## THREAT OF VETO BALKS CONGRESS INFLATION DRIVE

Insiders Sure—Campaign Must Collapse Under F.D.R. and Senate Opposition

CREDIT WIDENING SEEN

Alternate Type Might Achieve Success Under Control of Reserve Board

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4 (UPI)—Political insiders were confident today that the administration's inflation campaign will collapse at this session, either before senate opposition to the "environmental veto." Currency inflation is almost impossible to sustain without President Roosevelt's support.

There is no assurance that an inflation bill can be defeated in the house. The last work week will be a vote to sustain a two-thirds senate majority to override. Practical politicians do not believe the inflationists can raise the votes in the house. Both hands expect currency "jacket" uproot until congress adjourns.

Calls on Morgenthau  
The new federal reserve board which Roosevelt appointed will make a "courtesy call" today to Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr. The occasion offers opportunity to discuss the credit conditions and inflation possibilities. Morgenthau is reported to have discussed the matter in detail with Mr. Roosevelt. The board has large power over potential inflation imposed by congress.

So long as Mr. Roosevelt opposes printing press money, credit inflation is much more likely to be imposed by the banks than by Congress. In this country, credit inflation would involve flow of a vast volume of potential bank credit—no trade credit—into the market and into the currency market but subject to quick and possibly dangerous acceleration.

Caused Cooling Boom  
The inflationary bill of 1935 was eliminated in 1936 was based principally on credit inflation. In that instance there was a notable division of commercial bank credit between the rural and urban areas.

## R. C. BEACH

Death struck suddenly yesterday removing from local business circles one whose name has been associated with Twin Falls ever since it achieved any reputation as a commercial center.

It took R. C. Beach, veteran Idaho business man who had achieved more than a statewide reputation as a merchant in Lewiston and Twin Falls. He directed the operation of the Idaho Department store here through its formative years, built an enduring institution and lived to see his dreams come true.

His passing removes a staunch Idaho citizen who had faith in his adopted state, one who played an important part in its business development, and one who was unwavering in his purposes, his goal and his ambitions.

He was a gentle, modest character whose works were far-reaching. He died in the midst of an active business career—perhaps just as he would have wished.

His death yesterday removes another of those who have known Twin Falls from the first—knew it, and loved it, and through the years helped to make it what it is.

Passing of these pioneer citizens is recorded with a sigh of deep regret and sincere sorrow for their deaths leave vacant places in commercial and business circles as well as in the hearts of those who knew them best.

## NAVY RACE?

After an argument gets about so hot, it is customary for one of the disputing parties to show his good faith by having a little something on the line and suggesting that the other fellow match it if he can.

This stage seems to have been reached in the current international argument over naval armaments.

The conferees met at London and got nowhere at all with great rapidity and dispatch. The Japanese, indeed, finally announced that they were ready to end it a day and go home, which seems to have been about the most sensible action taken by anybody at the entire meeting.

On the heels of that, your old friend Uncle Sam carried the discussion to its logical next stage by adding an extra bit of polish to his fleet.

A naval contract for 114 new bombing planes has just been placed in Washington. These planes, which will cost upward of \$3,600,000 without their engines, are supposed to be the very latest thing in long-distance killing.

They are fast and capable of high altitude flight—they can carry either bombs or torpedoes, and they're expected to be put into service on the new aircraft carriers Yorktown and Enterprise, which are to join the fleet next year.

Having failed to negotiate a new naval agreement, Washington takes the obvious step of saying: "Very well, gentlemen, if we're going to go on building, here's a little starter for you. Go ahead and match these 114 bombing planes if you feel like it."

Although the peace sentiment in this country is probably stronger now than ever before, it is likely that this step will meet with general approval from the American public.

It might be recalled that the one substantial step ever taken toward limitation of naval armaments was an American idea, put through by the American insistence over the strong objections of various other naval powers.

We scraped the ships that would have made us indisputably the world's greatest naval power; we voluntarily gave up our right to fortify our far eastern islands; and for many years we refrained from building up even to the limits which the Washington treaty permitted us.

Our record in the matter of naval armaments, in other words, is fairly clear. If the idea of limitation is to be discarded, the blame is not primarily ours.

And if the naval powers of the world are to build without restraint, Uncle Sam might as well demonstrate that he can play at that game as well as at the other.
