But honestly, there were never better beds than Aunt Abbie's home-made woolen blankets, goose feather ticks and man-sized quilts. Eats—gastrointestinal emotions are stirred to their depths when we inhale the memory of her home cured ham, buckwheat cakes and mince pie!

Compared to modern methods of living and scientific information of food values the death dealing combinations of eat of "the good old days" was man slaughter. The dear uncle and aunt went to untimely graves, the victims of their ignorance of food values and the stupidity of the family doctor of "the good old days" whose principal stock in trade was poison drugs that modern science has long since consigned to the sewer.
