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Centennial Observance Listed By Only-Texas Tribe of Redskins

LIVINGSTON, Tex. (AP)—Texas only tribe of Indians will hold a centennial celebration today, but their interest will be in installation of new leaders at Indian Village.

Cooper Cystine, youthful and respected member of the Alabama tribe, was elected to succeed the late Big Chief Sun-Ke, who died last September.

Fulton Batisse was chosen as third chief, next in authority to the Alabama tribe. Batisse, who in private life is a business man, C. F. Fain, Jr. of Livingston.

Fain was chosen Nikko-Si during the declining months of Sun-Ke's life and has been friend and advisor to Indians for many years.

The once-proud tribe of Indians migrated across the Mississippi river many years before the Texas revolution and settled in east Texas.

The tribe's centennial celebration has authorized erection of two monuments to commemorate the tribe's part in the state's revolution against Mexico.

Erect Marker
A marker will be placed at a point where a short road leading to the village intersects the highway, and the other will be erected on the Alabama-council grounds.

To welcome the rule of their new chief, the Alabama will dance in the costumes of their ancestors by the small band of Indians who came to Texas more than a century ago.

Gov. James V. Alfred has been invited to speak at the all-day celebration, which will be attended by residents from many sections of south and southeast Texas.

Presbyterians of east Texas will dedicate the church at Indian Village in honor of Dr. and Mrs. C. W. Chamber, missionaries who have served there for 35 years.

WPA'S EFFICIENCY BOOMS PROJECTS

BOISE, Dec. 31 (AP)—Idaho's works progress administration will begin 1936 well ahead of schedule on all of 400 projects now in operation because of efficiency being shown by the several thousand workers employed over the state.

J. Leo Hood, state administrator, said today.

Hood described the attitude and interest of men and women actively engaged on projects as "they are doing more than their share in building useful and permanent improvements to the state and they are willing, cheerful citizens who are glad to work for what they receive."

The majority of projects in operation are running ahead in estimates for completion dates and work on every project has been satisfactory, Hood declared. He said the type of work being performed by all relief employables "above standards" of required engineering.

"This indicates that the men and women being employed by WPA projects are capable, resourceful and useful citizens of the highest type," he said. 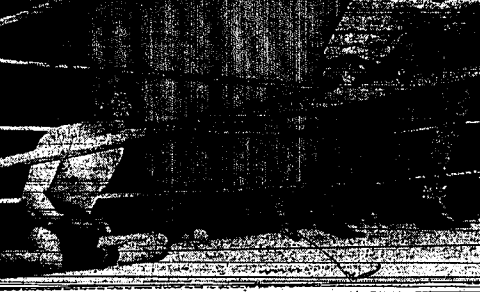
