WOMEN BATTLE OFFICE "SPOILS"

League of Voters Starts On
Campaign for Efficiency
In Government

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — The National League of Women Voters has started a nationwide campaign against the "spoils system" in government, with the slogan "Find the man for the job, not the job for the man." The main objective, according to Mrs. Ralph W. Thayer, St. Louis, director of the campaign, is abolition of political patronage in government.

The League's new slogan declares, "The federal government is using two personnel systems."

"The offending form," Mrs. Thayer said, "is the one which makes it impossible for any employee to get his job. She outlined this procedure, which she applied generally.

The League's party organization, the "offenders," then if his party comes into power, he may get a job.

"Merit" Principle Advocated

In her paper, Mrs. Thayer argued, has sufficient "pull" but gets a job. The result, she believes, is disastrous to public service. Declining this as a principle, she said, the League needs to replace it by the "merit" principle whereby jobs would be open to anyone on competitive basis.

Competitive basis is set for certain classes of positions, as proposed, would require written examinations requiring every two years for others particularly important.

At the present time, the League will sponsor a nationwide broadcast of Democratic and Republican speakers. Two days later, the local chapter will meet at a public hall to discuss the platform. By that time members hope to have 1,000,000 pledge cards signed for presentation at party conventions.

Serving of Liquor to Wisconsin Grid Players Raises Furor

Officials Facing Drastic Shakeup

Regents Undertake Probe Into Actions of Coach and Head Of Athletics

MADISON, Wis., Jan. 31 (UPI)—Evidence that the football team of Wisconsin's Big Ten team which finished at the bottom of the Big Ten conference has been fed liquor by its officials threatened today to become one of the hot news examples cited by the U. S. Senate.

It also threatened a wholesale housecleaning or drastic reorganization of the university-athletic department.

Affidavits on File.
Affidavits charging that Professor W. E. Maxwell, football coach, ordered his players served coffee spiked with brandy or whiskey before major games were reportedly presented in possession of the university.

Dr. Walter E. Maxwell, university athletic director, under questioning by the regents' investigating committee, previously admitted he gave drinks to two of the players.

John Colangelo, football coach-elect, accused Maxwell of giving coffee to the players after games.

Regents Disbanded.

Disbanded with a family investigation which examined the records of the university, was the political appointees and their powers in such matters, began their own inquiry. Spiers is scheduled to report Feb. 6, and the regents are expected to act on what to do about it all by Feb. 14.

Maxwell defended the right of a physician to give the players coffee, while Spiers said the doctor may be compelled to do so.
