### SAFETY GADGETS HANDY FOR HOME

Variety of New Devices Help Reduce Accident Hazards in Household

CHICAGO (AP)—A bumper 1936 crop of new safety feature "gadgets" for the home promise to help reduce the annual spring house cleaning toll this year.

According to the National Safety Council, home furnishing manufacturers have devoted much time in recent years toward devising safe things for the home. The result has been a gradual decrease in household accidents, although construction shortcomings of housewares and maintenance devices still are responsible for nearly one-third of the accident fatalities in the United States.

Some of the developments in reducing home accidents shown in a review here in the Merchandise Mart were:

#### Here Are a Few

An electric fan with rubber blades sturdy enough to create a strong breeze but so pliable that an infant's fingers will not be harmed by direct contact. A non-slipable bridge table that will support a man on the edge even without tipping over. A milk-bottle sterilizer which reduces the danger of scalded fingers when removing sterilized bottles from the pan. Several new electric heat control devices for domestic irons which reduce the possibility of fires from irons left standing. Tea kettles with caps which cannot pop open accidentally.

#### These Are Handy

Also shown were attachments for gas cook stoves which make it impossible for children to turn on the gas; gas stoves whose burners are in sets of two each on either side of the top, with working space in the center, so there is less reaching over open flames; a combination step ladder and kitchen stool with six legs for security; several devices for hanging laundry, rugs, etc., to the floor; non-skid rubber bath mats, and all-preclean, shock-proof electric fixtures for the bathroom.

### Your Baby's Health

The amount and kind of exercise that the expectant mother should take depends largely on her previous habits. She should never exercise to the point of fatigue, but should keep up as she begins to feel tired. The more likely she is to become tired quickly and require rest. ### ERECT POSTURE AIDS WAISTLINE

Doctor Gives Word of Caution to Middle Aged Men With "Bay Windows"

DETROIT (AP)—Words of caution with a "bay window" man, Dr. William J. Kerr, of St. Francis, told the American College of Physicians in Harper hospital that the bulging waistline is not a necessary adjunct of middle life.

The midriff surplus, Dr. Kerr said, is primarily a postural defect caused by improper breathing. An erect carriage, coupled with breathing methods that permit the full play of the diaphragm will do much toward returning the Apollonian figure of youth, he said.

#### Recommends Belt

Dr. Kerr recommended an abdominal belt for those who found it difficult to maintain proper posture.

Spousing an emphysemic, Dr. Roger I. Lee, of Boston, advocated squeezing the girth from meat on an open cut as an effective stoppage to bleeding.

The meat juice method, Dr. Lee reported, has proved far more effective than the use of other agents, such as snake venom, snake heads, or external blood-platelets, he said.

BRITAIN'S AUTOS LEADING EXPORT

Motor Industry Tops Parade of Rejuvenated Business, Statistics Reveal

LONDON, (U.P.)—Great Britain's motor car industry, producing about 1,400 automobiles a day in dozen plants, is leading the procession of rejuvenated exports.

Motor car exports have increased 24.6 per cent during the last two years and compared with 15.8 per cent gain for all other British exports, according to statistics of the Society of Motor Manufacturers and Trades.

Greater Growth Seen Sir Herbert Austin, chairman of the Austin Motor company, Ltd., believes the automobile industry will become the largest in the nation if some appreciable reduction in taxation is made.

Although American-made automobiles are a source of competition in the export field, the American advantage lies in highly specialized mass production of over 4,000,000 vehicles a year as compared with an output of approximately 400,000 in Britain.

The British manufacturer's biggest problem is in Australia where American concerns have made inroads despite the Australian policy which provides that all automobile bodies must be made in the Commonwealth.

One of the richest of the dominions, Australia purchased only 8,000 British cars last year whereas New Zealand, a far less lucrative market, bought 8,250. South Africa purchased 7,000 cars last year.
