

EQUIPMENT NEED, CITED BY BASLER

Director of Recreation Points To Necessity for Added Facilities Here

The state director of recreation projects, Loren H. Basler, Caldwell, College of Idaho coach, at a meeting of Twin Falls, Buhl, and Filer supervisors and leaders of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce rooms last night emphasized the fact that the Twin Falls playgrounds were in need of appropriate equipment, pointed out the need for more cooperation from the city's organizations in addition with the program, and urged that more handicraft work be placed on the program here.

A similar meeting is to be held in Burley tonight for leaders of the town and Rupert groups. In pointing out the need of more equipment he cited the fact that 100 small children who met daily at Drury park have no ball with which to play, and that one piece of equipment that the 50 boys who meet daily at Lincoln field have no equipment to play with.

Basler outlined the work done by the recreational activity projects in the state, saying that at present there are 47 projects under way and that approximately 10,000 boys and girls are attending the playgrounds daily. Approximately \$15,000 per month is spent in the state on the program through the N.Y.A. and W.P.A. and the various communities expend more than \$3,000 monthly.

The work in Twin Falls was described as "well advanced considering the difficulty encountered in starting the program." He called the "President Makers" swimming pool at Harmon park "a great benefit to Harmon work."

The Buhl work is progressing although to date most of it is devoted to recreation work at the "Chubby" building. Basler said. One out of six persons in the Filer community is actively engaged in the recreation program coaching the children and operating 100 adults taking part in the city softball league that is conducted under the program. Basler, and his assistants, Miss Lucille Darkenwald, Boise, visited Burley, Rupert and Caldwell playgrounds today, and a similar meeting will be held at Burley tonight. They visited Twin Falls, Buhl and Filer playgrounds yesterday, assisting in playground instruction.

SKYLES IS TAKEN BACK TO VIRGINIA

Guard Who Held Prisoner Break Takes Fugitive From County Jail

H. E. Skyles, 30, alias Everett Whitlock, fugitive from a Virginia prison camp, alleged receiver of stolen property here, jail-breaker, and would-be suicide, whose escape kept his fellow-prisoners and officers on the alert during his riot confinement in the local jail, is en route to the Atlantic coast. It was revealed here today by Sheriff E. F. Fryer and his men.

Skyles was accompanied from here by C. H. Smith, Virginia prison guard, and by Special Officer Donaldson of the Union Pacific railway. Extradition had been asked and was granted by Gov. C. Lea Tross following a hearing.

Departing for her home in Muskogee, Okla., ahead of her husband and her young son and her young son. She came here after her husband's arrest to assist him in fighting the charges. Skyles proved he was a prominent Muskogee business man and innocent of the charges of having received stolen property from his companion, Jack Skinnish, who allegedly confessed to officers that he had given Skyles a quantity of mental gold.

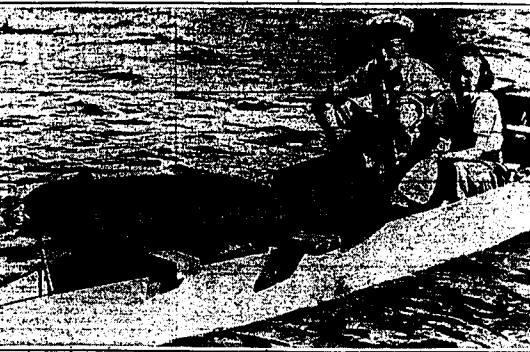
Shipped Gold East Skyles is charged with having shipped the package of precious metal to his wife in Oklahoma. It was intercepted by the sheriff and returned here and the contents identified. Skinnish, charged with theft, was bound over to district court where he was arraigned and thereafter he made a sensational get-away with four companions from the county jail, A. H. Cutler, in the ceiling of the runway surrounding an enclosure in the jail and escaped. Skyles was captured within few hours at Kimberly and the others were overhauled at Roseman.

Last week Skyles is reported to have attempted to take his own life by cutting an artery on his arm with a razor-blade, meanwhile keeping fellow prisoners at bay by brandishing a gun. He was given medical treatment and kept in close confinement. Arriving here the forepart of the week to take the unruly prisoner home, Guard Smith, shaken by a tragic experience of his, quietly negotiated for the return of Skyles and was enroute east with him before it was generally known in court-house circles.

Smith is "Break" Heo Smith was the officer who figured in a sensational episode at Elm Springs, Va. June 10. He treated a prison break with a machine gun, wounding five prisoners when they made a dash for freedom in so doing killed a guard and wounded another, both of whom, unbeknownst to him, were crouched in the bed of a truck which was under fire. They had been seized as hostages.

Smith asserted that Skyles had the reputation of being a dangerous character, and for that reason he was cautious in making the move from here. To insure the safe return of the fugitive, he sought and obtained the willing cooperation of the railway companies along the route to Virginia in supplying special officers.

Celebration Pays Honor To Custer And His Men

HARDIN, Mont., June 26 (AP)—The 25th anniversary of one of the most famous Indian battles in the west was commemorated in a day-long celebration here yesterday.

Officials and residents of four states paid-homage to the memory of Gen. George Armstrong Custer and his band of 265 men who were killed in a bloody battle with savage Sioux Indians on June 25, 1876. Crow, Cheyenne and Sioux braves, dressed in full tribal regalia, mingled with a detachment of soldiers from Fort Meade, S. D., and took part in a sham battle staged in reenactment of Custer's famous "last stand."

The sham warfare was the feature ceremony in a day of pagantry attended by hundreds of visitors from Montana, Wyoming, North and South Dakota. Gov. W. Eimer Holt of Montana was the main speaker.

The Custer massacre was the result of a campaign made necessary by the discovery of gold in the Black Hills of that territory. In 1868 a treaty had been concluded with the Indians generally known as the Sioux nation which gave the area included their favorite hunting grounds.

But when gold was discovered white men invaded the area without regard for the treaty or to the pleasure of the Indians. By 1875 Sitting Bull had gathered together hundreds of malcontents and hostile Indians and it became apparent that resistance was imminent.

Sitting Bull was notified that General E. S. Godfrey visited the battlefield three days later, wrote in his diary.

"All the bodies except a few were stripped of their clothing and nearly all were scalped or mutilated. There was one notable exception, that of General Custer."

O. S. L. LOSES IN COURT VERDICTS

Idaho Supreme Bench Denies Pair of Actions; Lumber Company Defeated

BOISE, June 26 (AP)—Three decisions affecting southern Idahoans had been handed down today by the state's supreme court. The Boise-Lytle Lumber Co. was denied a re-hearing in its case with the Idaho Gold Dredge Co. The dredge company was awarded a \$100,000 judgment in district court here because of injury to the lumber company's logging operation through grease which the lumber company put on its logging slides.

The lumber company attacked the new case on the grounds that the \$100,000 judgment was unreasonable against the conscience of justice. The district court judgment again was against the lumber company and it appealed to the supreme court where it was denied.

O. S. L. Loses Appeal The Oregon Short Line railroad was denied an appeal from the Bannock county district court decision which awarded a \$10,000 judgment to E. H. Burdick, Portland, Burdick and the Oregon Short Line Co. Burdick denied a re-hearing in its personal damage case with Edwin E. Burkland, Portland. Burkland and his wife received \$10,000 damages for a train wreck he was in while an employe of the railroad. Damages were denied him in the Bannock county court. He appealed to the supreme court.

Orders for Construction The Oregon Short Line Co. was ordered to construct 2,950 freight cars and 20 baggage cars, costing approximately \$8,000,000, here placed by the Southern Pacific. It was announced today by G. M. Betterson, purchasing agent for the company.

Former Atty. General Makes Formal Entry Into Race For Governorship

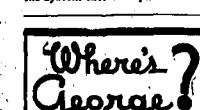
Frank Martin, Boise, former attorney general, and aspirant for the Democratic nomination for governor in the primaries two years ago, today issued his formal statement of candidacy, pointing out that he received more than 18,000 votes in 1934, and that because of his "intimate knowledge of the state its people, their needs and desires, together with his grasp of public affairs, he believes he will be enabled to render valuable service to the people.

He said that some of the reforms he advocated two years ago were adopted by the last legislature, and "the other reforms then advocated by me as vital now as then."

Key Reforms
These and others he advocates are:

1. "Simplification and coordination of the department of public government, in which there shall be no duplication of activities."
2. "Revision of the revenue laws, so new laws for taking money from the people, and no sales tax as a part of our revenue system."
3. "Giving every encouragement to agriculture, the greatest industry of the state, and in every way assisting in the increase of employment, and to help labor secure its fair share of the wealth it creates."
4. "In building roads and bridges a larger share of expense to be borne in the counties where the money is raised; and a greater vote by the counties to increase the amount of highways and sequence of their building."
5. "Our system of common schools furnish all the educational training received by more than 80 per cent of our children, and these schools have the greatest demand on us to increase their efficiency and give them a secure financial status."
6. "Business of every kind must be encouraged, water, power, and all the natural resources of the state must be conserved, developed and dedicated to the use of our own people, and the development of our own industries."
7. "The insane asylums, especially, and the other institutions where unfortunate people are cared for demand greater attention and an increase in their facilities."

Your Baby's Health

The best possible food for a baby is his mother's milk, particularly during the early months of life. Increase the responsibility of modern women, however, and the fact that so many women are helping to earn the family income, have undermined interest among mothers in this important duty. Many experts claim it is possible to feed babies artificially and thereby produce just as healthy children as those fed from the breast. Few babies, however, can have the opportunity to secure their artificial feeding under the daily direction of competent experts.

Two California doctors recently found that certain babies whom they had fed artificially had a greater gain of weight after the first three months of life than those who were breast fed. The artificially-fed babies had a reliable source of pure milk, an excellent climate, regular medical supervision, and plenty of cool liver oil and orange juice. They were given regular exposures of fresh air and sun baths.

These observations, that doctors all felt that, in the vast majority of cases, breast milk is the best food for an infant during his first three months of life. Provided the supply is satisfactory and the baby gains weight as he should, in many cases the milk of the mother continues to be the ideal food for the baby up to six, or even ten, months of age. Most babies, however, will do well with complete weaning after the fourth to the sixth month.

When the baby cannot get at least half his food supply from the mother's breast, he may be

weaned. If this way, the mother will be spared the annoyance and dissatisfaction of combined breast feeding and artificial feeding. Under such circumstances it is necessary to be certain just how much food the baby is getting from the natural source.

A healthy mother who is eating the proper diet will have in her milk all the food elements necessary for nutrition of a normal baby. There is little danger of overfeeding or underfeeding, provided the amount of milk is adequate.

The milk in the mother's breast rarely contains harmful germs; it keeps herself reasonably clean, and if her breasts are not infected, the milk is safe as far as germs are concerned.

Breast feeding is not always adequate, because the total amount of milk may be insufficient for needs of the baby, the milk may not be of good quality due to illness of the mother, or for other reasons.

The milk of the healthy mother usually agrees with the baby.
