## TEXAN DRAFTING BILLS FOR VAST WORKS PROGRAM

### Cash Flows As U.S. Has Merry Time

## WOULD OUST AGENCIES Home Building, CCC and Soil Conservation Listed As Job-Makers

By MACK JOHNSON

**WASHINGTON.** Jan. 1.—**U**rging a vast permanent public works and conservation program, including a potential housing plan, to supplement the present New Deal alphabetical agencies, was yesterday the blaring keynote of the widely scattered celebrations in years. Restaurants, hotels, night clubs and bars were jammed, theaters and liqueur bars like blaring horns of the harvester.

In New York more than 2,500,000 changed hands and on this basis clinking cash registers tallied America's bill of conservancy: \$10,000,000,000—and probably more.

**Geop-Natured Atmosphere.**

The temper of the millions who shopped their way through the streets of the land was lighter this year than for some time in the past. There was little violence and police did not reveal any incidents to detract from their activities in protecting the merrymakers themselves.

There was a cheerful disregard for expense, with people giving up to \$200 in some hotels and restaurants.

Getham in Merry New York celebration was the most extravagant and spectacular in the land as best it lies. More than 300,000 persons took virtue over availability and more than 300,000 others crushed into Times Square for the annual mass reception to January 1. ### Wide Program Taken Effect Today; Funds to Come

**WASHINGTON.** Jan. 1 (UPI)—The federal government today formally began its vast social security program to remove the hazards of old age, unemployment and disability.

The nationwide welfare plan, a brain child of the late Franklin D. Roosevelt, was adopted by the last session of Congress, went into effect with the start of the new congressional session from which some appropriations of \$1,000,000,000 were made available for the out-of-pocket expenses of injured soldiers. Roosevelt's promise that "the peak of appropriation has passed," coupled with the bonus cut, will bring the total of the half of the year and the country will be promised a balanced budget the year after next.

(Continued from Page One) militia on economic security, which called for that the United States should provide \$100,000,000 annually during the next ten years, to maintain minimum standards of living.

### Small Leader

Money for financing the housing program would come from small private lenders, each advancing a thousand dollars, and the loan institutions under federal charter.

The maximum interest rate would be 4½ per cent and the term of the loan would run from 4 to 10 months—in purchasing their homes.

Maverick estimated that more than 100,000 families could be helped through the new program.

Surviving veterans, their dependents, and their children, all of whom would be employed through the housing feature alone, would be able to receive virtually all the money it invests in the program.

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## YEAR WILL BRING OUR DESSERTS

Probably there is no better proof of the fact that man is an incurable optimist than the ancient custom of saying "Happy New Year."

That phrase represents a little more than just a pious hope that things will go well in the next 12 months. It springs from an uneasy realization that we somehow didn't manage to do quite as well with the last 12 as we had hoped to do, and that once a year is by no means too often to take stock of past mistakes and get a new grip on the future.

From the lowly mortal who hopefully swears off cigars to the world statesman who resolves to give his people a slightly better break henceforward, we all come up to the start of a new year with a feeling that it is up to us to take a brace. If a glance at our pasts makes us pessimistic, we can at least become hopeful again by looking forward.

So we make our New Year's resolutions and set out to run one more lap against the old gentleman with the scythe and the whiskers; and if our performance never quite comes up to what we expect of it, we at least edge ourselves forward a little bit—which, in an imperfect and sinful world, is something.

And if we took the time to sit down and think about it, we might discover that after all, is the way the world as a whole makes most of its progress—by slow, painful inches, with many a back-sliding and many a skinned-knee and bruised foot, and not by sudden, spectacular leaps.

The landscape is fairly well cluttered up these days with all kinds of gentlemen who want to lead us up to the millennium day after tomorrow. Some of them talk grandly of the revolution in which every hill shall be made low and every valley shall be exalted; some of them would settle all our troubles by turning the currency inside out, or by deporting all labor organizers, or by instituting a universal system of eugenics offhand, or by having all stock speculators hang—or by putting the affairs of state into the hands of black, brown or stuffed shirts.

We shall hear a good deal of and from all of these people in 1938, for the world is in a mortal bad way, and it may well get worse before it starts to get better. And it might help us to remember that in the long run the world makes its progress much as we ordinary individuals make ours—by slow stages, adding a bit of horse sense here and an extra inch of common decency and kindness there, and not by cure-all panaceas or wild whirlwinds.

For the painful truth is that there isn't any short-cut to blessedness. The new year will bring us just about what we have got coming to us, as individuals and as a world. It won't rise above the levels we set for ourselves. The most we can do is resolve to make it just a little better than the last year. If we do that, and keep at it, we'll be doing all that we can do.

If postmen have found Christmas deliveries a bit easier than usual, credit no doubt belongs to that splendid "Send-a-Dime" mid-senior training.

## GETTING A FIRM FOOTING

Economists of all schools of thought are apparently agreed that we cannot have a lasting revival of business until the capital-goods market begins to flourish once more.

It is, accordingly, highly encouraging to note that the Jones & Laughlin Steel Corporation is going to spend \$40,000,000 in an improvement and expansion program—or, at least, has submitted such a program for approval of its stockholders.

A building program of this kind is not only an indication that steel men see better business ahead. It would be a direct stimulus to the heavy goods industries, a boon to the railroads, to the purveyors of bulky raw materials and to the labor market.

Coming as it does on the heels of a \$140,000,000 program recently announced by U. S. Steel, this action gives us reason to hope that recovery is at last beginning to get under way at the very bottom of the economic pyramid.


