## SALMON WATER DATES ARE SET

Second and Third "Runs" of  
Ten Days Each Planned  
By Company

HOLLISTER, June 4 (Special).—Second run of irrigation water on the Salmon river tract is to start Wednesday of next week, June 10, and will continue for 10 days. It was announced today by W. M. McVinner, manager of the Salmon River Canal Co.

There will be a lapse after June 20 of six days and then a third run will be started and will continue 10 days. Thereafter, the schedule has not yet been determined.

The initial run of 20 days was concluded June 1, and in addition, there have been rains to help crops. On account of recent heavy rains in the Nevada mountains there is now a steady inflow of about 400,000 feet daily, McVinner reports. Gauge height at Salmon river dam is 20.65 feet, indicating a storage of 40,470 feet. This compares with 30,470 feet a year ago at which time only a small amount of water had been released for irrigation. Board of directors this year has allotted one-half acre foot per share for the season, but no doubt exists over the ability of the company to deliver a quantity of water considerably in excess of this figure.

## NEW TRIAL PLEA FILED FOR PACK

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, June 4 (AP).—Ben T. Pack, Jr., 24-year-old convicted attack-slayer of Ruth Sharr, 20, unemployed bookkeeper, today placed his hopes for freedom on a motion for a new trial filed in district court.

E. C. Jensen, defense attorney, filed the motion as the first step in a legal battle to reverse the verdict of a jury that found Pack guilty of the first-degree murder of Miss Shaw on May 20, 1935.

After his conviction, Pack was sentenced to life imprisonment. He was convicted of killing the diminutive blond girl to Emily Graham Canyon, after a dance, where she died during a criminal attack.

Discarded Portion  
Jensen based his appeal on the contention that Pack's confession, which was the basis of the conviction, was untrue, and that Pack had been coerced into making it.

Pack is scheduled to be sentenced Saturday by Judge Oscar W. McKim, who is privileged to decree the death penalty if he desires.

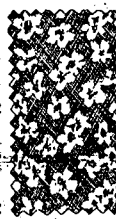

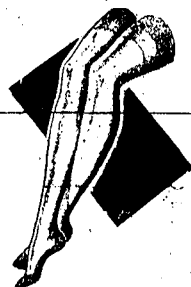

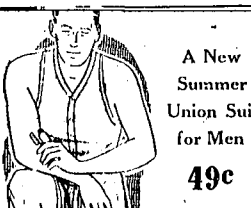
