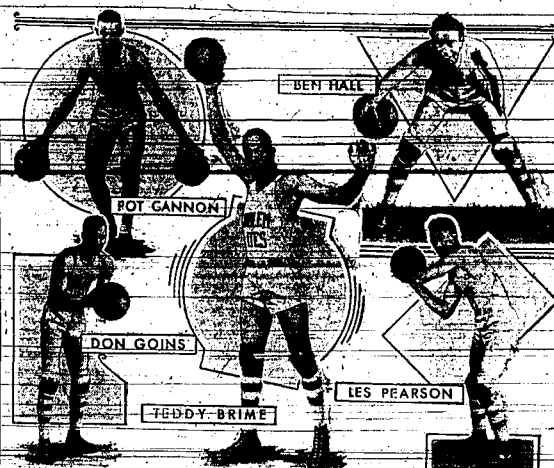

SCREEN'S TREND LEANS TO COLOR

Studio Production Chief Says Stereoscopic Films May Come in 1938

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 15.—The trend toward color in the motion picture industry is being accelerated by the fact that the production chief at Reliance studios today declared that the company is planning to make a color picture in 1938.

A recent survey by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences showed that audiences do not want different, overly-artistic photography, he said, discussing the new color picture.

"They prefer to see what the players look like. All producers will swing back into distinct-camera work."

New Experimentation—The new year will see further experimentation in, and the possible perfection of, stereoscopic and color films and television.

"More than 525 features will be produced, which is an increase of 25 of the usual number made here. More money will be put into production, and that money will show on the screen, for the past year has seen a new picture of the studios; much waste and deadwood have been dropped."

Opportunities, rather than hotch musical comedies, will be generally represented on production schedules. Small-believed titles, he said, are a mistake, however, if the studios crowd them too close together.

"Fact Advertising"—The elimination of time-worn adjectives are on the way," he observed. "At the same time, the industry is making a change in the type of trailers used to advertise forthcoming pictures."

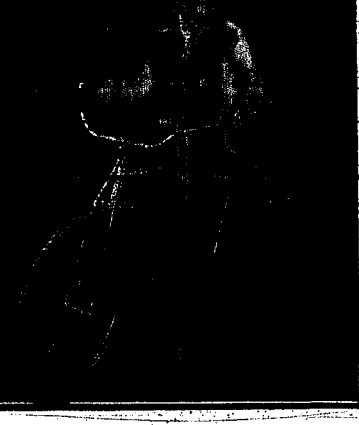
