"Winter-feed rather than over-feed."

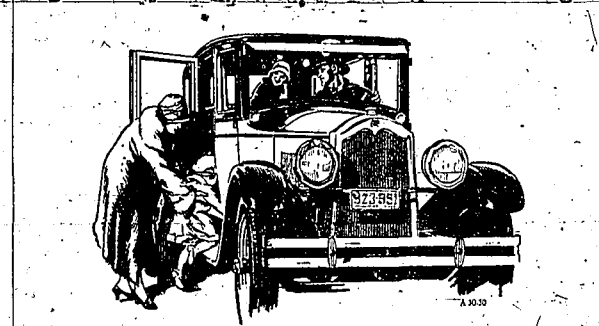
"Weigh all milk feed and feed it at the same temperature each time."

"Use clean pails—only diseases are cured largely by frequency, cleanliness, and filth."

"Remove foam from separated milk before feeding."

"Reduce the feed allowance one-half at the slightest sign of sickness."

The importance of exercising particular care in feeding while the calf is young is emphasized by Professor Atkeson. "It costs between \$50 and \$70 to raise a calf from birth to producing age," he says, "and approximately one-half of this amount is required to feed the calf for the first six months. A slight difference in feeding methods during the first half year may make a great difference in the total cost. The cost during the following eighteen months usually does not vary so much."

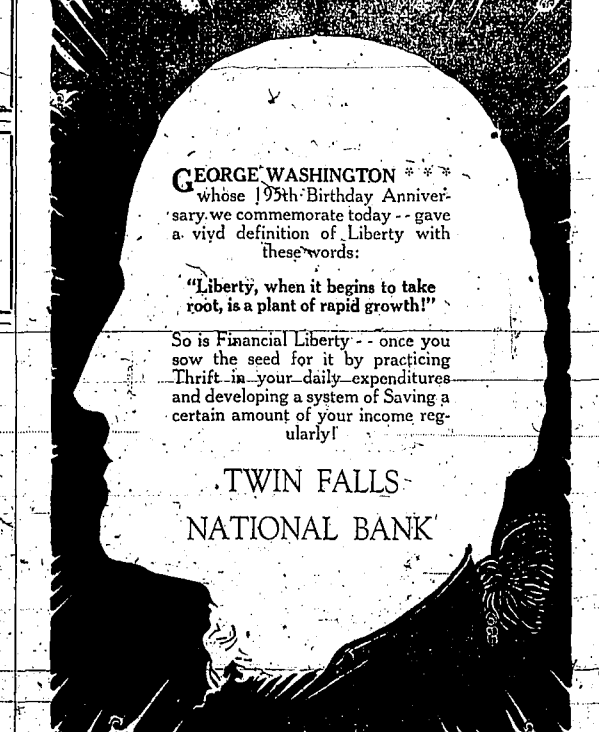

AIR PLANES SOON TO BE COMMON AS AUTOMOBILES

Rocking in a sky 6000 feet above the earth against a vicious head wind that buffeted them and their small wings, the pebbles of a blizzard, a violent storm, John N. Hurst, son of C. B. Hurst, for many years a resident of Idaho, and P. S. MacFarland, General Manager of the National Aircraft Corporation of Hollywood, watched their pilot, Burdette Fuller, win a battle with the elements and a race with the wind on their return trip of a test speed-flight from Los Angeles to Yuma, Arizona.

With the gasoline supply exhausted, as they neared the port of exit and the roar of the engine and propeller quieted as they dropped to an altitude of 2000 feet, about a mile away from their objective landing point, the men report that on the experience and skill of the pilot, and the few remaining moments of daylight saved them from what seemed an inevitable crash in a snowed field, according to word received here today from Mr. Hurst who witnessed the near accident on Tuesday of last week.

"According to the Los Angeles Times" of February 19th, Mr. Hurst and Mr. MacFarland established a record time for the flight from Yuma, for that class of flight, of two hours and forty-five minutes. The distance was 386 miles.

The men report that on their return refilling portions of a Travelogue in natural colors, and as reported by Mr. Hurst the trip was ideal in every way, and they returned to Los Angeles on their return flight. He says:

"Mr. MacFarland, who had personally directed the filming of the test, says that he had seen in the past getting some especially wonderful shots, was so elated over the success of the trip that he paid little attention to the advice that reached him at Imperial regarding the dangerous head winds that were said to be causing more than an ordinary disturbance about the San Bernardino mountain range. In fact neither one of us at any time felt any particular care for apprehension because we felt that we had the best pilot in the world's sturdiest aircraft yet built to take the air."

"It was a marvelous experience, as we are gratifying one for its demonstration conclusively the advance that the airplane has made in the past few years. It is not hard to believe that the time is comparatively short when the most popular mode of travel will be by airplane; more especially for those persons used for the test."

Mr. B. Hurst, who was flying at the Burdette Airport for the return of the "Swallow", saw the plane as it neared the direction of the field and was at the adjoining ranch when the plane hit on the "furozoned" ground. He was the first to congratulate the three fliers on their safe landing.

C. B. Hurst has for a number of years been associated with motion picture development in California, and he has had the opportunity to assist the State in breaking down of natural color films to the World, depicting scenes of Idaho.

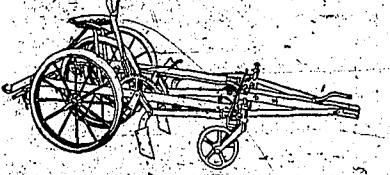
