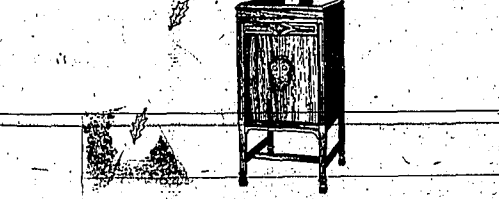

County Agent Annual Report Contains Valuable Statistics

Crop Improvement
105 farmers planted commercial crop from certified seed, 141 applying for certification, 125 complying with an average of 20%.

39 farmers applied for certification, 28 complying with a total of 160 acres.

Advanced rapidly. 291 growers now have over 10,000 acres certified ground and Cusack alfalfa seed fields. Best choice has an increased acreage of 2,000 for the past year.

52 carloads sold, 15,455 gallon carload bushels, 5,000 pounds cotton phosphate, 750 gallon K. M. G., constituting chemicals used in level campaign. Two demonstration plots on weed control established.

Exhibits made at four shows during season. Eight first premiums, five second premiums, three third premiums and one sweepstakes from State Seed Society. First premiums on weeds, premium and one sixth premium won at Chicago International.

One first certified 100 carload certified seed potatoes in 1927 for commercial plantings.

DECORATIONS FOR THE HOME

PLANNING OUR CHRISTMAS GIFTS

How much alike we all are about our Christmas gifts. Every year, as soon as the Christmas cards are sent, we begin to think that we will begin right away getting our gifts ready for next Christmas, so as to avoid the rush when the season comes. It is not a danger on the Christmas spirit, but the weeks and the months fly by and Christmas is not again before we know it, and we begin to fly around getting together a "Christmas remembrance" for just a hasty gift to many of our friends.

Gift Thought in Gifts

What shall we give our friends is a question many are asking them these days now, and these suggestions are for the home town and limited society, where close friends may be able to fashion many simple and inexpensive gifts that are always welcome in a busy season. For instance, there are never too many slips. There are two excellent in slips today: They should be cream and red, which means that one and one-half, or one and three-fourths yards of 40-inch material is needed for the average figure.

Then there are aprons. What home woman does not appreciate the gift of an apron? There is such pretty apron material in mercerized and English print. Choose a simple pattern and get the lining in some contrasting color, and be sure to stick on a pocket. You can make several in one afternoon, and such a useful gift will often be more appreciated than a more expensive useless one.

Quickly Made

Then there are towels. If you have no time to embroider a handsome guest towel, Turkish towels are nice gifts, and you can reach a pretty edge on several towels in an evening. Handkerchiefs can be bought very reasonably and any sewer has no many pretty elastic make dainty gifts. Make a pretty ribbon casing about five inches longer than the elastic, and in the elastic and sew the ends together and the ribbon will be shirred. Bring the ends of the elastic together and finish with a dainty bow or flower, and there you are. Any young girl would like such a gift. Collar and cuffs may be bought very reasonably, or they may be made out of a handkerchief, and are very neat. Dress-kitchen holders sell so readily at a church bazaars. Who would they not make acceptable Christmas gifts among friends?

Boxes of homemade candy at ways are acceptable, and something that can be shared with the family. We know one dear woman who always makes a good many plain candies to send to her friends for Christmas. The woman on the farm who raises poultry and has plenty of feathers may gladden the hearts of friends with pillows and cushions, and all kinds of pretty fabrics may be found in stores for pillow making. A can of homemade mince-meat is always appreciated from a farm woman in her city friend, and I once knew a man who made a practice of giving five-pound jars of homemade jam to his city friends, who could give nothing they liked better.

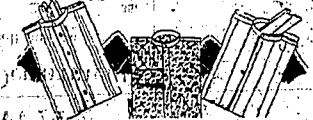
