Head of Merchandising School
Fires Home-Made Device
In Parked Auto

TWO OTHERS BADLY HURT

Professor Appeared Depressed,
Then Shouted: "I'm Going
to Kill You All!"

LOS ANGELES, April 15 (U.P.)—White-haired Dr. William D. Morley, dean of the school of merchandising at the University of Southern California, and his wife were killed last night when a home-made bomb, which police believed he fired from a parked automobile.

Two other occupants of the vehicle were seriously injured but are expected to recover. They are Harley McCoy, business associate of the educator, and Eleanor Thoms, a friend.

The explosion took place shortly before midnight as the car stood parked in a "dead end" street near fashionable Hillcrest country club, several miles outside the city limits.

Both Mortally
The bodies of Dr. Morley and his wife, Dorothy, aged 48, were badly mutilated. Dr. Morley was apparently killed by the instant death. Dr. Morley was 50 years old.

McCoy was not able to give a coherent account of events leading to the bombing until several hours after he was recovered from the shock and received emergency treatment at a hospital.

Dean Fumed Him
Under questioning of Detective Lieutenant Lefroy, McCoy gaped out that the professor, who had been drinking, fumed him and his wife for a time.

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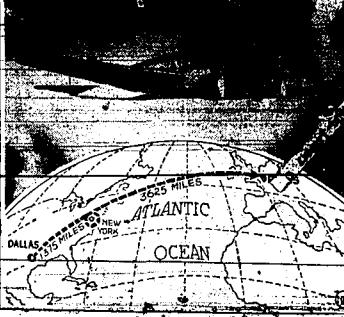

WHEAT FORECAST DROPS IN IDAHO

Winter Crop Indicated at Six Per Cent Below Last Year: Condition Low

BOISE, April 16 (Special).—The 1936 winter wheat crop in Idaho is indicated to be about 8,450,000 bushels, according to information available on April 1. This prediction, if realized, will be about 6 per cent smaller than the 1935 crop and about 30 per cent smaller than the average of production in the five-year period 1928 through 1932. The crop actually harvested, however, may turn out to be larger or smaller than now indicated, depending upon weather conditions and other factors between now and harvest time. Condition of the crop on April 1 was below average, being reported at 78 per cent. This low condition is attributed mainly to the effects of a severe drought during the winter and spring months. The winter crop is expected to be greater than usual in both

northern Idaho and the dry land wheat sections of eastern Idaho. Much of the seed which failed to germinate last fall in northern Idaho is reported to have rotted, while the early fall freeze is reported to have resulted in considerable injury to eastern Idaho seedlings which were just starting growth.

The combined stocks of wheat, oats and corn—amounting on farms April 1 this year, totaling about 2,500,000 bushels, are reported to be about average, but considerably greater than at this time last year. Some stocks of wheat are less than average, but corn holdings of oats and corn are materially greater than average.

SOVIET APPROVAL PLACED ON LOVE

Russia Finally Grants Formal
Approval to Romance
in Marriages

scenario language, "Love has come to the Soviet Union."

The emotion heretofore considered not quite in keeping with Communist principles, now is declared to be the basis of proletarian marriage. Widely publicized, the cause of love has received moral support in a campaign to scorn divorce and extra-marital relations, and legal backing in a wide campaign against alimony jumpers and former husbands who deny support of their children.

The campaign for a high birth rate, it is reported, soon will result in a decree prohibiting abortions. Already this phase of Soviet medical practice has been limited.

Alimony Cases Increase
An official report gave the number of alimony cases reaching the courts during 1935 as 200,000, which "tended to increase."

We will revise the marriage laws, and suggest:
"1.—To increase the amount of alimony."
"2.—To punish severely, not to three years imprisonment, those who refuse to pay alimony."

"3.—To enter in his passport (every citizen must have a passport) the fact that a husband has brought to court because he refused to pay alimony."

Stress Love
Marina's report, said from the legal aspects of alimony and divorce, stressed the new concept of love in marriage and the seriousness with which Soviet couples now enter upon that relationship.

"In a period when new culture is being created," he said, "the question of family and marriage acquires an especial significance."
"Speaking of marriage, Engels said in his last phase in the family life will set in only when there will come a new generation of men who have never brought women love on material basis, and a new generation of women who have never sold their love on material grounds."

New Generation
"We have this new generation of men and women. They build their married life on the basis of a deep mutual feeling."

"In a bourgeois state the woman is first of all a source of cheap and obedient labor. It is easier to keep women than men under subordination. The woman having children cannot participate in social or political life, and her field of vision is limited."

"What has changed in our country is the condition that enables us to build the family on a new basis. It is possible to co-ordinate happy motherhood with creative work. We have conditions which help the woman to master knowledge and culture. We need many children, not for conquest, but to build a new society."

Cities Medical Progress
Citing statistics to show the development of culture among women and the advantages of painless childbirth, creches and economic considerations for the mother, neither the procreator continued:

"Love is the basis upon which proletarian marriage is built. Where there is marriage, submission and obedience which characterize the bourgeois marriage do not exist in our country. When a husband and wife find that there is something wrong in their life and think that it is better for them to part, they part."

"Still, there exists, however, a petty bourgeois tendency to interfere with the family as a unit. Everything is permitted, which involves irresponsibility, especially in marriage."

Anti Law Revision
"There still exists in our country people who (feeling) lived of married life make the necessary arrangements and desert their families. Apparently feeling sure that the state will care for their children. They commit a crime against Soviet law, and although we have been indulgent to them, we will revise the law."

Alimony, as construed in Soviet law, is paid for support of women only. As women are considered to be economically independent, a divorced wife is not entitled to support. It is at the time of divorce, either a husband or wife is entitled to six months support by the other party.

CONGRESS DRAWN FROM 11 NATIONS

Foreign Countries Are Native Lands For More Than 20 U. S. Lawmakers

WASHINGTON (UPI)—At least 20 European countries contributed to their native-born congressmen to the membership of the present congress, a United Press survey disclosed today.

Birth records of members show that more than 20 came here from abroad and that virtually every section of Europe produced one or more.

Germany, Italy, Great Britain, Ireland and Russia were the birthplaces of at least two members each. Spain, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Sweden, Denmark, and Scotland produced one member each. Poland, Norway, Finland and Switzerland are believed to have been birthplaces of others, although the official records do not show it. At least two members in their official biographies made special mention of the fact that they came of French blood, although they were born in the United States.

YEAR'S SNOW AT HAILEY BOOSTED

Substantial Increase Compared With Last Year Reported by Supervisor

HAILEY, April 15 (Special)—In the final snow report Frank S. Moore, Hailey, forest supervisor, indicates that there was a substantial snow fall increase at Hailey and Soldier creek as compared with last year. From Oct. 1, 1935, 113.50 inches of snow fell at Hailey, while a year ago only 81 inches had fallen. The average for 1936 was 111.1 inches. Total snowfall from Oct. 1 of Soldier creek was 238 inches as compared with 128 inches for last year.
