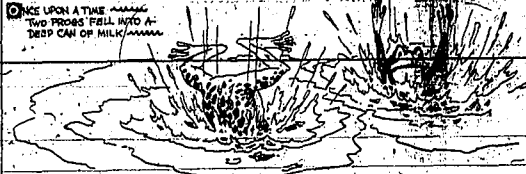

lbs; from Dallas, 93c per 100 lbs; from Texas common points to Ogdin, Utah, for distances up to 2024 miles, 93c per 100 lbs; from Texas common points to California via Ogdin, 2188 miles, \$1.13 1/2 per 100 lbs; from Oklahoma common points to Arizona for distances up to 1400 miles, 93c per 100 lbs; from Oklahoma common points to Utah for distances up to 1320 miles, 93c per 100 lbs; from Oklahoma common points to Idaho for distances 1215 to 1680 miles, \$1.24 per 100 lbs; from Ogden, Wyoming to Salt Lake City, 740 miles, 68c per 100 lbs; from Parco, Wyoming to Salt Lake City, 254 miles, 63c per 100 lbs; from Laramie, Wyoming to Salt Lake City, 452 miles, 68c per 100 lbs; from Parco, Wyoming to Twin Falls, Idaho, 532 miles, 71c per 100 lbs; from Laramie, Wyoming, to Twin Falls, Idaho, 642 miles, 76c per 100 lbs; from Pocatello, Idaho, 414 miles, 62 1/2 c per 100 lbs; from Laramie, Wyoming, to Pocatello, Idaho, 524 miles, 76c per 100 lbs.

Fifteen cents per 100 lbs. means one cent per gallon on Gasoline freight charges.

If Idaho freight rates were balanced up on an equitable basis it would mean a saving of two cents per gallon on every gallon of gasoline you burn, or a saving to the State of Idaho of six hundred thousand to eight hundred thousand dollars per annum. In other words it would pay more than 90% of the new state tax of four cents per gallon.
