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# Finds Tractors Cheaper Than Horses for Use on Combines

Comparison of operating costs of tractor drawn and horse-drawn combines shows that the tractor costs less per acre in less for tractor than for horse, according to preliminary results of an experiment started last summer in the Palouse country by the Idaho State University department of agricultural engineering. Operating costs per acre with tractors varied from 27 to 38 cents with horses from 58 cents to \$1.31 per acre.

Taken together with figures given for overhead costs these results indicate an average saving of 49 cents per acre by using a tractor rather than horses on a combine. The first-year figures are believed to represent the actual costs with a fairly high degree of accuracy. They are, however, presented as conclusive. In announcing the results, Mr. H. Lewis, head of the agricultural engineering department, points out that no other farming operations were taken into consideration, that the figures are not necessarily representative of the Palouse country conditions.

One of the chief points with the figures concerned in the tractor was the fact that it makes possible working longer hours, and, if necessary, at night. Some interesting results were obtained, also, on the problem of overhead costs. # Farm Facts and Fancies

BUBBLING QUERIES OF INFORMATION

**CURING FARM MEAT**  
Never put meat in cure before animal heat is out. The means of keeping meat from spoiling and from having poor flavor when cured are cleanliness and temperature.

Curing is carelessly done by many farmers of the present generation and the result is often poor quality and inferior meat from careless methods. Curing should begin after the meat has become cool and when it is perfectly fresh; this means in from 24 to 36 hours after killing.

Let the meat be in an excellent condition for curing. It should be clean, hard-worked barrels are not good for curing meat that have had barrels or syrup in them. Make the barrel as clean as possible and then soak it.

The meat should be water-soaked in a cool, clean, well-ventilated cellar or room if desirable for 24 to 36 hours before curing.

It should be perfectly free of dirt, lice and all insects.

Formula for Brine—The following brine formula is for each 100 lb. meat to be cured. Do not use any of the weights, but weigh them out as follows: 12 lb. common salt, 3 oz. of saltpeter, 2 gal. water.

Boil slowly for one hour and allow to cool thoroughly before using. In the ordinary case, three sides—pack the joints down closely in the curing vessel, and switch down with clean stones. Then pour the cool brine in, covering all the meat.

Formula for Dry Cure—Salt never cures hard meat. Use a flavor. This formula will preserve the meat much better and add much to its quality. Use for each 100 lb. meat the following: 8 lb. common salt, 2 lb. brown sugar, 2 oz. saltpeter, 4 oz. black pepper, 1 oz. red pepper.

Mix thoroughly and rub each piece of meat long and well and then pack in a clean bin, box, or barrel. After three or four days, unpack, reset rubbing in the dry cure mixture and pack down again. Dry-cured meat should cure for two days for every pound the pieces weigh. As an example, cure a 10 lb. ham 20 days. After cured, hang in smokehouse without venting. Brine-cured meat should be allowed four days for curing each pound of ham or shoulder and ten days for every pound of bacon; thus it will take 40 days in brine to cure a 10 lb. strip of bacon. With care, remove from pickling container, wash in lukewarm water and prepare to hang for smoking.

### TOWN DEVELOPMENT

It used to be frequently said in small cities that it is the business of a good citizen to mind his own business, keep out of debt and avoid breaking laws. It was commonly thought that if he did that, it was about all that could be expected of him, and he was conforming to the ideals of good citizenship.

But a community's development cannot be promoted in these times on any such limited basis. The fact that not many small town people still have this spirit, and expect to get along without doing anything particular to boost community movements, is one of the principal reasons why some towns do not get ahead faster.

Some must take hold and carry on the work of churches and fraternal societies. Some of the men with a special head for business need to work in some organization for the commercial and other needed development of the community. Some need to work in clubs for educational purposes, and for more interesting social activities. There is something that each one should do and we must all take hold to do something in these public lines, if we expect that at town is going to keep up with the game.

People should not act as if they were making a great sacrifice if they devote a little of their time to such purposes. We should love our home town so much, we should be so ambitious to see it go ahead, we should be so conscious of the gains that people who have initiative or ability or industry, should be willing to give some time each week to helping forward such causes.

### SPRINGTIME

Already there are signs of approaching spring, although actually it is not due to arrive until March 21. Spring is the season of rejuvenation, regeneration and radiant life. It is only to man that January represents the birth of a new year and the calendar is an artificial structure. With plant life and that of the lower animals the coming of spring is at once the birth of a new year and new life.

Humanity recognizes and speaks of a new year as from January 1 but nevertheless observes it from the first breath of spring. After the departure of the drear and stifling winter and with the coming of refreshing and magnetic spring there is new life and new hope created in the breasts of men and women. Spring brings great plans and high resolves which only winter can demolish or deter.

It is not sufficient to say that the homing instinct is convenient in the spring. It is natural and not to be gained by man or beast. Spring urges the bird to build its nest, the animal to burrow into its mother earth and man to plan his summer and winter, but man knows not asks why. Spring is the one, and only irresistible force.

### THE USELESS "GOOD CITIZEN"

There is a certain type of man in every community who poses as a good citizen. He breaks no laws, lives normally, pays his honest debts and is never tangled up with the law in any manner. But he lives of himself, by himself and for himself exclusively. When the call is issued for volunteers to put across a community movement and give a boost, he never answers. When calamity has befallen people in certain localities and charity flows to their rescue, he is never one of their number. When money is needed for a public enterprise his name is never on the list. When he sees some neighbor stuck in the mud he detours to avoid him.

In fact, if he stood on the shore and saw the ship of state sinking, he would never offer to throw out a line. And if all mankind was fashioned from this same kind of chap what would happen? There would be no churches, no hospitals for the sick, no institutions for the unfortunate, no progress. If you are about to become a useless "good citizen" read this editorial again.

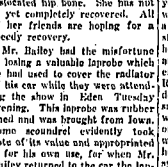

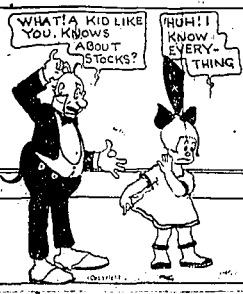

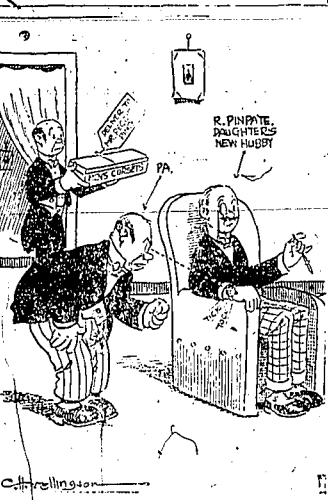
