## LOOMS AS NEXT Foe For BARNEY

Whirlwind Puerto Rican Gives Sound Thrashing to Coast Mexican Fighter

NEW YORK, March 24 (AP)—Temporarily balked at getting a fight with the lightweight champion, the Puerto Rican, current season of New York's boxing scene today was likely challenger for Barney Ross' welterweight championship in the first big match of the outdoor season.

County Group Proposes 6,200  
Acres Be Put Into Hay  
and Pasture

Shift of 6,200 acres of cultivated crops to an equal number of acres of hay and pasture land is among the recommendations of the Twin Falls County Agricultural planning board, additional reports of its actions disclose.

The utility "the fact" crops the board urged more winter feeding of sheep and cattle, as well as hogs.

On account of the anticipated increased irrigation supply for both the Salmon River and Twin Falls tracts, it is estimated that the cultivated acreage in the county this season will approximate that of 1935, when 415,000 acres were farmed. This is an approximate increase of 15,000 acres over last year, and it is predicted by the board that this will be taken up this season with sugar beets.

**6,200-Acre Cut**

It is the estimate of the board that bean acreage should be reduced 6,200 acres; from an estimated 62,000 acres to 55,800 acres. In 1934, the last year when a census was taken, the bean acreage totaled 74,000.

It is suggested that the board should be utilized by the planting of 2,000 additional acres of wheat, a nurse crop to provide legumes, 2,000 acres as pasture and 2,000 acres of alfalfa hay. In 1935, there were 40,000 acres of such hay, and in 1934, 48,000 acres. This year's estimate is 50,000, and the recommendation is that the number this season be 15,000 acres.
