### PROBERS ADVISE U.S. OWNERSHIP OF ARMS PLANTS

Report of Senate Committee Denounces Munitions Manufacturers

OFFERS CAUSTIC REBUKE

Members Split on Question of Government Taking Over Armament Making

By RONALD G. VAN TINE, WASHINGTON, April 29 (U.P.)—The senate munitions committee today denounced America's private arms industry and asked the government to "take into its own hands the multi-million dollar business of producing guns, warships and ammunition for the United States army and navy."

The recommendation was made to the senate by a majority of the committee in the first of several reports, entitled "The Munitions Industry."

The committee, headed by Senator Charles McNary, of Oregon, also accused American munitions manufacturers of "corrupt methods of sales and advertising."

The committee also recommended that the government should "take over the production of munitions for the army and navy."

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## ominous Hint Heightens Gravity Of Ethiopian Crisis as Italy's Armies Move Toward Last Goal

FRANTIC DEFENSE PLANS PREPARED AT ADDIS ABABA

Ethiopia Will Wreck Bridges and Roads in Effort to Halt Italians

By BEN AMES, ADDIS ABABA, April 29 (U.P.)—The government rushed stores of gun cotton out along the road to Dessale today, planning to blow up bridges over canals and to block mountain roads in the path of the Italian advance.

Natives, dazed and panic stricken, began to evacuate the city, believing the arrival of Italian troops was imminent.

Motor lorries roared unceasingly through the city. Normal life was suspended.

Trains from Dessale were crowded with motor trucks from the front, and tattered flying fugitives from the Ethiopian army.

Foreigners seek shelter. Forbearers of many nationalities fled the city, seeking refuge in the Italian zone.

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Troops Push Steadily on For Capital

Italian Armies Press Ahead to Menace Addis Ababa

By BEN AMES, ADDIS ABABA, April 29 (U.P.)—Italian armies pressed forward in half a dozen columns in Ethiopia today to crash the last resistance of Emperor Haile Selassie's warriors and end the war.

Three columns moved from the north toward Addis Ababa and the vital Addis Ababa-Djibouti railway. As many moved northward through southeastern Ethiopia toward the Harar-Jijiga area, last defended portion of the country, and the railway farther east.

As they advanced an enthusiastic Italian populace prepared to make history tomorrow, on the occasion of Rome's 2688th birthday, and celebrate the victories at Addis Ababa and diplomatically at the League of Nations capital.

Premier Benito Mussolini showed every sign of determination to make of his victory over Ethiopia a turning point that would make Italy a first class colonial power.

Italy's first class colonial power would take full place in Europe as a key nation.

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League Hears Eden Voice Strong Stand

Rome Seeks Possession As Price of Armistice

By United Press, GENOVA, April 29 (U.P.)—The gravity of the European crisis over Ethiopia was emphasized at Geneva today when Britain informed the league that it might consider separate action against Italy and also Italy demanded possession of Ethiopia as the price of an armistice and Ethiopia appealed for new penalties against Italy.

The Italian forces in Ethiopia were threatening Addis Ababa from both north and south and the population was evacuating the capital in panic.

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## AIR CRASH KILLS RAIL MAN, WIFE

Frederick H. Harvey, Officer of Santa Fe and Chain of Restaurants, Dies

DUNLOP, Pa., April 20 (AP)—A flaming glimmer of a smoking red and blue biplane by a mountain school girl offered the only discoverable clue today to the cause of the airplane crash yesterday that killed Frederick H. Harvey, vice president of a national restaurant chain, and of the Santa Fe railroad, and his wife.

The plane, Harvey's own in which he was taking his young wife home to Kansas City from New York after her return from a visit to London, was caught in a storm and was destroyed after breaking through several trees and five 20,000-volt wires.

Bodies of both victims were burned beyond recognition. Investigation by county and state authorities revealed only one person who saw the plane in the last minutes before the crash. She was Pauline Tawzely, 16, of Kraya, Pa., a short distance from Dunlop.

**Saw Smoke**

"I saw it flying low over me," she told Coroner Cyrus W. Davis, "but I didn't see the plane. I saw a black smoke coming back from it in the air."

Davis said many residents of the region heard "an awful crash" when, on just before it struck the ground, the plane fell 600 feet or more from a highway, overshadowed by trees.

Despite these indications fire might have been the cause of the crash rather than the reverse, Davis was inclined to believe Miss Tawzely saw the exhaust smoke of a possibly falling and backfiring motor and that other witnesses heard only the crash of the plane through trees.

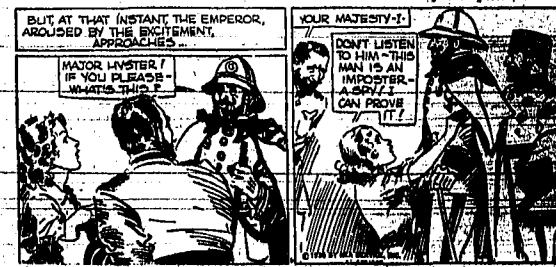


Figure 1. Schematic diagram of the experimental setup. The subject is seated in a chair, viewing a video screen. The video screen displays a target (a red dot) and a starting point (a black dot). The subject's hand is positioned at the starting point. The video screen is connected to a computer system.
