

PAPER SALVAGE PLANS DELAYED

Indicating that the state will await further information from Washington before undertaking a drive to salvage waste paper as a defense measure, Gov. Chase Clark, in a column in the Idaho Evening Times, today commented as follows:

"This drive was requested by the defense office in Washington and is pending detailed information. However, the serious turn of events has undoubtedly delayed any such information."

"It is my understanding that this drive was originally intended to be conducted by the Boy Scouts, 20-30 clubs and other civic organizations. However, we have today received additional advice from Major LaGuardia advising us that the bureau of industrial conservation, office of production management, is going to try out in a few states their success in this work and that when these tests are completed, the bureau of industrial conservation will wish to undertake an active salvage program in your state."

When plans for a paper salvage campaign in Idaho were first announced by the governor, the question was raised as to how such an undertaking could be feasible in this section of the state, it being pointed out that the cost of freighting paper out of this area had been shown to be more than the paper is worth.

The governor's explanation today was in response to an inquiry as to what arrangements had been made for shipping the paper to its destination.

Draft Deferment Is Cancelled for Ex-Service Men

Draft deferment previously given to men who had sufficient previous military service was nullified today by order of Gen. M. C. McDonald, state director of selective service.

Area No. 1 board was instructed to "reopen and reactivate" such cases on the local rolls.



"The Japanese garrison succeeded in sinking one light cruiser and one destroyer of the enemy forces by air attack."

Then it added a resumption of the enemy attack and a probable landing attempt was expected.

SOLON SAYS ISLE IN U. S. CONTROL

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 11 (UP)—Wake Island, on which the United States navy is constructing a sea-plane base, was in American hands yesterday, despite Japanese claims of capture, Rep. Compton White, D., Idaho, declared today.

White said his secretary in Washington had told him that "to the best of information" United States marines had captured the tiny island of Japanese attempting to land.

There are about 1,200 workers on the island, employees of the Morrison-Knudsen construction company of Idaho, and White made the inquiry at the request of his constituents' families.

Although marines guard the base, also a stepping-stone to the Orient, the British navy always now had the situation "well in hand," further attacks are anticipated, White said.

HONG KONG—Chinese fog, reported today, was the reason why enemy troops were attacking strongly against the Japanese rear lines in an effort to relieve pressure on Hong Kong. The British defense lines were withdrawn slightly to improved positions but there was no indication of a high assault.

AUSTRALIA—An air raid alarm was sounded in the Port Darwin area.

British Gain Ground
LIBYA—British forces attacked in the Ain el Gassal sector, 40 miles west of Tobruk, in a new attempt to wipe out axis armored strength in north Africa and prevent a retreat to the Derina defense line.

RUSSIA—Red army attacks continued to gain ground in the Yelets sector, southeast of Moscow, where about 100 villages were reported retaken; near Kalinin, where heavy casualties were inflicted on the Germans and in the Volokolamsk region, where the Germans were reported to have wiped out three Russian divisions.

WESTERN FRONT—The royal air force heavily attacked western and northwestern Germany, striking hardest at Cologne, where fires were started and Le Havre also was bombed.

ATLANTIC FRONT—The Berlin-bound British ship Totterdale, carrying 27,000 tons had been sunk.

EARLY TRUCE NEAR AMONG WARRING UNION FACTIONS

LABOR-INDUSTRY CONFERENCE SET FOR NEXT WEEK

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—An early truce among warring labor factions seemed virtually assured today with President Roosevelt's call for a joint labor-industry conference next week to plan for unimpeded war production.

He extended invitations to CIO President Phillip Murray and AFL President William Green to designate representatives of unions affiliated with their organizations to attend.

Both have urged such a conference and were expected to accede quickly.

Mr. Roosevelt also requested the chairman of the commerce department's business advisory council to send 12 representatives of industrial management. He later will appoint a moderator and an associate moderator.

Prompt Acceptance

An indication that industry would promptly accept was given in a Chamber of Commerce announcement that American business on basis of "thousands" of telegrams already received, has pledged its full cooperation in whatever services are demanded for duration of the war.

If the conference is a success, it is expected to forestall enactment of pending anti-strike legislation.

In announcing the President's action last night, the White House said the prime objective would be to reach an agreement obviating the possibility of work stoppages because of labor disputes, and added:

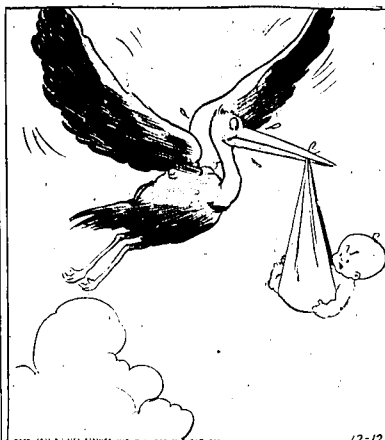
"It is not expected there will be any hesitation on the part of either labor or industry to accept this basic condition of the nation's safety."

Dispute Machinery

The White House suggested that the participants in the conference set up machinery for settlement of disputes, machinery which might include appropriate procedures for adjusting disputes, for mediation, and for resort in defense industries to some tribunal whose decisions will be binding by agreement on all parties.

ADD 10 PER CENT TO LABOR-DALE

MOSCOW, Dec. 12 (Special).—At this stage we can best serve our country by doing our daily tasks plus 10 per cent, President H. C. Dale advised war-stricken University of Idaho students Tuesday.

"Our country is at war. Each one of us must do his part and must do it to the utmost," his statement began. "Against us, the charge, 'Too little and too late,' must not be made."

"First of all, we must keep our heads. Perhaps the most effective weapon thus far employed by the axis powers in the initial stages of all their attacks has been the spreading of confusion. Fifth columnists circulated false rumors in Belgium and Holland and France; they will follow the same tactics in America. Let us be on our guard against wild reports of every character. . . . Do Little More

"We can do all that is expected of us and a little more. This is un-spectacular, but it will get results. We know that one of the secrets of axis success has been the thoroughness of the axis powers. Sometimes we have found that thoroughness amusing; now we are finding it dangerously effective. Let us build up a reputation for American thoroughness, which manifests itself in the sum total of individual thoroughness.

"Students in the ROTC have already enrolled for the type of training best suited to college men and best calculated to give the country the sort of military personnel it needs. When the call for wider national service comes, Idaho students will remember the great traditions of this university and will rally in overwhelming numbers to their country's call.

Make Democracy Work

"Finally, we want to make American democracy work. It will work only if we remember that all native

American citizens whether of German or Italian or Japanese ancestry are American citizens by birth, sharing with all of us the heritage of American democracy. With those who are proved unworthy of this heritage our government will deal promptly and with deserved severity. To all others who like ourselves are Americans by birth we can show the spirit of true Americanism."

(c) In all of the meetings Mr. Rosqvist has insisted that his purpose in Twin Falls is to enforce the "closed shop" upon the employers.

- (3) The "closed shop" is an instrument by which the unions forces the employer to force ALL of his employes to join the union and pay tribute for the privilege of working. We believe this to be un-American.
- (4) We have always been willing to negotiate with any one representing a majority of our employes. This is proven by the fact that we have working agreements with the union in our Pocatello plants.
- (5) The union in Twin Falls has never established its right to negotiate with us for our employes. We repeat the issue is "closed shop"! Not wages and hours. Our wage scales are NOT \$9 per week and compare favorably with surrounding communities. All of these facts are subject to your verification.

TO OUR CUSTOMERS

We thank you for your continued support and tolerance in our present temporary difficulties.

We are operating on a normal basis and aside from a few inconveniences which we will rapidly eliminate, we will continue to give you the same unexcelled laundry service we have always given our customers throughout this community.

If you have any questions as to what the launders are we invite you to call at either of our offices and examine the records and find out for yourself whether we are treating our employes fairly and justly.

We will be guided by your actions as to whether or not Twin Falls is to be operated on the American principle of "open shop" — freedom of employment or "closed shop" with tribute to outside organizers.

We have been informed that our pickets in their exuberance and enthusiasm have made threats or have intimidated some of our customers — we would greatly appreciate hearing from you as to any such threats together with the name of the person making the threat.

TO OUR PICKETS

We recognize your right to join a union and select the same for the purpose of collective bargaining.

We recognize your right to strike and PEACEFULLY picket. Japan may have declared war on us — but we have not declared war on you! We ask you, however, to please refrain from violence, threats or intimidation of our customers, our employes or the public. These acts serve no good purpose for you or the labor union and will only reflect upon your leaders and bring criticism to our community.

We expect to treat you courteously while you are on the picket line and expect you to show the same consideration to us. You are stating that we are unfair to organized labor — which you have a right to state.

We, on the other hand, state we have always been fair to organized labor and feel that we have by this means a right to tell OUR story to the public.



Coast Gets Used to Air-Raid Blackouts, Evacuation

SAN DIEGO AGAIN DARKENED AFTER MYSTERY PLANES

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 12 (AP)—The Pacific coast is getting into stride with the emergency conditions imposed by war in the Pacific. After four nights of alerts and air raid blackouts, citizens have lost their bladders. They are beginning to accept emergency orders as routine—even though inconvenient. Here is a roundup of last night's developments.

San Diego was blacked out at 2:45 a. m. on orders of the air raid warning service. Five minutes later an "alert" was sounded at Los Angeles, indicating possibility of immediate blackout. The all clear siren was given for San Diego an hour later.

Undisputed Plans

The fourth interceptor command said the blackout was ordered because of the presence of unidentified planes off Point Loma, according to San Diego Bay. All aircraft factories in the San Diego area except Consolidated continued during the blackout. Consolidated continued under full light. A spokesman explained the plant had received no blackout order.

The interceptor command said the alert for Los Angeles was given because unidentified planes were in the Los Angeles warning zone.

Radio Stations Off

All radio stations in the Los Angeles area were ordered off the air at 3:15 a. m. The all clear came at 4:10 in Los Angeles.

Farther north, the central California coast centered at Monterey was under blackout orders from 4:15 to 8:14, but radio stations remained on the air. There was an evacuation order for more than 1,000 citizens living in the 40 miles of coast between Santa Cruz and Monterey. The people were escorted from their homes by police to assembly centers of schools and churches. They were permitted to return after an hour—without explanation.

The Pacific northwest had its usual blackout.

WAR DIGEST

Japan denied today had lost five battleships off the Philippine islands and asserted that in a combined naval and military operation it had landed a new force of 10,000 troops in southern Luzon island.

Tokyo asserted the Vichy government had assured Japan of friendly neutrality in the Pacific war.

There were two daylight raids on Manila, but no enemy planes arrived over the city. Axis aliens are being placed in protective custody in Manila. Umpresser Francis McCarthy, on duty at Honolulu, said the U. S. army functioned magnificently in its first test of Pacific warfare, despite suddenness of the assault. He said Fort Snater, one of the army's oldest posts on Oahu island, stood its well in its first baptism of fire.

Shanghai dispatches assert the people of Hangchow, capital of Kiangsu, had started to evacuate the city. The Philippine national assembly approved an emergency powers bill authorizing President Manuel L. Quezon to spend all available unexpended public funds for national defense and civilian protection.

Russia has given no hint as to whether the Soviets plan to offer for its war against Japan. The Soviets and Japan have a mutual non-aggression pact.

University of Brussels, according to a Stockholm dispatch, has been closed and 10 officials arrested, because the university has refused to accept German faculty appointments.

Italian last night bombed Britain's navy base at La Valletta, Malta.

Germany says Hungary has declared war against America, but Washington reports say differently.

In the first Japanese thrust against Russia, Shanghai newspapers quoted Tokyo circles as showing a certain amount of skepticism regarding sincerity of Russia in its neutral attitude toward Japan.

The general feeling at Honolulu, according to word from newspapers there, is that the tide has begun to turn. FBI wanted any Japanese, German or Italian nationals, not to carry camera or firearms.

WAR DEAD

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—The war department today announced names of 87 more men who were killed in action or died of wounds as result of the Japanese air attack on Hawaii last Sunday.

The new list brought to 128 the number of deaths announced by the army as resulting from the attack on Hawaii. Nine officers and 112 enlisted men previously had been reported killed.

MANILA, Dec. 12 (AP)—Out of the recent heavy air action emerged the first American heroes of the war.

First Lieut. Boyd D. Wagner, U. S. army air corps, who carried out the attack on the Japanese air base at Aparri this morning, downing two planes in a violent dog fight and racing down to low levels to attack the Japanese planes on the ground, destroying 12.

Capt. Colin Kelly, Jr., army air force, who scored three direct hits on the battleship Haruna, giving his life in scoring the first major American victory of the war. It was announced that he had been killed in action.

Lieut. C. A. Keller, naval aviator, who spotted the Kongo class battleship northwest of Luzon and held it in sight despite fierce anti-aircraft fire until naval bombers led by Lieut. Commdr. J. V. Peterson came up to press home the attack which put the warship out of action.

SIX ALIENS HELD IN IDAHO JAILS

BOISE, Dec. 12 (AP)—Four German nationals and two Japanese are being held in Idaho jails for the U. S. immigration and naturalization service, it was reported today by a government official who said war-time secrecy would not permit him to be quoted directly.

It was understood the aliens were being held at Boise, where Sheriff Perry, Halley and Rexburg. Sheriff's officers declined any information on the reported round-up and referred reporters to federal bureau of investigation officials.

Kenneth Logan, FBI chief for Montana and Idaho, informed the United Press he was not permitted to identify any aliens arrested or where they were being held.

In Boise, however, Sheriff Don Headrick revealed he was holding Sepp Joseph Bendicker, Austrian skier who was recently named instructor at Payette lakes resort, for immigration authorities.
