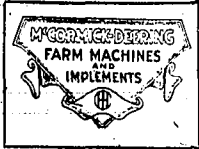

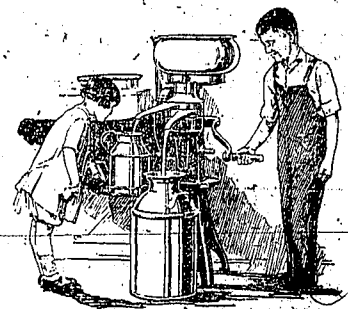

STATE AND COUNTY POLITICS

With presidential possibilities occupying a prominent place in the current news, interest is also beginning to center on state and local candidates for political office.

Three months hence, and most of the county candidates' names will have been filed for the August primaries and June brings with it the great national conventions.

Closer still the delegate conventions, the Democrats holding their at Blackfoot next week. Of immediate local political significance is the appointment of Marcus Wiro as county commissioner, succeeding Dr. L. H. Giffen, resigned.

The Republicans have just concluded a jamboree in Boise during which time the Baldrige administration was approved and the "Baldrige for Governor" banner was again raised. Endorsement was also given Mr. Borah as the Gem State's choice for the presidential nomination.

Agalath Baldrige, C. Ben Ross, mayor of Pocatello is being groomed as the likely Democratic standard bearer.

Plans of the Progressive party in the state are unknown, but it is rumored that there will be no Progressive state ticket.

Coming closer to home, the district judgeship and county auditor positions are out of the running for the present recipients of these offices were chosen for four years during the 1926 elections.

Senator Pike removed from the district last year so he cannot be a candidate for re-election. His Republican opponent in the last campaign, Nelson Hayward, and the logical candidate to aspire for the office this year in the Republican column, has also removed to California.

This year, of course he no campaign waged in this state this year for United States senator, since the terms of Messrs Borah and Gooding do not expire now, but Addison T. Smith will find it incumbent to return from Washington again this summer and campaign for re-election to his congressional position. It is a foregone conclusion that he will again be a candidate for re-election.

Mr. Smith will have but one or two difficulties to overcome. One is his militant espousal of the Boulder dam project, which is being opposed by the state grange, and the other is the question concerning Borah or Hoover for president. He says he believes Idaho is for Borah first, but some of his Washington cohorts accuse him of having indicated at a recent political gathering in Washington that Idaho would be strong for Hoover, after giving Borah the customary favorite son vote.

Regarding possibilities of candidates for county officers, it is yet a little too early to summarize the situation. It is expected that with three possible exceptions, present occupants of the court house will seek re-election.

It is not too early for a wholesome interest to be taken in politics. It is being done nationally to a very good purpose and can profitably receive earnest consideration locally.

One thing is most certain: it is going to be a great old year politically. As a purveyor of news The Citizen is going to keep its readers advised and informed.

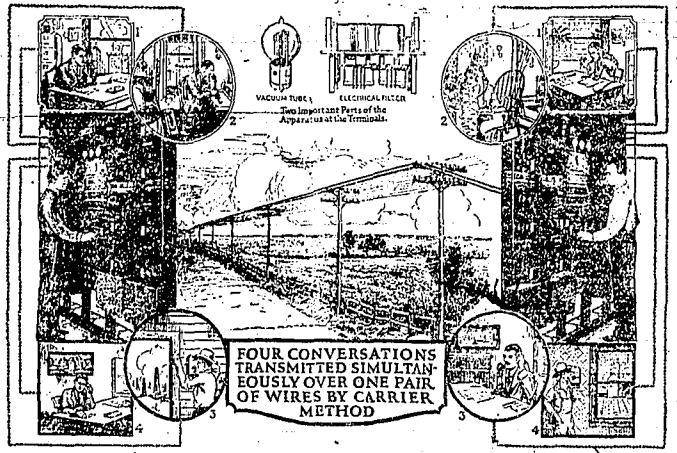
GOOD NEWSPAPER DEFINED

'Carrier' Currents Make Possible Simultaneous Long Distance Telephone Calls on One Pair of Wires



FOUR CONVERSATIONS TRANSMITTED SIMULTANEOUSLY OVER ONE PAIR OF WIRES BY CARRIER METHOD

By C. E. DEAN cannot be economically used for other open wire circuits. For some what similar question of cost factor, economically the carrier method is not sufficient traffic to justify call.

The most widely used type of carrier system consists of four simultaneous conversations, three more than the circuit would furnish without carrier.

In addition to the four lines there are connected to the terminal panel at each end four pairs of wires, one pair from each of the four telephone sets, each set being connected to the terminal panel at each end of the line. The voice currents from the four telephones are superimposed on the carrier current without any other electrical apparatus being necessary.

The apparatus used in this wonderful process is presented in a manner that is interesting to all. It consists of two electrical units at each end of the line or at intermediate points. This apparatus is necessarily elaborate. The appearance of the line itself is little different from any pair of long distance wires supported on poles and arms. It is necessary, however, that the wires shall be very frequently transposed in order to prevent any difference in resistance between the wires and the insulators attached to the wires. The transposition is frequently by means of special types adapted to this use.

"Sane Methods of Regulation Assure the Conservation of Public Rights"

Says Christian Science Monitor "Such a concert between public and private interests as is now proposed was not known to be possible a score of years ago. The public feared the oppression of monopolies, the complete usurpation of the State's prerogatives. But there have been worked out those sane and equitable methods of regulatory control which assure a fair return to invested wealth and at the same time the conservation of public rights and privileges."

TIME was when the right to own was restricted to a chosen few. Even after man had thrown off the shackles of serfdom, the State sought still to control the labor of his hands. Blacksmiths, tailors, innkeepers, victualers, ferrymen, wharfingers and others—all were subject to governmental regulation. Modern life has developed to its present high estate largely by divorcing public service from political interference.
