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PROMOTER WITH LOUIS CONTRACT SPURNS OFFER BY GARDEN

JACOBS REFUSES ENTIRE CONTROL

Turns Down Madison Square's Surrender; Calm at Title Bout Obstacles

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 8 (AP)—Madison Square Garden survived to make a street Jacobs.

The many-million dollar house which was built with its plush and elegance and morning-coated executives, has bowed to the man who gets his pants pressed on the rub, and whose offer is any street corner in the feverish flit-fits of the racing world.

Plutocratic Gesture

But Madison Square Garden saved its face by the gesture of the surrender. It gave in, yes, but it gave in on a yacht. Yesterday, somewhere out in the Gulf Stream, on a boat that cost about as much as the Garden lost on boxing last year, three of its high executives asked Michael Jacobs to move into their establishment and take control of all things fighting.

The writer learned of the Phillips, Oppenheim rendezvous, out where the flying flit-fits play, from a source that was a White House correspondent would have to admit as "authoritative." He also learned from a source equally as authoritative, that Jacobs flatly refused the offer and will continue to go on for himself under the banners of the Twentieth Century Club—an organization which came into being when the Jacobson-Gardner club of boxing's greatest manager—Joe Louis.

Called for 50-50

The Garden's offer to Jacobs, which was presented by Stanton Griffith, chairman of the board, and Bernard Glimk, influential stockholder, called for Jacobs and the Garden to split fifty-fifty on all things boxing. The offer, if accepted, was to take effect immediately with the Garden cutting down the million-dollar loan to Schmelzing-Joe Louis right when Jacobs has scheduled for June in New York. One sign of the opinion that this fight will pay better than \$1,000,000.

Jacobs' refusal, we learned, was met with a shrug by the Garden that it would never know Champion—Jim Spadocco, which it had under contract, to fight Jacobs' man, Joe Louis, for the title. Jacobs, it is understood, counted on a fight with the champion, figures which showed that Louis was a greater profit-maker as a challenger than as a champion.

In his five fights under Jacobs, Louis has drawn more than \$1,000,000. In the fight with Schmelzing he drew a million, the Negro boy will have made \$2,000,000 in the occasion in that year.

For it was only last June that Louis met Carners in the first of his five fights under Jacobs.

Here, we learned, pointed out to the Garden head, that if Louis won the title he probably would follow the example set by his predecessors and fight about once a year. As a challenger he has fought six times in the last year—more than \$300,000 more in business had he chosen to accept all engagements.

The Garden offer to Jacobs promised him an unlimited bankroll and absolute control over boxing. It is supposed he already had enough bankroll to corner the fight market, and would rather continue his line with the Garden.

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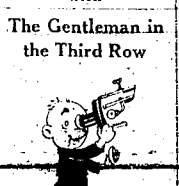

PROJECT PASSES BURLEY COUNCIL

Airport, Hangar Improvement Subject to WFA Approval And Federal Grant

BURLEY, Feb. 8 (Special)—Burley city council has adopted Mayor K. C. Bialow to sign applications for improving the city airport and construction of a new hangar under WFA.

The airport is to be graded and leveled and a hangar 60 feet by 60 feet in size will be constructed. The floor of the hangar will be concrete with a concrete base in front. Eleven boundary lights will be installed, and three-foots diameter drain which dug. Seven hundred feet of cement tile drain will be added. The complete work to cost \$15,125.
