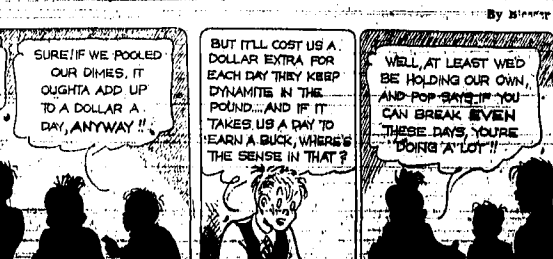

THEATERS MAKE IMPROVEMENTS

New Marquee Lights Will Go On at Orpheum; Other Advances Mapped

Improvements at the Orpheum and Idaho theaters, operated by the International Theaters, of which, Nevill McCord is Twin Falls manager, were announced today. The program being a part of a \$250,000 expenditure being undertaken by the concern in the International division. The company for the Orpheum, said Lake City, controlling Paramount theaters in the Pacific Northwest. Lights will be turned on for the first time tonight at the Orpheum theater, new marquee being erected on the marquee by the Young Sign Co., Ogden.

The installation, represents an outlay of \$5,000 and is the latest in theater signs, aluminum letters being used. Behind these are strips of neon tubing in light green to give the desired effect. On each end of the marquee are three rows of letter channels, and on the front are double arrangements of channels of two each.

Automatic Lights

One hundred feet of light are brought to the front of the theater by a special wire from the alley. The lights will switch on and off automatically.

At the Orpheum, a new type of reflector is being installed in the projection room, an electric device used to supply current. It is stated that the new device will provide a clearer light on the screen.

At the Idaho theater, managed by Butler Dunn, a program of remodeling is to get under way at once. The theater is to be redecorated, restrooms will be refitted to the basement, the front will be widened and a vertical sign installed.

A new canopy will be erected and in the spring a new ventilating system will be installed, it is stated.

LOWER LICENSE BELIEF REFUTED

Barnhart Says Mistaken Idea Causing Fall-Off in 1936 Applications

Mistaken idea that there will be a reduction in motor vehicle license costs this year is reflected in a falling off of applications at the office of J. D. Barnhart, county assessor, that official stated today.

He said that at the annual meeting of assessors in Boise this winter a resolution was adopted recommending to the 1937 session of the state legislature, that a new schedule of fees be put into effect.

Many persons have the impression that the proposed changes might go into effect this year, Barnhart said, pointing out that this would be impossible without legislative action.

He said also that Governor Ross has indicated that there will be no extension at the March 31 date for the use of the old rates.

The assessor urges that motorists secure plates at their earliest convenience to avoid the inevitable rush on April 1 approaches.
