### ARMY AIR FORCE TO BE BOOSTED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (UP)—The war department today announced the current 84-combat group program of the army air force will be expanded eventually to provide for 84 combat groups.

The department said the expansion is necessary to meet growing requirements for adequate defense of the United States and "the areas within the western hemisphere vital to that defense."

A number of the new groups will be assigned to overseas departments, officials said. The bulk however, will be assigned to the air force combat command, which is the fighting force of the army air force and includes bombardment, pursuit and reconnaissance aviation.

The new program contemplates an increase in non-commissioned strength of the air forces to more than 400,000 flying cadets and enlisted men by June 30, 1942. Expansion later to 500,000 is possible, the department said.

The 34-group plan provided for an expansion of the air forces to 16,800 officers, 187,000 enlisted men and 15,000 flying cadets. To provide pilots for that program, a training program goal of 20,000 pilots and 100,000 technicians a year was set.

On June 30 of this year the strength of the air forces was 10,697 regular army gnd reserve officers, 8,707 flying cadets, and 129,866 enlisted men.
