ring around Leningrad had been "tightened" and reported other operations on the eastern front were "proceeding successfully."

Acknowledging heavy fighting around Leningrad, the high command said the Russians were hurling repeated tank-led counterattacks at the German lines but claimed all had failed. The fighting was said to be around Leningrad's fortifications.

No Details  
The high command claimed an encirclement of the Soviet second city had been further narrowed, but gave no details.  
"Great oil mine operations on the eastern front are proceeding successfully," the high command said. Informed Nazis hinted the high command might issue a communique detailing big successes on the eastern front within the next few days.

They said today German troops were carrying on an offensive southeast of Leningrad, and were besieging Leningrad and Odessa. They could not confirm, they said, reports that German offensives along the Dnieper river in the Ukraine, or in the Murmansk Arctic sector.

"Bitter Resistance"  
Yesterday's high command communique asserted "after strong German forces have broken into the Leningrad defensive front the narrowing of the ring around the city is being continued without respite despite bitter resistance."

German planes continued to attack fortifications and field positions in the Leningrad area, railroads, troop and supply columns and troop concentrations on the central front and various military positions in the Crimean peninsula.

## SEAMEN MAY TIE UP MORE SHIPS

NEW YORK, Sept. 15 (AP)—Striking AFL seamen threatened today to tie up additional vessels carrying defense materials to and from West Indies ports.

Demanding higher pay bonuses the Seafarers International union already had tied up nine ships in New York, two in Mobile, Ala., and two in New Orleans, La. Seven are owned by the Alcoa line and are used to transport bauxite from the West Indies to the United States for the manufacture of aluminum. ALCOA is a subsidiary of the Aluminum company of America.

John Hawk, secretary of the union, said the strike would spread to "scores" of vessels now at sea unless it is settled quickly. He said President Roosevelt had declared "virtual naval warfare in all war zones" and the union felt its members should wait no longer for adjustments in bonuses.

## Current Expense Tax May Be Cut From Some County Levies

BOISE, Sept. 15 (AP)—A year without tax levies for current operating expenses appeared possible for several Idaho counties today on the basis of an opinion handed down by Attorney General Bert H. Miller.

Miller wrote that boards of county commissioners should take into account "available surpluses" in fixing levies. If they did not, he pointed out, an aggrieved taxpayer could resort to an appeal or other legal action to have his tax notice reduced. It was estimated that 18 Idaho counties had surpluses sufficient to pay their current operating expenses for the year without making an additional levy.

Miller wrote his opinion on request of Kenneth O'Leary, Ada county prosecuting attorney. He asked whether county commissioners must take available surplus into consideration in making the county levy and reduce the levy proportionately. Miller based his opinion on a recent Washington state supreme court decision which held that the levies would have to be reduced, if a surplus was available, to comply with Washington laws. Idaho statutes are almost identical.

In essence, the Washington supreme court held that "since the revenue from sources other than taxation, added to the available surplus, was more than sufficient to meet all the budgeted expenditures of the county for the year 1940 payable out of the current expense fund, the commissioners were not authorized to make any levy for that fund."

## BUBONIC PLAGUE BATTLE SLATED

DENVER, Sept. 15 (AP)—A battle line was drawn today along the continental divide from Mexico to Canada in an effort to keep Bubonic plague from reaching the Mississippi valley and the crowded cities of the east.

The plague has affected no humans so far but eight cases have been found in squirrels and woodchucks and Dr. R. L. Cleeve, secretary of the Colorado board of health, said "the nation is ripe for an epidemic."  
"Once the plague gets among eastern rats, an epidemic is likely," he said.

The barrier will be drawn by extermination of all rats along the continental divide, he said, and state and federal officials have ordered a general extermination campaign. The disease is transmitted between rodents and from rodents to humans by fleas. In humans the disease gets into the bloodstream and affects the glands. 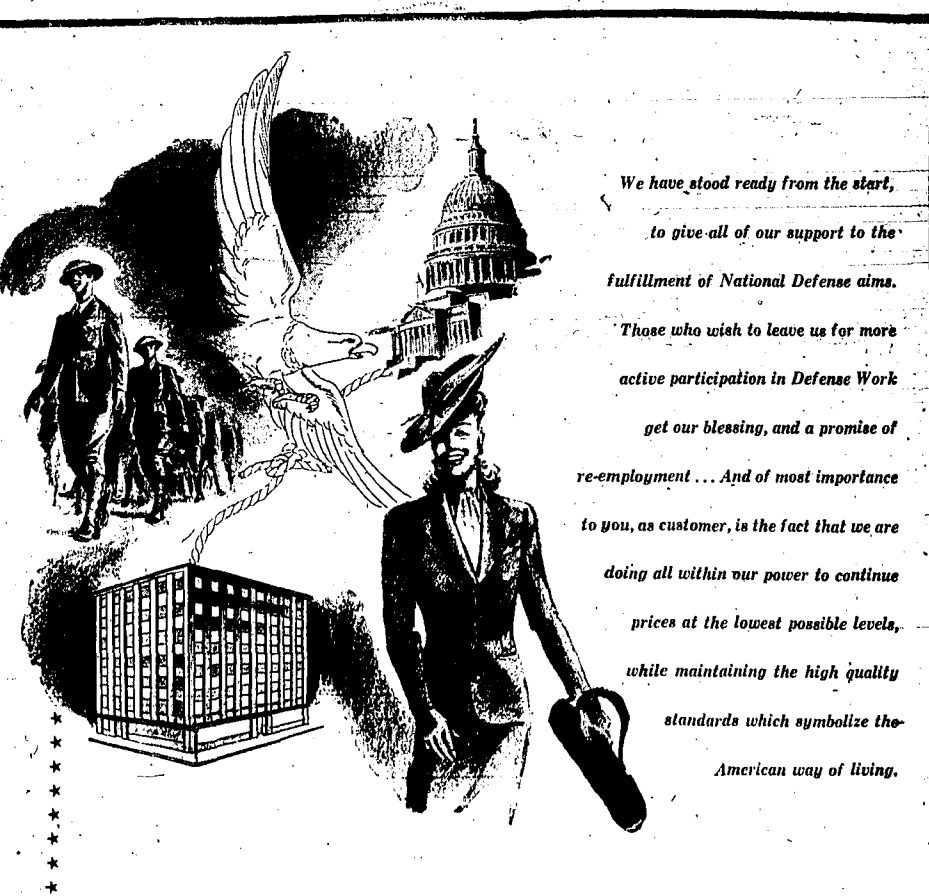

### LDS LAYS PLANS FOR FALL MEET

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 15 (UP)—Executive plan for the 132th semi-annual general conference of the LDS church were in preparation today, with the announcement of Oct. 3-8 as the conference dates. Church officials indicated that a highlight of the meeting would be election of a successor for the late Nelson S. Wells as senior president of the first council of seventy. Levi E. ### ATTORNEY HAILS DEFENSE STAMPS

American people "want to buy defense stamps and bonds now and forever until the threat of Nazism with all its implications is swept from the western hemisphere."

That was the statement made Saturday night by Judge James R. Bothwell, speaking over the local radio station as a part of the drive for sale of defense stamps and bonds. The drive got underway today with practically all local merchants participating in the campaign.

Worth Preserving "A people living under a government whose bill of rights guarantees freedom of religion, freedom of speech, freedom of press, liberty of thought, word and action is worth preserving and defending," Judge Bothwell said.

Turning to a discussion of the present day situation, the speaker said: "It is a sad commentary on our record of national defense to find who possess special talent and ability as Mr. Lindbergh and Senator Wheeler aligned with a movement which can have but one result in this hour of trial, and that is to weaken the morale for national defense of those citizens who may pay heed to their charges against the present administration. Clearly these vehement outbursts of this 'America First' committee originate from personal antagonism against the administration."

Freedom Drop Revoked "But this government is your government and my government and the administration is only incidental. With these destroyed, it matters not what or who the administration may be; it will have only an empty shell to administer."

He concluded by saying that there is "not one person in the Magic Valley who is incapable of purchasing a quantity of defense savings stamps."

### NAZI SPY TELLS ESPIONAGE PLAN

NEW YORK, Sept. 15 (UP)—A confessed Nazi spy testified in federal court today that a high ranking official of the German galleon came here in 1938 to organize an espionage ring for the reich. The witness was Elsa Weustenfeld, middle-aged Yorkville secretary who, with 16 others, has pleaded guilty to spying out United States defense secrets and sending them to Germany.

Miss Weustenfeld, who has been an American citizen for 14 years, was the first member of the spy ring to turn against her erstwhile colleagues, 16 of whom are on trial from the witness stand.

She directly linked Lily Stein, who also has pleaded guilty, and Frederick J. Duquesne, one of the defendants, to the Nazi espionage system which agents of the federal bureau of investigation uncovered in 16 months of counter-espionage.

In 1938, Miss Weustenfeld said, Nikolaus Ritter, head of the galleon in Hamburg, Germany, came to this country with his brother, Hans. At secret meetings in his apartment, the witness said, Ritter laid the groundwork for espionage here.

### WHEELER BLASTS "WAR" MINORITY

HELENA, Mont., Sept. 15 (UP)—Senator B. K. Wheeler, D., Mont., declared in an interview here Tuesday night that the United States is opposed to entering a war "which is not our war."

The isolationist leader and severe critic of President Roosevelt's administration said he repeatedly had challenged interventionists to introduce in a congress a resolution calling for a declaration of war. "But they will not do it because they know sentiment is against it," Wheeler also opposed arming American merchantmen, as has been reported the administration is considering. Such a course, he said, would be an invitation to the belligerent nations to shoot.

Montana's senior senator estimated not more than 20 per cent of the public wants to intervene in the war. "It is a case," he said, "of about 20 per cent of the people asking (the 80 per cent) to see things their way."

HELL KEEP TALKING POLSON, Mont., Sept. 15 (UP)—U. S. Sen. B. K. Wheeler, isolationist leader and administration critic, told an audience here yesterday he would "stop talking only when congress actually declares war."

He charged President Roosevelt was violating the constitution when he ordered American ships to "start shooting."

Wheeler commented somewhat caustically that if Montanans wanted to get into the war, "all they have

## Our Sporadic Weather, Fishing and Hunting Report on Wood River Area

KETCHUM, Sept. 15 (Special)—From all indications there is not a very flattering outlook for anything like an Indian summer this year, although any change can happen in the hills. Thus far, however, the weather has been very variable, with a tendency toward the cold and wet side. During the early fall rain fell practically every day for about 20 days. At a couple of periods it was intensive, the pellets averaging the size of marbles and at some spots in the canyon area fell to a depth of two inches.

Obviously this had the effect of almost eradicating the trees of leaves, while the profusion of wild flowers was entirely wiped out, several fine flower gardens going with the others. In early September there were two or three bright sunny days, but in the meantime several frost-free very heavy on the night of the 11th—added to the general discomfort.

Evening as a rule have been cloudy and cool, while the creeks have been dry for a month. Some of it, of course, was due to sporadic places, especially in the hills. It is understood the game department has under investigation, as there has been much complaint.

Naturally fishing was affected to more or less extent. During the past few days, nevertheless, several fine strings have been caught in Warm Springs creek, Wood river, Trail creek and other nearby streams. In fact, the fishing parties have taken to the wilds over week-end. Most sportsmen are tuning up for the later shooting in the late or autumn, and not a few are antcipating the forth-coming antelope hunt. At this particular time deer are being taken in the hills, and everything indicates there will be substantial increase in every district.
