MURTAUGH F. F. A. WINS MURTAUGH, March 11 (Special)—Index of prices paid to Idaho farmers for their agricultural commodities stood at 103 per cent of the average of 1914-15, or one per cent higher than the Jan. 25 average, according to Richard C. Stone, U. S. statistician. Prices received for all livestock and live-stock products advanced five per cent. Poultry and poultry products rose 124 per cent but the index of prices received for all crops declined one per cent.

Grain prices declined about four per cent between Jan. 15 and Feb. 15, fruit and vegetable prices held about steady, and prices for other crops advanced about three per cent.

Poultry and poultry products were the only livestock commodities suffering declines during the period.

RESERVOIR NEAR 1,000,000-MARK

American Falls reservoir lacks only 10,000 acre feet of having a million acre feet of water in storage, according to a summary received today by the Twin Falls Canal Co. from Lynn S. Crandall, watermaster of district 38, Idaho Falls.

On the same date a year ago the reservoir held only 614,069 acre feet. Jackson lake has 247,170 acre feet in storage, compared with 141,780 acre feet on March 7, 1935, the report discloses.
