Decentralizing Washington... Long before the war emergency came, thoughtful men in Washington and elsewhere were considering plans for decentralizing the federal government's enormous bureaus and establishments on the Potomac.

In so far as the press of time makes it possible, this should be done with an idea of permanent change in mind. The mere fact that the political capital of the country is Washington is no reason whatever for the presence there of many of the establishments whose enormous plant and staff make them like great white-collar factories.

Some 11,000 employes are affected by moves already ordered, with more to come. To New York, St. Louis, Chicago, Pittsburgh, and Philadelphia they go, to do in other places part of the work of the Rural Electrification, Farm Security, Patent Office, National Park Service, Fish and Wild Life Service, Indian Service, Wage-Hour, Naturalization, Employees' Compensation, Securities and Exchange, Railway Retirement, Social Security, and other federal functions.

In the future, decentralization of Washington is indicated by everything that has been learned during the past 10 years. Many world capitals have had to fly before the blast of war—the more highly centralized they were, the harder the task. Improved communication in the future will keep branch offices in far cities in as close touch with the administrative head as is possible today in some of the labyrinthine Washington offices in which visitors and even employees lose their way.

These transfers, forced by war, can also be made to serve the future need of streamlining the federal government.
