Huge Crops in Prospect for Twin Falls Area

Beans, reportedly damaged extensively by ravages of the white fly, will provide the biggest crop in the area.

Due to increase in bean acreage during the past year, the county's bean yield as a whole will be only slightly below normal total.

Although beans, and particularly so-called "contract beans" in the west end of the county, are badly damaged, fields southeast of Twin Falls, near the center of the tract and furthest away from the desert-breeding grounds of the white fly, are apparently untouched.

**BURLEY MEDICO FOR STATE POST**

Dr. George E. Craner to Be Medical Superintendent at Blackfoot

BOISE, July 24 (AP)—Idaho-born Dr. George E. Craner of Burley will become medical superintendent on August 1 of the state hospital for the insane at Blackfoot.

A practicing physician at Burley for 2 years, the 31-year-old graduate of the University of Colorado was recommended for the appointment by Lewis Williams, state director of charitable institutions, and Dr. Andrew Warner, general superintendent of the Blackfoot hospital.

The appointment will be made by Governor Barzilla W. Clark, who was out of town but has indicated he will rely upon the recommendation of Williams and Dr. Warner.

Dr. Craner will succeed Dr. O. R. Lowe, who was transferred to the Nampa state school and colony to replace Dr. Orr Paynter, who resigned as superintendent of the Idaho state medical institution.

He attended the Union Normal school and University of Utah before obtaining his medical degree at the University of Colorado.

At the last session, the Idaho legislature approved the issuance of \$270,000 in bonds to construct new buildings at the Blackfoot institution.

Plans now are being prepared and Williams said construction bids for two new buildings probably will be asked by August 1.

In addition the legislature authorized expenditure of \$125,000 at the Nampa school and \$187,000 at the state hospital at Orofino. Plans for those buildings also are being prepared.

**University Chief - Selection Delayed**

BOISE, July 24 (AP)—The Idaho board of education adjourned a five-day meeting here tonight after announcing selection of a new president of the University of Idaho or superintendent of the Gooding State school.

"We considered many candidates for both positions," said Clery St. Clair of Idaho Falls, vice president and secretary of the board, "but we are not yet prepared to make any announcement."

Dr. M. G. Neale resigned last spring as president of the university to accept a position at the University of Minnesota. Dr. P. C. Polis, who had been superintendent of the Gooding State school for many years, resigned his position last December.

J. E. Denny of Cottonwood is president of the board of education. Other members are Wm. A. A. Steele of Parma, Jeready E. Day of Jay and Arthur L. Swin of Twin Falls.

Superintendent of Public Instruction John W. Condlie is executive secretary.

### EGYPT TO CROWN YOUTHFUL RULER

#### Great El. Rifa'i Mosque Spee of Oriental Ceremony

CAIRO (AP) — Egypt's youthful ruler will be the first king to be crowned as head of the senior Arab state in a ceremony of oriental splendor here, July 31.

The title king has only been in use since Britain's declaration of Egyptian independence in 1922.

Then, there is no crown of Egypt. The coronation ceremony means that the youthful monarch will be invested with the sacred jeweled sword of Mohamed Ali the Great, founder of his dynasty.

The ceremony, rivaling in pageantry of the coronation by the courts of the weathered Indian Maharajahs, will take place in the great El Rifa'i mosque.

Farouk's father and several of his forebears are buried in this sacred edifice, revered by all Egyptian Muslims.

Eighteen-year-old Farouk and his advisers, who were present at the coronation of George V, in London, are determined that all that the Orient can provide in magnificence will be incorporated.

Selected in England, Farouk studied in England after a combined Western and oriental training in Egypt.

When his father died, April, 1936, he curtailed his stay in England and returned to Cairo as king. Adversities immediately began besetting him in the intricacies of Egyptian politics.

He is just completing a long European holiday prior to assuming his royal duties.

### TEN DEMOCRATS FACE ADMINISTRATION WRATH

#### Opposition to President's Court Bill Figures in Next Year's Elections

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—The tag names of the court committee were widely known in the nation this week but at least ten Democratic senators were left to wonder what next year's elections might hold for them.

Senator Wheeler of Montana spoke of a fade-out which would draw a thick curtain of silence over the donkey party for the last few weeks. But, while the donkey may not be noted for its memory, like the elephant, it has been known to snort and lash out with its hooves at men who have provoked it in the past.

Of course, another session of Congress intervenes between the battle of the donkey and the elephant's reception. These ten senators, plus two or three others who sat on the fence during the fight, may do things in the next year that will win back wholehearted support of the administration.

But, it has not been so long since Senator Wheeler's party has supposed to keep a black book in which he listed the names of those who fought against the administration. The story told then was that when a member came seeking patronage, the first thing to be done was to look at the book and see how many times he had voted against the President. There was quite a lot of talk about it in the Capitol.

Mr. Farley may not be keeping books now, but it is certain that some names have been jotted down for future reference. The paths that these men walk for the next year will be watched carefully. Several things remain to be done which may help to lessen the frowns of the party.

Outspoken Opponents Of the 23 senators whose terms expire with next year, 23 are Democrats. Clark of Missouri, George of Oregon, Gillette of Iowa, Lowman of Connecticut, McCarran of Nevada, Smith of South Carolina, Tydings of Maryland and Van Nuys of Indiana were listed as outspoken opponents of the administration.

The others who had given no indication of whether they were for or against the President's plan were Bone of Washington, Brown of New Hampshire, Caraway of Arkansas, Duffy of Wisconsin, Pepper of Florida and Wagner of New York.

Four Republicans who have to combat for their seats are Davis of Pennsylvania, Gibson of Vermont, Nye of North Dakota and Steiwer of Oregon. The Democrats would hardly be expected to help them even if they had supported the court plan—and they did not.

At least one of those who spoke against the court plan feared that the situation might hold for him, McCarran told the senate that he might be delivering his resignation in objection to the presidential proposal. He said later that the administration already was planning to remove him in Nevada.

Still, there were some who thought the matter might be smoothed out. Changes in the procedure of lower federal courts were offered in the compromise. Another suggestion or so from the Supreme court would give the President the power of appointment over enough men to change completely the tenor of its decisions on close votes. And most of the important rulings of the court on major administration issues have been close votes.

### CITY DECLARES WAR ON PLAGUE

#### Free, Secret, Blood Tests Proposed in Mass Attack on Syphilis

CHICAGO, July 24 (AP)—Health officers began the city's first mass attack on the syphilis plague today by polling Chicagoans on the question of submitting to free secret blood tests administered by family doctors.

D. Louis Schmidt, head of Mayor Kelly's committee for control of venereal disease, said returns from the secret ballots, to be mailed to every family in the city at the rate of \$100 a day, would govern establishment of machinery for administering the tests.

Chicago's 5,500 physicians would be asked to test the blood of their regular patients without charge, the doctor said, and the state and city health departments would be asked to handle most of the laboratory work.

All necessary supplies would be furnished them; they would give only their time, Dr. Schmidt said. His satellites would send to the laboratories under code numbers and results of the tests would be confidential between patient and physician for return visits.

### RED CROSS FLOOD RELIEF REPORTED

#### \$20,937,943 Spent by Organization Since January's "Greatest Disaster"

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—The American Red Cross reported today that \$20,937,943 had been spent to defray flood relief in the Ohio and Mississippi valleys since the nation's greatest disaster developed early in January.

Admiral Cary T. Grayson, chairman, said the entire \$25,501,000 relief fund donated by the public had been allocated and expenditures were continuing at the rate of \$1,000,000 a week.

He reported \$10,282,628 had been spent for rescue, feeding, shelter, clothing, medical care, and sanitary measures, required by the emergency which affected 1,500,000 persons.

The United States Public Welfare Association was the first employment association of national importance in this country; it was organized in 1875.

## Di Maggio In Second Place Tie For League Batting Honors

### Budge Trounces Hare And Austin Humbles Parker at Wimbledon

#### End of First Day's Play Finds Holders and Challengers All Even in Contest For Historic Trophy

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 24 (AP)—The United States and Great Britain, playing spotty and sometimes hilarious tennis, split the first two singles matches of the Davis cup challenge round today.

Sleek, dark-complexioned Henry Wilfred (Bunny) Austin, main hope of the defending British, soundly whipped Parker, 21-year-old youngster from Milwaukee, 6-3, 6-2, 7-5, in the opening match; but Don Budge, the "red terror" from Oakland, Calif., tied up the series by subduing young Charles Edgar Hare after a weird first set, 15-13, 6-1, 6-2.

This even division, confidently predicted in advance by the experts, left the rivals exactly where they started and America's campaign to regain the cup for the first time since France lifted it at Germantown, Pa., in 1927, no farther advanced than before.

#### Americans Confident

American supporters, however, are counting definitely on picking up the two points still needed in the doubles on Monday and in the final two singles matches Tuesday when today's pairings will be reversed.

The Milwaukee youngster, named as a replacement for Brian M. (Bibi) Grant of Atlanta, never had a chance against the machine-like American whose reputation has been built mainly on his remarkable exploits in Davis cup competition. Bumpy ran through the first two sets without serious difficulty and even in the third, when Parker rallied in the later stages, there never was any doubt about the outcome.

#### Hare Surprises Gallery

All the excitement of the first day's play was furnished by Hare, a big, handsome southerner, given not a chance against the brilliant Brit when the young Brit had the gallery sitting in wide-eyed amazement as he carried the right to the red-headed Californian from set out and yielded finally through sheer exhaustion rather than through the Brit's superior play.

It took a service break by Budge in the tenth game to save the red-head from losing the set. With that break and the score all even at 3-3, the Californian, obviously far better than expected, hung on, protecting his own service games for 17 games in succession in the 20th game. Hare, who was leading 40-15, served two consecutive double-faults to allow Budge to serve the second set. The double-fault, a minute later, cost the Brit a game and set.

Thereafter it was a breeze for Budge who began hitting his shots with his customary speed and accuracy. Hare was so weary he could throw up his hands against the Californian's powerful offensive.

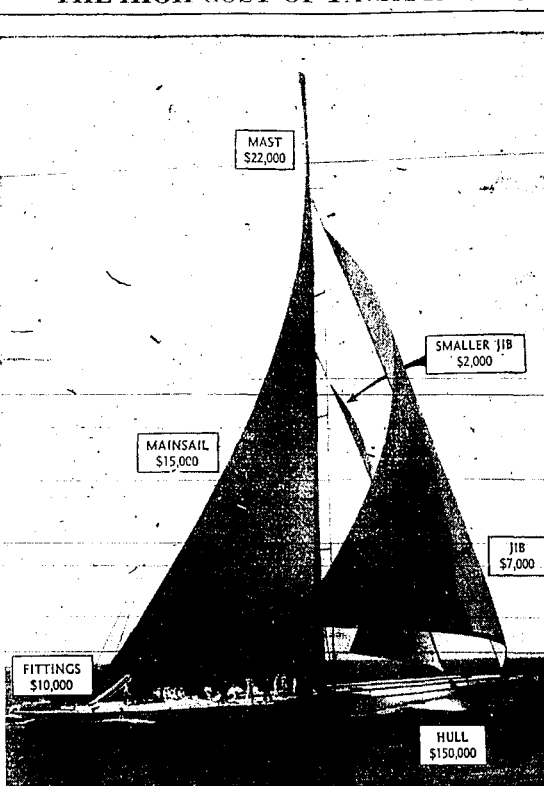
