# INFORMATION IS ANNOUNCED ON POULTRY

## State Authorities Prescribe Regulations For Flocks

Regulations covering the admission of poultry and poultry products into Idaho, as supplied last Idaho, Washington and Oregon have been announced to the poultry raisers of the state by John S. Welch, commissioner of the Idaho department of agriculture and by A. J. Dickman, director of the bureau of animal industry. The regulations follow:

For the purpose of the regulations the following terms and terms shall be construed respectively to mean:

**B. W. D. shall mean Bacillary White Diarrhea.**  
State Poultry Regulations: The regulations adopted by the State of Idaho governing the interstate movement of hatching eggs, baby chicks and growing and breeding poultry stock.

**Authorized Inspector:** A veterinarian of the state of origin from which hatching eggs, baby chicks and growing and breeding poultry stock are shipped, who is qualified and authorized by the state of origin.

**Official Health Certificate:** A signed statement on official state health certificate blanks of the state of origin by an authorized inspector prior to intended shipment and after consulting the official test charts of the flock of origin, certifying that flock from which the hatching eggs, baby chicks or growing and breeding poultry stock originated, had been officially B. W. D. agglutination tested and all reacting birds leg banded and officially removed. Such certificate must have the official endorsement of the laboratory superintendent where the B. W. D. test was made.

**Official Health Certificate:** A signed statement on official state health certificate blanks of the state of origin by an authorized inspector prior to intended shipment and after consulting the official test charts of the flock of origin, certifying that flock from which the hatching eggs, baby chicks or growing and breeding poultry stock originated, had been officially B. W. D. agglutination tested and all reacting birds leg banded and officially removed. Such certificate must have the official endorsement of the laboratory superintendent where the B. W. D. test was made.

**Section I:** Hatching eggs, baby chicks and growing and breeding poultry stock moved into Idaho shall be accompanied by an official B. W. D. certificate conforming to the herein requirements.

**Section II:** Hatching eggs, baby chicks and growing and breeding poultry stock moved into Idaho shall be accompanied by an official B. W. D. certificate conforming to the herein requirements.

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**Section X:** Hatching eggs, baby chicks and growing and breeding poultry stock moved into Idaho shall be accompanied by an official B. W. D. certificate conforming to the herein requirements.

**Section XI:** Hatching eggs, baby chicks and growing and breeding poultry stock moved into Idaho shall be accompanied by an official B. W. D. certificate conforming to the herein requirements.

**Section XII:** Hatching eggs, baby chicks and growing and breeding poultry stock moved into Idaho shall be accompanied by an official B. W. D. certificate conforming to the herein requirements.

The Sawtooth national forest reserve—that region lying north of Hailley, is filled with opportunities for the pleasure-seeker and should be visited annually by every resident of this section.

By motor it is but four to five hours away. There one finds delightful mountain roads, rushing streams, tall, snow-capped mountains, fishing haunts, delightful camping spots, scenery, coolness and the exhilaration that comes from being out of doors in the mountains.

A bit of Old Idaho is revealed in the decaying buildings about Hailley which encourage the widest use of the automobile. The latter town is reminiscent of pioneer mining days; there is Guyer hot springs, Easley hot springs, old Galena town and the summit of the same name, and beyond is the vast Stanley basin country with its unrivaled mountain lakes—Petit, Red Fish and Stanley.

Capping them all rise the majestic Sawtooth peaks, snow-capped, jagged monuments of rugged beauty. People come from all over the United States to see them. Guides are available to explore their hidden recesses.

Go to the mountains! They are yours! They are as free as the air you breathe.

Get away for a week from complex civilization. Fish half a day on the Salmon, flowing northward and westward to the Columbia. Sleep in the open. Forget cares and really enjoy life in the Sawtooths!

### THE POWER OF PUBLICITY

There are narrow-minded individuals who claim that the cost of publicity is not a legitimate expense of public service corporations. Publicity which encourages the widest use of an article is the most potent influence to reduce the expense of that article to the consuming public. Without publicity, the demand for an article is small and the cost of production is high. Under this heading the New York Times has this to say: Star-eyed science sometimes winks. Who could have expected such behavior of her? In Water Supply paper 1927 the geographical survey tells us that 11 mighty springs, gushing from the black lava walls of Snake river canyon, Idaho, give water enough to furnish every city in the United States of more than one hundred thousand population with 120 gallons a day for each inhabitant. Water, water everywhere, nor any town to drink. Such is the "irony of nature" in that ironical state. There dwells the most august of senators, a volentian, a basaltic man. He discharges words enough in a year to supply every citizen of every city with a population of one hundred thousand with at least 120 words a day. As the great spring pools are blue, so is his output. If sometimes it seems a little muddily, as if there were limestone caverns in his mind, the muddiness must be in the hearer or reader.

Just as there are no proximate urban customers for the water springs, so there are none for the word springs. The word of "liberals" is soft-stepping "radicals," insurgents, come-outers, miscellaneous if not multitudinous, drink them eagerly. Every four years a wonder happens. Gifted as geology is, she can't yield a perfect analogy. In the presidential campaign, the first-magnitude springs gradually shut up. Only the black Republican volcanic rock is left, somber, austere, silent. This quadrennial intermittance is one of the most curious phenomena of political geology.

About the only way we can make other folks come up to our expectations is to measure them with the golden rule.

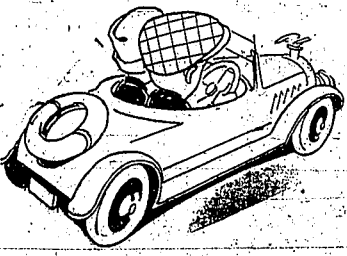

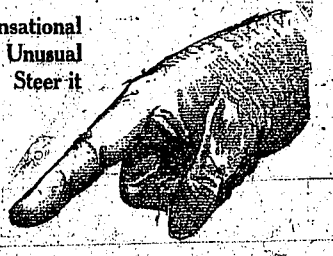

# BUHL APPROVES MUTUAL POWER ISSUE IN NOTE

## Sale of Clear Lakes Site Disregarded Tuesday By West End Residents

Despite the fact that the syndicate which was financing the development of the Clear Lakes Power site abandoned the project Friday, electors of the City of Buhl Tuesday voted 268 to 70 in favor of a proposed bond issue of \$55,000 for municipal power plant ownership.

The election proceeded in spite of the abandonment of the project by the syndicate, and the bonds carried over the definite protest of Mayor J. A. Howard, who divided with 17 other members of the city council. Howard said: "conditions are not right to vote the bonds at this time."

A resolution endorsed by the four other council members, at a meeting Monday night, just previous to the election said: "Be It Resolved: That the sale of the Clear Lakes power site has made it necessary to look elsewhere for power to supply a municipal electric distribution system. However, there are other sources available, and we believe that it is for the best interests of the city of Buhl to vote the bonds at this time. This is to be with the understanding that the bonds cannot be sold until a contract has been submitted to the voters for their approval."

The syndicate, which is composed of W. H. Kramer, San Francisco, Thomas W. Halladay, Rupert, Harry Dibble, Redding, Cal., W. H. Rohlf, Los Angeles and W. D. Spaulding, filed a statement in the office of the county recorder here during May that development work that had already been made at the Clear Lakes site, owned by W. C. Hazard, represented an outlay of \$100,000.

A deed for the sale of the property was recorded in Gooding county Saturday transferring the site and developments to the Bankers Trust company of Salt Lake as trustee for an unnamed purchaser. The consideration was \$45,000. It is not known whether development work will be resumed by the new purchaser or not, for his identity has not been revealed.

Following the express wish of the voters of Buhl in favor of municipal power, and the sentiment expressed in the resolution of the four council members, it is learned that engineers will be employed and estimates procured on the cost of developing some power site other than that at Clear Lakes.

In explanation of the decision of the syndicate to abandon the Clear Lakes proposition, Barry Dibble, well-known southern Idaho engineer, and a member of the syndicate, addressed a letter to C. G. A. Divilbia, Buhl city clerk, in which he said:

"As the engineer and one of the instigators of the Clear Lakes power development, it is my duty to inform you that the Clear Lakes syndicate is unable to proceed with its plans. The reasons are purely financial, being due to the withdrawal of the financial support which we had relied. Under the existing conditions the syndicate had no option in the matter."

"The members of the syndicate desire to express their appreciation of your interest, and assistance and regret this necessary change of plans. If our efforts have brought to the attention of this and other communities the possibilities in the utilization by the citizens of their natural resources, we will be glad that extent our work has not been futile."

"Let me say in closing that personally I am deeply gratified at the outcome of this undertaking."



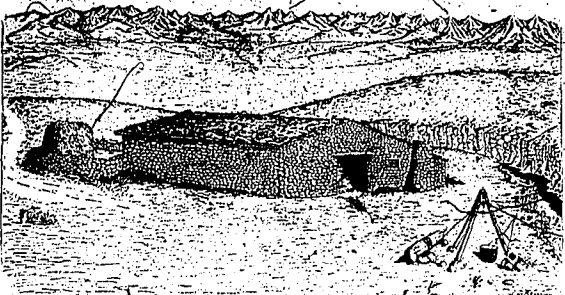

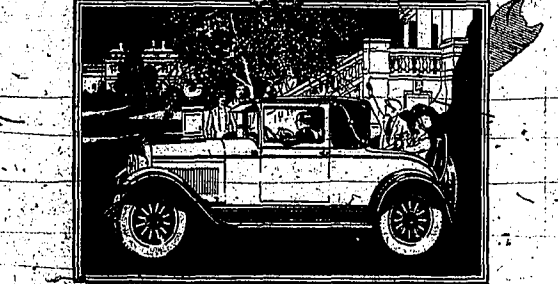

"Each season brings inquiries from fruit growers regarding young trees with burned leaves on trees which have failed to start," Tukey declares. "In many cases the trouble has been traced to the commercial fertilizer which has been applied too heavily. In tests on yearling apple trees in the Hudson river valley with varying amounts of several common commercial fertilizers in most cases either no benefit has been obtained or else injury has resulted. Even manure applied too close to the trees or

National Radio Audition Open to Young Singers in This Country

America's future generation of vocal stars will be disclosed to the world this Fall as another of the wonders due to radio. Every young man or woman with the gift of song, whether from country, town or city, will have an equal chance.

The Foundation has announced plans for a "National Radio Audition" to find by competition the best vocal talents in the United States.

The two winners of first place in the National Audition—a man and a woman—will each receive a \$500

Winners of second prizes will each receive \$200 in cash and one year's tuition.

Winners of third prizes will each receive \$100 and one year's tuition.

Winners of fourth prizes will each receive \$50.

Musical, civic and women's clubs in each community in each state will be invited to hold local contests to select the best young man and best young woman singers of their towns.

The next step is a district audition. The young men and women who have won state honors will be taken to a central broadcasting station in one of five districts, where an audition will be broadcast by a radio station in each state.

A state winner of each sex will be chosen and will receive a silver medal.

The two winners in each district will receive gold medals and the ten finalists in each state will be taken to New York for the final National Audition, to be broadcast over a national network of stations.

The spirit and purpose of the National Audition are indicated in a statement by A. Atwater Kent, president of the Foundation, who said:

"The discovery of one of those rare voices, of which each generation produces a very few, seems to me an event of national and international importance. Even when such a voice could give pleasure to only a few thousand people in a year it is a national treasure. Now that we have an opportunity for full development, recognition and reward."

The principal qualifications for contestants are as follows: Must not be over 25 years old; must never have been associated with a professional theatrical or operatic company; must never have been a paid principal in any concert held outside their own state; must declare an intention to follow a musical career and must be free from theatrical or musical contracts.

This limitation permits choicest singers to enter, the audience even though they may have received unusual compensation for singing in churches.
