CALIFORNIA CO. PROBING DEATH OF K. S. PETERS

California Association is Opposing Collection by Estate of Insurance; Claim Man is Not Dead

It is reported that the California Building Association, which is opposing the collection, by the estate of K. S. Peters, of accident and injury insurance, are making inquiries as to the status of the case in this city.

Three grounds for defense are made. "That Peters was not an employee in the sense of the law," that he did not die by accident or injury; that "he is not dead." The case comes up in Los Angeles shortly.

Referring to statements obtained from Clarence A. Grant of Abilene, who talked to Peters after his disappearance, and of the Abilene banker, said to have been present at the time when the manager of the California company says:

"There is so much apparent lack of consideration and so much hurry to get rid of the body without giving any one a chance to view it other than the son-in-law (even the wife and daughter themselves did not view the body when it was discovered) it gave us grave suspicions that the whole thing was a plot. However, it is difficult of course to imagine such a thing, especially when there is a body incorporated. This could be true, however, without a murder. The bodies could be easily secured almost anywhere.

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NEW GOLD STRIKE CAUSES BIG STRIKE

Word was brought to Wells last week of a new gold strike in the Peck Creek country about 20 miles northwest of Contact, Nevada.

The strike was made by Pat Dunn and it is reported that ten thousand dollar gold ore was uncovered in a one day run, and hopes are expressed that this may widen out into something big.

TWO KILLED IN IDAHO CRASHES

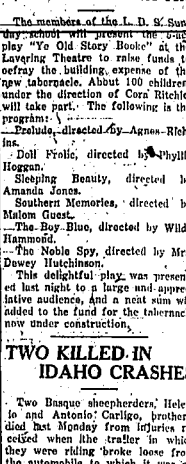
Two Basque shepherders, Hele and Antonio Carillo, brothers, died last Monday from injuries received when the trailer in which they were riding broke loose from the automobile to which it was attached on the state highway one mile east of Rupert.

The skulls of both men were fractured and Hele's neck was broken.

This class included schools with from 25 to 99 pupils enrolled. Hammett school, Elmore county, Mr. Wayne Barber, principal was second with 38.7 cents. In class C schools, those having an enrollment of 18 to 24 pupils, Cabarton, Valley county, District 23, Mrs. Elmer Ashton, principal, was first with a per capita sale of 40 cents. Masonia school, Shoshone county, Miss Wilma Bostanger, principal, came second with 30 cents per capita, and District 61, Ada county, Miss Lucile Gray, principal came third with a per capita of 29.7 cents.

The school at Tamarack Mine near Gem in Shoshone county, Miss Moro, principal, carried off all honors in Class D, schools with 5 to 17 pupils. Their sale was \$2.95 per child. They will receive a first aid kit for the school. Tamarack school carried off honors last year.

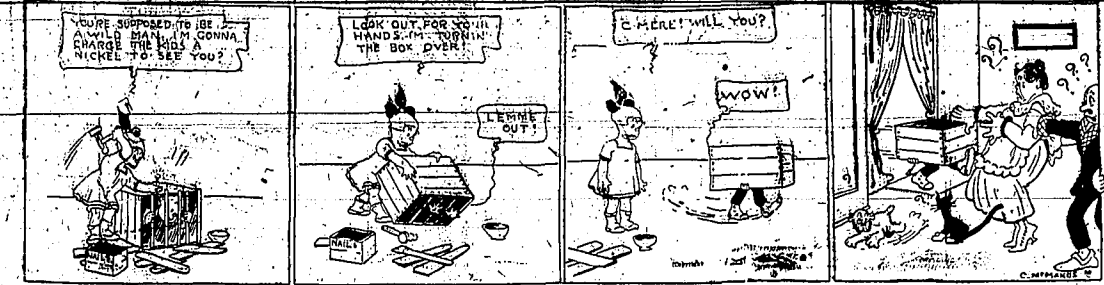

The first picnic of the 1927 season will be held Sunday when the Jesters will gather at Clear Lakes for a one-day outing.

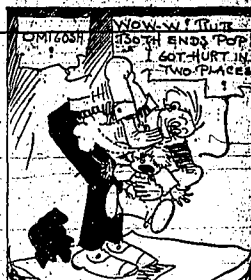
Over twenty autos will assemble at the courthouse Sunday morning. Proceeding to Buhl the members will attend church services there.
