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NO EASY PEACE. The Japanese say they are within their rights to bomb any region they think necessary.

1. The United States Navy will retain complete freedom of movement on the Yangtze, and will proceed to any place where Americans are in danger.

2. The American command will not change the color of its warships, which are painted white, to conform to any color scheme suggested by the Japanese.

3. The United States does not regard the warning of the Japanese naval officials relative to the Yangtze as relieving the Japanese of the slightest degree of responsibility for damage or injury to U. S. warships.

4. It all sounds plain and clear-cut. The implications, however, are complex and disturbing. As the war grows hotter and the rules of civilized warfare are more ruthlessly ignored, the Yangtze will become a theater of their consequences.

THE FORECLOSED CHURCH. Not often does a city church suffer foreclosure on its mortgage and a taking over of its building and land by a bank.

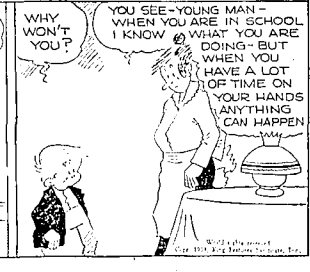
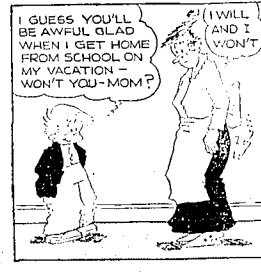
Movies Record Unusual Sounds

Officers Review Record of Hitchohker Wanted for Murder-Robbery

Los Angeles police officers arrived in Twin Falls Saturday to return the Woolones who must face first degree murder and robbery charges in connection with the slaying of her partner owner and robbing his establishment early in March, 1938.

Woolones had been held in the city about June 12 when he was arrested by a local officer who "spotted" the wanted man hitchhiking on the Kimberly road. The officer turned his automobile around to pick the man up, he caught another ride to Kimberly where he was finally apprehended.

Detective Lieutenant Fred Brown of the Los Angeles homicide detail arrived in Twin Falls Saturday morning by train, while Detective Sergeant W. W. Harris of the robbery detail came later by way of Boise where he stopped for extradition papers.

Four Holdups

Brown stated Woolones confessed to four holdups when he started questioning him at the local police station. He maintained the successful implication in the murder, however, referring to it as a "bum-bum", the same words he used when quizzed by the Twin Falls officers who made the arrest.

Woolones and his accomplice James Lewis Barker, who was wanted for the murder-robbery, had a standard way of pulling their jobs.

Seven-Year Probation

On January 10, 1928, Woolones was convicted and given a seven year probation for forgery. Previous to that he had been arrested for lewd conduct, forgery and gambling but was not convicted.
