DAIRY PROFITS WILL CONTINUE

Profits are rampant in this world of ours. Some of them are real economic. They do clear to the bottom on all factors concerning the matters in question and give us an opinion which we will do well to follow. Their opinions are worth much in guiding our destinies. There are others who seize upon an idea and, forgetting some of the fundamental factors in question, give optimistic views which are true only in part at least. At frequent intervals some of this latter group arise and note with trembling fingers to a dark future for the dairy industry. They have been doing this ever since dairying was important enough to demand attention. They will continue to do it as long as this world exists. But through it all the dairyman and the dairy farmer are getting on as well as the most profitable of all branches of agricultural activity. There is no denying that certain periods are better for dairymen than others. It would be folly to state that there never are times when some agricultural products bring more profit than those of the dairy farm. For a short time in 1925 grain prices were relatively higher than dairy products. But that condition was short-lived. The opposite extreme in the present cycle with the highest relative prices for dairy products is anticipated about 1931. Human nature is the factor which seldom receives proper consideration by those who forecast unfavorable conditions for the dairy industry. It is the one factor which overshadows all others in importance. We all know that business or industry the young man who starts with a determination to win, and a willingness to make the sacrifice, is the one who usually stands out as a leader in his field. As a rule he wins because he does not watch the clock nor place measure ahead of himself. He is not afraid to work through the small hours of the night, if necessary, to make the boss's business most profitable. Most of our captains of industry have risen to the top through just such means as that, and that is the chief difference between them and the man who is short-lived in the streets and dirt of the ditch. They had a goal and a standard of living they wanted to meet. They made the sacrifice and won. Just so on the farm we find different types of people. On the one extreme we have the fellow who asks only an occasional crop, such as cotton or wheat. He works twice a year, when the plants and when he harvests. That is all the sacrifice he is willing to make. He has worked little and his income is small, but his needs are small. Then we have all variations from that on up to the real dairyman who heads the list. He is the man who works all the months but one, who is comfortable and all the comforts and conveniences of life. He is willing to make the sacrifice both of studying the most complicated of all farm businesses and in year-round labor for a year-round income which would bring these things for himself and his family. Human nature was always thus and always will be. For that reason, over long periods of time there are two types of farming that will even approach dairying in income and buying power. Only the most intelligent and most aggressive will reach the higher plane. As soon as the volume of dairy production becomes such that other things are not done as well, the stocker goes down and the dairyman goes up. Farming which requires less mental and physical concentration. They always have and they always will.

The profit on that transaction, which required no great investment, would have been a little more than ten million dollars.

HOW LONG ON LORD? (Hudson Falls Times-Register) How long will it take the community to awaken to a sense of responsibility for the lives of more lives will have to be sacrificed? How many more widows and orphans will have to be cared for before we as a people and a community do what should have been done years ago, and that is to have a law that would have been done. It is being done. Other places do it. People on a rule are sane, just and equitable and are willing to be guided by authority when the authority is on the side of equity, justice and the saving of life. The village supervisor, Honorable, has registered and licensed nearly five thousand motor cars and before we as a people and a community constitute a menace to life, limb and property. So far as regulations are concerned there might as well be none. True, we have ordinances, and once in a while some one is picked up for speeding and goes on his nominal fine and goes on his way. The public servants cannot regulate the traffic by seeking to enforce an unknown city ordinance. Right and drastic enforced traffic regulations are needed. Such regulations are not a penalty on personal liberty, particularly when a license is made of liberty. Auto traffic has to be controlled. It cannot be permitted to run amok as it has in the past and is now. The city, months ago, made an appropriation of \$1000 for the purpose of having a traffic signal installed on an electrically controlled traffic system. A traffic system of that kind would be of great value to the city of Twin Falls. The reason why it is easy to answer. Part of the \$1000 might be used in making an investigation of the Twin Falls system. If this could be done in enough time to allow for more deaths, more killing and crushing out of the lives of useful citizens, of the city of Twin Falls. We are we, as a decent and civilized people to take steps to protect ourselves and others? It can be done. It is being done. We can do it. One-way traffic on some streets, stop and wait signs, and other traffic signs to go a long way towards solving the problem. You may be the next victim. You or someone more dear to you than your own life. Think about it!

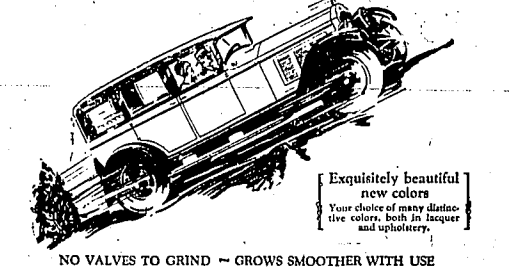
