CHAMBER HITS POWER PROGRAM

Business Organization Opposes Federal Planning Proposal

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—The chamber of commerce announced its opposition today to the administration's regional power and flood control program.

George H. Davis, president of the chamber, said in a statement the plan of the federal government to set up seven regional planning boards would transfer flood control work from the army engineers to political agencies. He asserted the proposal to set up seven regional planning boards was modeled on the Tennessee valley authority, for which he said \$300,000,000 had been spent, but "the results have not yet been demonstrated."

"The flood control act enacted by congress in 1936," he said, "incorporates principles which the chamber supports. The principles include federal leadership and continued use of the army engineers for surveys and execution. The legislation now proposed for new federal agencies would cut across these principles and turn over to the new agencies functions now performed by the engineers."

REICH, RUSSIA SIGN SHIP PACT

Bilateral Agreement With Britain Limits Size of Seapower

LONDON, July 17 (AP)—Germany and Soviet Russia accepted limitations of the 1924 London naval treaty today by signing bilateral naval agreements with Great Britain.

These powers limit became subject to the agreement limiting size of warships and providing for interchange of naval building data.

The treaty already has been ratified by France and the United States, and it was expected the two bilateral agreements would get Great Britain to do likewise.

Japan refused to adhere to any such limitations at the London conference.

The agreements with Germany and Soviet Russia, a British spokesman said, will go into effect at the same time as the London treaty. They are expected to be ratified in about two weeks.

The treaty, in brief, limits battleships to 35,000 tons, new cruisers to 8,000 tons, aircraft carriers to 2,000 tons and submarines to 2,000 tons.

'LADYBUGS' QUIT WAR ON INSECTS

Utah Farmers Complain of Fickleness of Allies in Experiment

LOGAN, Utah, July 17.—A band of northern Utah farmers allied with 10,000,000 ladybugs in a war on crop-destroying insects, complained today of the fickleness of the insect allies.

The flickle attitude is a major problem, they declared, as they expected to offset destructive habits of millions of pea aphids.

"The little ladies don't seem to realize their responsibility and wander off whenever they please," complained one grizzled farmer, who, with a number of others, is engaged in the experiment.

"The ladybugs, if they don't like it here, go to some other farmer who didn't help buy them."

It is a serious problem for farmers who last year saw the aphids virtually destroy the fertile areas vast fields of canning peas and alfalfa.

"After all," said George F. Knowlton, associate entomologist at Utah state agricultural college, "it is a constant battle to see whether the farmers or the insects will win in the harvest."

In 1936, the pea-aphids won in many localities.

Hence the importation of the ladybugs, technically known as ladybird beetles.

Taken from high mountain habitats in California by collectors, the insects sell for \$100 per million. They are shipped to Utah in cases containing dry pine needles and excelsior.

On June 1, agriculture officials distributed 7,500,000 in Cache valley in Utah's northern border, 1,000,000 to nearby Morgan valley and others to Springville and Ogden.

"Ladybugs" acquired their name from their "supposedly gentle, ladylike habits," said Knowlton. They are the little red insects which every farm child has wished on its way with the saying: "Lady bug, lady bug, fly away home. Your house is on fire and your children will burn."

Knowlton explained their obedience to such orders as due to a natural impulse in which the beetle, reaching the tip of one's finger, finds no aphid food and takes off, wasting no time where aphids are not present.

"Undoubtedly the ladybugs have been worth their cost," said Knowlton, "although they have shown their blessings on the home owners, when farmers growing alfalfa intended to feed it to sheep upon the ones who purchased them to control their pea aphids."

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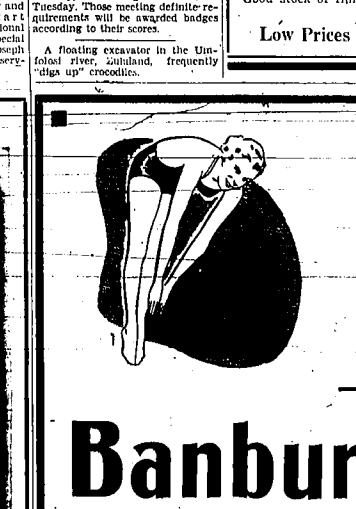
