Voters Favor Larger Levy for Schools

By a light vote of 191 to 42 taxpayers in Twin Falls Independent School District No. 1, Friday afternoon voters authorized a levy of seven mills, made necessary for the operation of local schools for the full nine months.

This authorization has been annually given by local voters since 1921, the law requiring approval by voters to raise more than the minimum levy.

The total vote cast was 236, falling taking place at Lincoln and Bickel school buildings. In detail the vote was as follows: At Lincoln school, For, 301; Against, 28.

Postpone Sentencing of "Blackie" Mixer After Confession of Murder

Slayer of Burley Taxicab Driver Assumes Sole Responsibility for Death of Terry Near-Burley Last December—Says He Pulled Trigger in Fit of Nervousness

Following a long confession by Walter "Blackie" Miller, that he had killed the driver of a Burley taxicab, driver, last December 27, 1927, which was held in the Burley district court, Judge A. Baker in district court at Burley Saturday was postponed until Monday, March 26, on the charge of first degree murder, his confession being introduced at the trial.

Miller pleaded guilty before Judge Baker in district court at Burley Thursday afternoon to the charge of first degree murder, his confession being introduced at the trial.

When Terry, the taxicab driver, came up missing the day following the murder, a search was instituted in the vicinity of Burley and the body was finally found near Idahoham.

Miller was questioned through the work of local police officers and authorities throughout the northwest were advised, with the result that he was arrested at Eugene, Oregon, in February, and brought back to Burley.

His confession, in full, follows: "I am 27 years of age and a single man. I am a cow-boy by trade. I had been in Salt Lake City, Utah, for a while unemployed, and then I came to the Buhl section, Idaho, approximately one week before Thanksgiving of 1927. I was in the Buhl section for a short time thereafter at the Perrine hotel at Twin Falls, Idaho. I voluntarily quit my job at Perrine hotel on December 26, 1927. to do, and it was my intention to hold him up and take his money somewhere between Burley and Idaho. Upon reaching a point approximately one mile north or northeast of Idaho on the highway, he appeared to be very fat and he stopped and we got out. Upon looking at his car to see what the cause was of his fatness, he then asked me while we were both standing in the highway in front of his car, if I really knew where he wanted to go, and said that he had been hauling me around all night and that I did not want to know where I was going to go. I had a .32 automatic pistol in my outside coat pocket on the right hand side. As he said the last words above stated, he was standing approximately with his back to me but more with his right side towards me. As he finished his statement I pointed the pistol towards him and told him, "Stick 'em up," at which he immediately complied and he instead of turning around but to the right towards me, which would have been the quicker way, he started to turn around to the left so as to face me. Just as he started to turn and when his back was approximately towards me, I pulled through my excitement I pulled the trigger and he dropped to the ground. I did not know just where the bullet had struck him, but he died instantly. I took his watch and approximately \$2.00 in silver which he had on him. I pulled him by the feet and pulled him out of the road on the right hand side the way we had been traveling. I then drove towards Burley approximately 100 feet, turned around in the highway and drove on to Burley. Some 3 or 4 miles east of Burley the road divides, one going straight on west towards Twin Falls, the other coming into Burley. I took the road going straight west towards Twin Falls, intending to drive the car to a point near Twin Falls, abandon it there and go on into Twin Falls and immediately leave Twin Falls for some other town. Upon reaching the point where the road on which I was driving intersected the highway running from Burley to Twin Falls, I became confused and instead of turning to the left on to the highway, I crossed the highway and went on to the west. After driving down this road approximately one mile from where it crosses the Twin Falls highway, the car was not properly working and I pulled out to one side of the road and stopped to see if I could determine the cause of the matter with it. It was unable to get it started again and immediately left it and walked back towards Burley. After walking a mile or more someone took me into a car and hailed me a mile and so and advised me to get out of the road. Whereupon I got out of the car and walked into Burley. Reaching Burley, I appeared to be about 12 or 13 miles on the night of December 27, 1927. I immediately went to a rooming house and registered myself under the name of Walter Miller. I registered there under the name of Walter Miller, a room and went immediately to bed, where I remained until the following morning. Upon getting up the following morning, I got some breakfast and immediately started towards Twin Falls afoot, but had only gone about one mile west of Burley when someone driving towards Twin Falls offered me a ride and I rode with him some two or three miles, then got out and started on towards Twin Falls afoot and after walking approximately one mile west of the service station on the highway some three or four miles west of Burley, someone else came along with me and came definitely towards Twin Falls and invited me to ride with him which I did, and he hauled me to Twin Falls and I got out of his car near the Hotel. We arrived at Twin Falls about noon on December 28, 1927. I was cold and my shoes were wet. I immediately went to my room and went to bed where I remained practically all that afternoon and all night on December 28, 1927. Upon getting up at Twin Falls on the morning of December 29, 1927, I borrowed some money from a friend there and took the stage to Boise. In Boise I pawned the watch which I had taken off Mr. Terry and did not thereafter redeem it.

During March, tuberculosis and health associations of the United States, led by the National Tuberculosis Association, will conduct an intensive public campaign to emphasize the importance of the early diagnosis of tuberculosis.

The aim of the campaign is twofold, first to focus the attention of the public at large upon the danger signs of early tuberculosis and to urge them to go to their doctor for examination; and second, to stimulate renewed interest on the part of the medical profession in the recognition of early signs of tuberculosis.

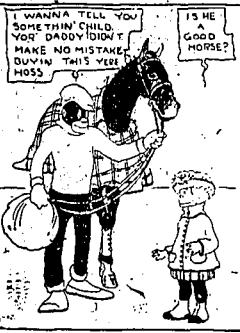
