Publication of Survey, Giving Italian Rights Recognition, Agitates Europe

Document Stresses Beneficial Results for England If Duce Wins War

ROME, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—Publication of a purported secret British report on Ethiopia, recognizing Italy's paramount interest in Ethiopia and suggesting that Italy control over the country might prove beneficial to British territory, stirred diplomatic circles today.

In the event that Italy absorbed Ethiopia, the report said, every effort would be made to give equal treatment for British subjects and the maintenance of the "door policy." It concluded, as quoted:

"It will be necessary, if possible, to seize the opportunity for obtaining recognition of the country (the British Empire) for the British Empire, and the Sudan in order to incorporate in these territories the economic and political (ethnic) and economic activities with these possessions."

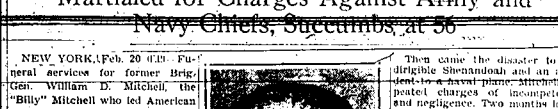

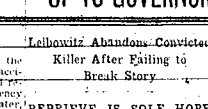

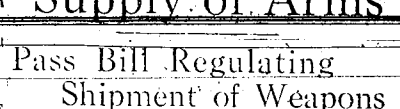

STEEL MELTS IN SUN-RAY DEVICE

Inventor Claims He Can Run
Factories With Machine
for Solar Power

By ALAN McELWAIN
LOS ANGELES (UP)—H. E. McCoy, bald Los Angeles inventor, gingerly held a steel plate in front of a beam of his "concentrated sunlight" and chuckled as the ray rapidly melted a hole through the plate; the molten metal dripping down like melted butter.

"We'll run all our factories with 'sun power' through outfits like this some day," he declared. "Give me the capital to build one right now as big as this one, and I'll make the sun generate enough electricity to light a city of 40,000 population."

McCoy's invention consists of three panels, each holding 20 curved slabs of silvered window glass. They tip up or down and run on a circular track, following the sun's path from east to west. The sun's rays are kept almost constantly on a direct track over 10 feet away.

All the "sunlight" striking 60 square feet of glass is concentrated on the small target, raising the temperature to approximately the terrific heat of the surface of the sun itself.

McCoy says he has melted, among other metals, tungsten carbide, indicating the furnace develops well over 4,000 degrees Fahrenheit.

He is confident the apparatus will be adopted by industry to replace coal and oil for heating factory boilers. He says that for \$25,000 he can build an ore smelting plant—equivalent to present-day smelters costing \$100,000.

McCoy's "sun" is a solar furnace generating plant.

Underwriters are already consulting the inventor on the possibility of using the device for cremation of bodies, their idea being that cremation by sunlight has a certain poetic appeal.

As a test, he placed a two-pound rabbit on the "hot spot." It vanished in smoke after two minutes under the concentrated sunbeam.

YALE EXPLORING ARCTIC CULTURE

Alaskan Studies Only One of
Many Being Carried Out
By Museum

NEW DEAL SEEKS TO EASE SPLITS

Ducks Row in New York and
Eyes 'Epic' Compromise
on Delegates

By LYLE C. WILSON
WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—The New Deal is ducking a party row in New York City and seeking by compromise to avoid another in California as plans are made up for election of delegates to the Democratic national convention.
Unofficial but persuasive word passed around town that the ad-passer, Gov. Alfred E. Smith's election as a New York Tammany delegate to the convention.
Compromise State
Announcement of a compromise California delegate state is expected from the White House this week. Postmaster General James A. Farley has rejected the Emergency in California ultimatum demanding control of the delegation. But Upton Sinclair's EPIC is to have a small representation, the United Press was informed.
The California compromise does not take into account the Townsend plan but which developed this week. Rep. John B. McCreary, D. Calif., has consented to use of his name as a presidential candidate so that a Townsend-plan delegate can be the race for seats at the Democratic convention.

May Be Strategy
New Deal reluctance to battle Tammany and Smith in New York City may or may not reflect subsequent strategy in Massachusetts. Former Gov. Joseph B. Ely, who led the Smith-for-President brigade at the 1932 convention, has announced he will lead an anti-Roosevelt fight in Massachusetts this year. The Massachusetts primary for election of convention delegates is scheduled for the last week of April.
Georgia is another trouble spot. The administration has accepted a challenge from Gov. Eugene Talmer and is maneuvering him toward a primary contest for control of the state convention delegation.

POLITICAL PARADE

By LYLE C. WILSON
WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (U.P.)—Republicans offer the youngest and oldest candidates for President this year. Sen. William E. Borah will be 71 June 20. Gov. Alf M. Landon of Kansas will be 49 on Sept. 9.

Borah's age is a factor in his political future. No man has been nominated for President by either major party after reaching his 70th birthday. William Henry Harrison, who was 67 when elected in 1840, died one month after his inauguration. Age will be one of the arguments used against Borah at Cleveland.

Roosevelt 54
President Roosevelt's 54th birthday was celebrated Jan. 30 in birthday balls throughout the nation. Gov. Eugene Talmer of Georgia, who would like to see Democratic nomination, is 61 years old but doesn't look it. Former Gov. Alfred E. Smith will be 68 when he takes that walk from the Democratic national convention in Philadelphia.

Frank Knox of Chicago and Sen. L. Dickinson, R. Ia., either of whom may get the Republican presidential bid—are 62. Associate Justice Owen J. Roberts of the supreme court is 60. He is one of the darker Republican horses. Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg, R. Mich., is 51.

Have Been Younger
There have been younger nominees than Landon. George R. McClellan was 37 years old when he was nominated in 1861 and Breckinridge was named for the presidency in 1860 at 39. More suspicious for Landon, however, is the record of Theodore Roosevelt. He was 42, the youngest President, when he succeeded McKinley in 1901 and he was only 46 when inaugurated for a full term in 1905. Gen. U. S. Grant was 46 when he took office for his first term and there have been four other Presidents under 50 when they were sworn in March 4: Cleveland, 47; Pierce, 45; Polk, and Garfield, 49.

Bryan Youngest
The youngest nominee, of course, was William Jennings Bryan whose "Cross of Gold" speech won him the Democratic nomination in his 36th year.

If Borah is nominated in Chicago it may suggest to the superstitious that the rule of three still is in vogue. His liberal Republicanism challenge to the regular party leadership is the third in modern political history. Theodore Roosevelt tried first in 1912. When the Republicans renominated Taft the third party was organized to support Roosevelt's Progressive candidacy. Taft and Roosevelt lost to Woodrow Wilson. Twelve years later the Robert M. La Follette led the G.O.P., had himself nominated for President on a third platform and lost to Calvin Coolidge. John W. Davis of West Virginia—now of New York—was the Democratic nominee last year. Now comes Borah after 34 more years. Borah was Theodore Roosevelt's first manager at the Chicago convention which nominated Taft. But he refused to lead the party, preferring a sideline seat in the 1912 campaign. Later he was occupied in 1932 when Herbert C. Hoover sought reelection.

Franco accepted the provisional presidency last night, after an airplane flight from Buenos Aires. He announced the following cabinet: Interior, Dr. Gomez Freire Battey; foreign affairs, Dr. Juan Stefanel; provision; war and navy minister, Stefanel; justice and education, Dr. Anselmo Jover Perilla; agriculture, Bernardino Caballero; finance, Dr. Luis Freire Esteves.

CHINA EMERGING FROM TUTELAGE

Plans for Constitution Press Move for Returning Power To People

By ROBERT H. BERKOV

SHANGHAI, Jan. 21.—A world in which the trend is toward greater concentration of power in the hands of governments, China steadily proceeds with a plan to return more and more political power to the people.

Carefully following the mandate of Dr. Sun Yat-sen, father of the Chinese Revolution, as expressed in his famous "Three Principles of the People," the nation is emerging from its period of political tutelage. In May of this year, China's constitution is to be put into its permanent form along the lines of western democracy and it will be adopted when the National People's Congress meets at Nanking on Nov. 12, 1936.

Until then every effort is being made to promote self-government in every district under the direction of Gov. Chiang Kai-shek, former ambassador to Japan and recently appointed Minister of the Interior.

Two Principles Outlined

On June 1, 1931, a provisional constitution for the political tutelage period was promulgated at Nanking. It provided for rebuilding the Republic of China on the basis of two principles: First, Dr. Sun Yat-sen's "Three Principles": nationalism, democracy and livelihood of the people; second, administration of government by five organs known as the Executive Yuan, the Legislative Yuan, the Judicial Yuan, the Examination Yuan, and the Control Yuan.

The Executive Yuan is the highest executive organ and has direct supervision and general direction over the various executive, financial and administrative matters. The Legislative Yuan is the highest legislative organ and has the power to decide upon general legislation and to examine and approve or disapprove of the budgetary questions, declaration of war, negotiations for peace and other important international affairs. The Judicial Yuan is the highest judicial organ. The Examination Yuan conducts the examinations for what amounts to China's civil service. The Control Yuan is the highest supervisory organ and has the power of impeachment and auditing.

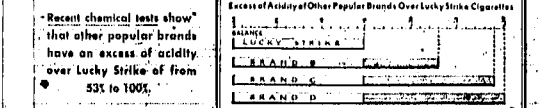
