Among the speakers scheduled for the annual meeting of the Idaho Dairy Producers' Association at the county fair grounds at Filer, Tuesday of next week, February 7, are J. W. Ingham, district county agent leader and B. V. Edwards, president of the Mini-Caslin Dairymen's Association.

At this meeting one director will be elected to succeed one whose term will have expired and annual reports will be made by the directors.

The meeting will be held in the rest room building on the ground and will commence at 10 o'clock. It is desired that all members of the business be disposed of in the forenoon, and that following a community dinner at noon a program be given in the afternoon. This will include singing and short talks.

Interested in the dairy industry are invited, with the request that they bring a basket lunch. The association will provide coffee and cream.

### COOP WHEAT MARKETING

### FARM COLD STORAGE

Old storage is impossible on the farm, but a practical solution is being sought. The storage of fruit and vegetables in the household storage cellar. To hold crops in a cold storage, proper condition, correct storage must provide constant temperature. Normal atmospheric moisture is necessary. Large quantities of grain against frost—these are important conditions to be secured.

### Coop Markets Pay in Canada

Idaho suffered a mismanagement of grain marketing in 1927. Other successful cooperatives have been more successful according to reports like this in the United States.

Twenty-one years of successful grain marketing is the record of the United Grain Growers, Ltd., a Canadian cooperative grain marketing company. At the annual meeting held recently in Winnipeg, Manitoba, the twenty-first anniversary of the company was celebrated with a number of speeches by association officers and others.

The annual meeting was attended by 242 delegates representing the 36,000 shareholders, all about 100 shareholders who were delegates. The report for the 1927-28 business year, which was presented by the president of the organization, indicated that the company owned 401 country elevators, 39 elevator annexes, 246 floor houses, 232 coal and soda supply sheds, 72 cottages, and several other buildings. The total assets of the company operated at 368 country points, the United Grain Growers, Ltd. Earnings for the year amounted to \$702,265, from which an 8 per cent dividend amounting to \$527,472 was paid. A patronage refund of one cent a bushel was made to farmers deeding stock in 1927. This refund amounted to \$76,972.

### CAR LOADINGS LAST WEEK ON SPOUS HEAVY

At Present Rate Crop Would Be All Shipped Along in Idaho Falls.

Idaho potato shippers were last week very busy, amounting to 847 cars, or a daily average of 140. This is an increase of 10 cars per day over the shipments of the two previous weeks, and the Idaho handling agent announced that nearly one-fifth of all the carload shipments of potatoes in the country, except the Idaho, will be shipped at the present volume.

Prices at Idaho shipping points barely held steady during the past week. Bonanza and trading has been fairly good on partly graded or "combination" but rather slow for No. 1 stock, particularly on Rural. The cash trade market on bonded cars of shippers has been moving 1500 for U. S. No. 1, 55.00 for partly graded, and for U. S. No. 2, 50.00. A few graded cars went at 56, while partly graded stock moved at 60.65.

Producers have been fairly busy with the warehouse market, around 700 sacks and graded, with combination grades lower according to quality and percentage of pick. Sacked and graded rural brought 60c, with partly graded mostly 10c lower.

On the Chicago market, Idaho shippers dropped a dime during the week, while at the same time Chicago shippers advanced 10c. Quotations on Monday of this week were \$1.60-\$1.75 for Idahos and \$1.50-\$1.60 for Wisconsin. Idaho arrivals at Chicago total 282 cars during the week, which was 20 cars heavier than during the previous week. Total Wisconsin arrivals during the same period were only 193 cars, or 93 cars less than arrived from Idaho.

The Los Angeles market continued dull, and Idaho stock last another nickel there, with the market closing the end of the week at \$1.35 for U. S. No. 1 Russet. (Continued on Page Six)

### Time to Spray for San Jose Scale Says Claude Wakeland

Entomologist Calls Attention to Seriousness of Pest and Details Methods of Successfully Fighting Its Inroads on Fruit Crop.

By CLAUDE WAKELAND, Entomologist, Idaho Experiment Station.  
San Jose scale conditions in Idaho in 1927 justify our calling attention to orchardists to the situation they have to face this year.

Many of us have become so used to the thoroughness of application of San Jose scale control, that we consider it for three years. A partial cancellation for the season may be necessary for the scale to be kept under control.

In the late winter of 1924-25 the writer examined many thousands of scale insects in orchards in southern Idaho, and as a result found that it was safe, in several instances, to recommend the omission of the scale control spray for scale control. Growers, the following fall, found no scale on the trees, and the spray again in 1925 and many of them even did not spray in 1927.

Danger Point Here Again  
We have reached the danger point. San Jose scale has again reached the prominence of being one of the major fruit tree pests in Idaho. In even in 1927, there was approximately a complete kill of the scale in 1927. There were many orchards in 1927 where rearmarked fruit reduced returns sufficiently to have more than paid the cost of control.

Besides this, there is a slight sprinkling of scale in most orchards where its presence is unsuspected, and it is hardly a safe thing to omit the insecticide spray this season.

### Grange Taxation Platform

Contains Ten Clear-Cut Points That Will Appeal to Thoughtful People Everywhere

One of the most important subjects at every National Grange meeting is that of taxation, and increasingly so. The farmer and heavier grows the taxation load, especially upon the farmer and the small home owner.

1. We favor the retention and simplification of the income tax laws, etc. and on all other the standing committee, whose chairmen are State Senator H. H. Cannon of Idaho, reported a general income taxation program, which we favor. This program is a clear-cut reform, and we believe with which the Grange membership everywhere should be thoroughly familiar.

2. We recommend the application by the states of debt control laws to the bonded debt contracted by officials, providing a pay-a-year system for current expenses and that no bonds may be refunded or sold during a longer period than the life of the improvement for which they are to be paid.

3. We recommend a system of subventions of states.

4. We think that the Grange should be used to discuss budgets and kindred matters of importance from a taxation standpoint in order that the people of the

at 2 per cent off strength we get a high degree of kill of scale in years, but frequently, results which it is not entirely satisfactory in a safe practice.

Weak Oil Spray Best  
Attention at 3 per cent off strength have always given good results as where used at greater strength than 3 per cent for San Jose scale control.

Liquid lime-sulphur has also given satisfactory control at 4 or 5 degrees Beaumé test. Where the scale problem is particularly acute and lime-sulphur is applied it should be used at 6 degrees Beaumé test.

We have found that success depends not so much on a choice between oil and lime-sulphur as upon the thoroughness of application. It must be constantly borne in mind that scale insects establish themselves on every part of the tree but are thoroughly destroyed with spray liquid.

Scale Trees Thoroughly.  
We can not avoid over-spraying portions of the tree with consequent runoff and waste. We must use the minimum amount of insecticide satisfactory control. The extreme tips of branches are as important as the branches and must be much harder to cover.

Most of our growers know how to use lime-sulphur and oil sprays. Those who are not, however, may obtain it by writing the Idaho agricultural experiment station, Moscow, or Corvallis, Ore.

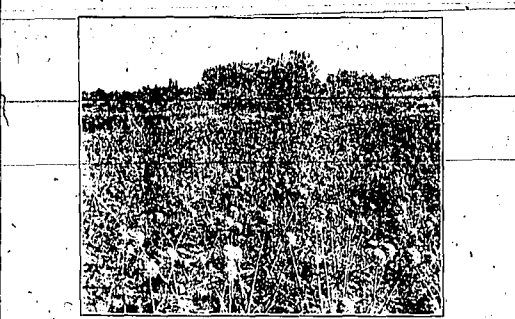

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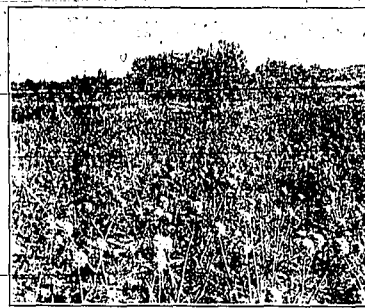
