Best Quarter in Five Years Anticipated by South's Business Chiefs

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—The three-month period now beginning will be the best that basic southern industries have experienced in five years, according to all indications. Coal operators expect the best spring and summer business they have had in 10 years.

The outlook for "industries" is accordingly cheerful, said delegates to the southeast shippers' advisory board which met here today in Birmingham.

The board, which is the only body in conjunction with the car-service division of the Association of American Railroads, has industries in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, South Carolina and Tennessee and Virginia are anticipating increases averaging 10 percent during the second quarter of 1936 as compared with the same period last year, reports disclosed.

Albert G. Burns Says "Nuts" Will Pull America Out of Depression

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Inventors' head Albert G. Burns, cyclone mouse electricity trap, are the ones who will pull America out of the slump.

Burns spoke as president of the National Inventors' congress, his concluding address before Congress here and feels responsible for getting inventors and commercialized to the business world. Inventors themselves don't know much about such problems, he said.

"Big, bespectacled and enthusiastic as a physical culture exponent addressing school children, Burns took up and demonstrated an original apparatus of his own, which he looked admiringly around his office that was littered with a variety of gadgets and models. Apparently everything from a non-leaking cooking pan spoon to a steam engine was in his hands.

"I'm for Americans," Burns told "persons willing to spend their lifetime developing contributions for the benefit of the human family are just plain 'nuts'."

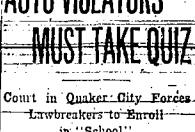

SUGAR BEETS A GOOD BET FOR 1936

With the best participant contract we have ever had—and the price of sugar in advance of other commodities such as beans, wheat, and potatoes, beets look like a good bet to me this season.

Sugar beets, to my mind, are one of our best paying crops at this time. There was a time when the sugar beet crop was considered hazardous to raise; but since we are able to get all the resistant seed we want, I am confident that at the end of this season we will find beets one of our best cash crops.

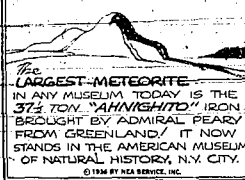

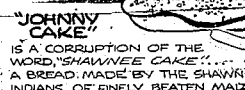
