

RAIL HAUL BILL HAS NO CHANCE

That's What Observers Believe
About Repeal of Long and
Short Clause

WASHINGTON, May 14 (Special).—In the absence of a legislative miracle, the Federal bill to repeal the long and short haul clause of section 4 of the act to regulate commerce has no chance of enactment in this session of congress.

This is despite the fact that congress has begun. This is the conclusion of observers on Capitol Hill who generally know what they are talking about. In the House, the interstate commerce committee, the senate, chairman by Montana's liberal Senator, McNary, is holding the hearings and is opposed to the bill.

Drawn-Out Hearings
Hearings, therefore, will be drawn out for 10 days, or two weeks, or more. There is a possibility that congress will adjourn before the hearings are completed. In the second place, unless some member of the committee changes his mind, the bill will not be reported even when hearings are completed. A recent poll of the senate indicates that about 45 or 47 senators are opposed to the Federal bill. No bill with opposition such as that has any substantial chance of passing.

Final action within the next two weeks has been announced on the anti-looby bill which has been in conference between the house and senate for a month. The bill seeks to require registration of all loobys and a statement of their capacities while lobbying.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, May 14 (U.P.).—Ray Hardy, Reconstruction Finance corporation official today predicted a bright future for western mining, already recovering substantially from the grip of the depression.

"Mining is picking up all over the west," Hardy, supervising engineer for the RFC's mining loan division, said. "The mining loan division of the RFC rapidly is becoming self-supporting and many applications for loans have been withdrawn because promoters have been able to enlist private capital."
