WASHINGTON, June 20 (AP)—A third party ticket, headed by Rep. William Lemke, N. D., author of an inflationary farm mortgage bill, entered the 1936 presidential race today and will oppose President Roosevelt and Gov. Alf Landon, the Republican nominee, in all states in November.

"Union" Choice

G. O. P. RESENTS BORAH ATTITUDE

Idaho's Republicans Cautiously Rap Senator; Cast About For Another Choice

HOISE, Idaho, June 20 (AP)—Idaho Republicans maintained a policy of "watchful waiting" today and made cautious comments on the status of William E. Borah in their party ranks. They resented Borah's attitude toward Landon and the Republican platform. They declined to be quoted because they did not wish to "get into a party row."

They began casting about for a strong Republican to oppose Gov. C. Ben Ross, who today announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for Borah's senate seat.

Urges Someone Else "If the Republicans want a Republican senator, they'd better nominate someone other than Borah," George Sullivan, prominent state leader, said.

"Borah is playing both sides against the middle," said Shue, Boise lawyer, commented.

Must Back Landon W. Scott Hall, close friend of Borah and a liberal, said he would not support any map on the Republican ticket who is not entirely for Alf Landon. Hall campaigned strongly for Borah's nomination for the presidency.

"Economics and monetary policy are not Borah's forte," Hall said. "Let the alchemist attempt to fix his last. Borah is amenable to qualifying his return to the senate."

PRESIDENT SIGNS CHAIN STORE ACT

Robinson-Patman Bill Against Price Discrimination Is Made Into Law

WASHINGTON, June 20 (AP)—The Robinson-Patman chain store bill became law today when President Roosevelt affixed his signature to the measure.

The bill is designed to prevent price discrimination between purchasers of like quantity and quality of goods from a manufacturer for this reason has been construed as aiding the independent merchant as against the chain store.

Hits Fake Allowances In addition the bill carries provisions designed to prevent false brokerage or false advertising allowances.

The measure is the result of the House inquiry into activities of the American Retail Federation and into the chain store itself.

The bill was introduced in the senate by Majority Leader Joseph T. Robinson and in the House by Rep. Wright Patman, D., Tex.

Upper Chamber Approves Plans For Corporation Leases by 42 to 20 Vote

WASHINGTON, June 20 (AP)—The senate enacted the New Deal \$500,000,000 corporation, tax bill today and spent twenty minutes on the remnants of a filibuster which toward adjournment of the 74th congress.

Disposal of the controversial tax measure to the White House, had acceptance by the house of the senate's ship subsidy bill ended an unprecedented filibuster, blockade except for a final clash on the Guffey coal control bill.
