RAILROADS TOP STOCK TRADING

French Income Taxes Heavier

Higher Taxes

PARIS (UP) — Higher income taxes in France have resulted in lower returns to the government.

This fact is demonstrated in the report of the tax administration on receipts for the year 1934 just issued, which also emphasizes

size once more two facts already sufficiently proved over a course of years — first, that the wage-earners pay the Income tax for the whole nation; second, that Paris pays the Income tax for the whole nation.

All of these facts result from the same cause: the cumbersome and inefficient machinery of the French tax system, which has not yet solved the problem of how to check on its citizens' earnings, except for the simple case of salaried employees, whose earnings are ascertained by their employers.

MODERN VICES

It is this, says anyone conversant with a little ingenuity, to escape paying Income tax and not yet surreptitiously as income tax levied

money, public-spiritedness and honesty tend to succumb to the lure of ever-increasing price-pull on government in avoiding the tax collection system.

No fewer than 1,000,000 taxpayers have figured out in eight years how to avoid paying income taxes in France. The average Frenchman means more than one-third of a taxpayer. In 1928, income taxes were collected from 2,818,000 persons, some 10 per cent of the population were paying. Since the population of France is 42,000,000, this means only 4 per cent pay income tax—although the tax is collected from 10 per cent of the population. In many other countries they would hardly be considered incomes.

The effect of increased taxation in driving taxpayers to try to avoid paying any taxes at all is particularly marked in the case of large and medium incomes. The French income tax on the ordinary pay income (as on the salaries of
