RED AIR FLEET POUNDS AT GERMAN UKRAINE THRUST

PORT OF ODESSA HOLDS AS NAZIS DRIVE FORWARD

MOSCOW, Sept. 22 (AP)—The Red air fleet, cooperating with army units, hammered furiously at enemy columns to break up German thrusts on the southern front as official sources charged Bulgaria with plotting to provide a base for a Black sea attack on Russian oil fields.

Enemy tanks, motorized units and infantry columns were reported heavily bombed by Russian planes on the southern front as the besieged Black sea port of Odessa radioed it was standing stronger than ever as a bastion far behind the Nazi front lines.

Casualties High
 German losses in their newest Ukraine push were reported in war front dispatches as extremely high, including some 150,000 killed in the battle for Kiev in addition to loss of 40 per cent of effective of some divisions on the northern front before Leningrad. Russian counterattacks were said to be continuing on the central front, where 32 villages and many German positions were recaptured.

Seriousness of the military and naval situation in the Black sea area was stressed by the stern warnings given Bulgaria.

The official Russian news agency dispatch from Istanbul said the Bulgarian government was guilty of "santon provocation," and the Sofia police chief was a Hitler agent.

This disclosure is intended to lend color to the argument in support of the present rulers of Bulgaria, who contrary to the will of the people, have turned the country into a war base for an attack on the Soviet Union by way of the Black sea," the agency said in reference to Bulgarian charges that Communists had been landed by parachute in Bulgaria.

Claim Nazi Oil Shortage
 London dispatches reported King Boris of Bulgaria had conferred with Hitler over the week-end.

In connection with possibility of a German Black sea attempt to attack the Russian oil fields, the newspaper Pravda said Germany was rapidly running short of oil.

Increasing importance seemed to be attached to the strong Russia defense of Odessa, which as likelihood to the port of Tobruk which the British hold behind axis lines in north Africa.


On the 41th day of siege of Odessa, a mass meeting of defenders adopted the motto: "Victory or Death," according to wireless dispatches from the city.

STORM STRIKES IN UTAH SECTORS

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 22 (AP)—Northern Utah today picked up debris left by one of the worst wind storms in years. During the all-night storm, gusts of a velocity as high as 75 miles an hour were reported, but there were no serious injuries or property damage.

The easterly wind was particularly strong in the northern valleys. Authorities reported scores of trees were blown down, utility wires damaged and signs torn from their mountings. Two accidents in which automobiles hit fallen trees or signs were reported.

A small plane parked on an apron at the Salt Lake airport was turned over, thrown against a hangar and badly damaged. Commercial airliners were held for several hours at the airport because of wind and because of storms to the east.

Temperatures rose with the wind and observers believed a threat of frost damage to crops had been temporarily alleviated.

NEW ORLEANS, La.—The worst tropical storm of this year's hurricane season was racing toward the Louisiana coast early today at destructive velocity, with the south Louisiana bayou country in its direct path. Many persons in the lowlands fled.

CARLSBAD, N. M.—With a score of persons missing, rescue workers today searched banks of the Pecos river, littered with debris, from Carlsbad's third flash flood this year.






