NEW DEAL FINDS COURT DECISION CAMPAIGN BOOST

Verdict Leaves Two of Four Big Experiments Intact to Show Voters

POWER SALE APPROVED

Victory for Administration in Spite of Limited Scope of Test Case

BY LYLE C. WILSON WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 (AP)—Supreme court decision in the Tennessee valley authority case indicated today that the New Deal would have two of its four major experiments intact for display to the voters in the presidential campaign.

Announcing that further legal challenges do not invalidate untested portions of the Roosevelt power policy, the President called the TVA and the gold policy on the stump this year. The agricultural adjustment, the national industrial recovery act were junked by the supreme court.

Power Tests Coming

The administration suffered other court reversals but none of the power tests are being struck. Tests of other laws are to come but in limited scope.

Some uncertainty surrounds the TVA decision on the morning after, but from it emerged at least one. The federal government is proceeding constitutionally in general.

The TVA decision may be marked as a New Deal victory, if for no other reason than that an opposite decision unquestionably would have been a stunning reverse to Mr. Roosevelt.

Proper Function

In approving the Wilson dam transaction, the court said the power was properly produced and could be properly disposed of as incidental to the operation of a dam erected primarily to provide for the national defense or as an aid to navigation.

PICKETS THE UP BIG TIRE PLANT

Major Walkout Threatens at Akron as Workers Are Kept Out

Hauptmann Sticks to Story Under Grilling

Sickness and starvation threatened 200 residents of Atholston, Ia., who have been cut off from all supplies since Feb. 10.

"There's only a half ton of coal in the town," Mayor King reported. "People have been chopping wood for 48 hours to reach for wood for their stoves. In most cases they've been heating only by the fire."

"If we don't get the fuel today there will be more than a dangerous blizzard here."

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Senate Passes Extension Of U. S. Neutrality Bill

White House Gets Measure Aimed to Keep U. S. Out of Foreign Wars

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 (AP)—The senate beat down a revolt of members seeking a permanent neutrality law, this session and completed congressional action today on extension of the temporary act designed to keep the United States out of foreign wars.

The senate joined the house in extending the temporary legislation, expiring Feb. 29, until May 1, 1937. The measure was sent to the White House for President Roosevelt's signature.

Passage came after defeat of amendments offered by Sen. Bennett Champ Clark, D. Mo., for a three-month extension, during which action was set to begin on a permanent plan 31 to 16.

Sen. Homer T. Bone, D. Wash., who introduced the measure, said he would arrive here next week to accept the challenge.

HOFFMAN SPIKES COMEBACK PLANS

Manager of California's Young White Hops Also Wants Suggested Bout

OAKLAND, Calif., Feb. 18 (UP)—Former heavyweight champion Max Baer's vision of a \$25,000 fight with young Phil Brubaker, a double, came, heavy weight within a couple of months and a return to the heavyweight throne in a year, and a half tumbled like a house of cards today.

He then spoke of Hoffman's daughter, who has rocketed to ring fame since he quit College of Pacific and his studies. Hoffman said he is not ready for Max yet.

Hoffman said: "If he fought tonight, he would be guaranteed equal money or at least a 60-40 deal. Waterman had suggested \$10,000 for Brubaker."

Brubaker's next activities will include a rematch with Levinsky or an eastern, Indiana, fight. Hoffman said, recalling that Phil's anger against Levinsky, his first 20-round opponent, was evidence that he isn't ready to meet a former champion yet.

African Frog-Jump Entry Has American Enthusiasts Anxious

By Henry McEldore SUCASOTA, Feb. 18 (UP)—Fear that frog jumping supremacy, long one of America's most popular athletic pastimes, soon will belong to Africa, was felt here today.

When River Nile arrived here a week ago to join the scores of frogs entered in the Olympic contest, he was hailed as the champion of his kind.

They Show 'Em River Nile and his handlers met this abate with admirable restraint. Yesterday they answered it at a semi-private workout at which River Nile, making his first jump after a long lay-off, cleared 12 feet 10 inches, just nine inches short of the world's record established by Peg at a frog derby in Wausau, Wis., last year.

When news of this magnificent leap got around River Nile's price in the coming Olympics was hammered down 25 to 1, making him the shortest price of all the entrants. Those who saw this practice leap believe he will establish a new record on the 21st.

River Nile jumped off ordinary ground this time but at the Olympics he will work from a concrete frog-jumping course. This consists of a perfectly level square of ground 25 feet by 25 feet, with a cool and inviting trough of water at each end. The ground is covered with four white markers the spectators to follow the jump, and also serves as a cushion for the frog's fall. 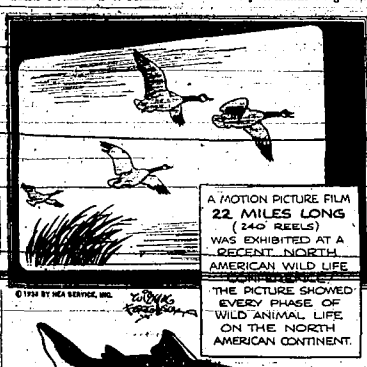
