One-act plays will be presented tomorrow at 8 p. m. in the high school auditorium for class A schools. Boise, Kimberly, Montpelier, Rigby, Shoshone, and Twin Falls will compete Saturday at 1:30 p. m. for the class B judging.

Debate contests will be held tomorrow at 11:30 a. m. and Saturday at 1:30 p. m. with Caldwell, Elgin and Shoshone entering two teams. Miss Martha Farrar and Gerald Walker, in charge of the declamation and debate, announced that the events are open to the public. Small admission charges will be made to defray expenses.

PEPIL TO FRISCO

Strike in Marin County may Curtail One of City's Main Sources

SAN RAFAEL, Calif., April 9.—A walkout of Marin County dairy workers, which would cut off the city's main source of milk supply, was reported today by county authorities.

Number of milkers on strike was not available. The workers were said to be demanding higher wages and better recognition of their union.

Recurring violence which accompanied a similar dairy strike a number of months ago, District Attorney Albert E. Tamm, said, "The workers are not ready for emergency duty."

Strikers reportedly laid down an ultimatum that no milk would be moved from the county until their demands are met.

COUNTY HISTORY TO BE RECORDED

Documents Will Be Placed on
File in Federal Survey
of Idaho

LOCATELLO (Special)—Historical documents of Twin Falls county will be recorded by the new historical record survey project according to Professor Charles F. Laird, chairman of historical museum committee, University of Idaho, southern branch, who is directing the work for eastern Idaho. The representative of the historical records survey in Twin Falls county will be Mrs. Naomi Martin. The survey is being conducted as a subsidiary to the Idaho writers project under Vardis Fisher. Five trained field workers will visit communities in eastern Idaho to record and describe historical documents in public and private hands. Their findings will become part of a national catalogue for historical material, and will also be of great value in writing state and local histories.

Survey Important—The study of Idaho history has been greatly handicapped for want of such a survey, according to Professor Laird. Very few Idaho citizens have histories of any kind, and Professor Laird asserts that the first adequate county history is yet to be written. The new project will presumably fill this want.

Field workers on the project will visit Twin Falls county court house, and city halls in the larger towns. They will also endeavor to locate the important collections in private hands, the records of pioneer business houses, early mining companies, ranches and the like. Workers on the project will solicit the cooperation of local people in "finding" important documents. Only with the cooperation of public-spirited individuals, Professor Laird said, can the project be completed.

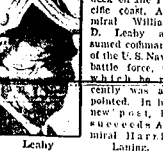
Conservation Council Changes

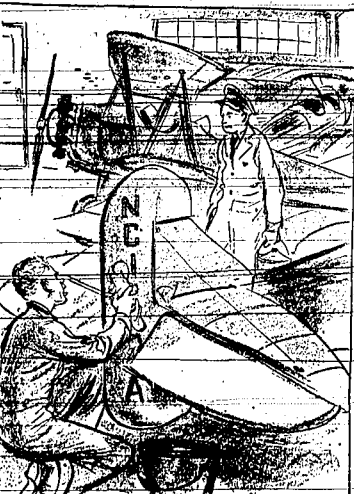
