THE COUNTY HOSPITAL

There is certain to be divergent opinions concerning the county hospital matter: whether it should be kept or sold; whether it should be operated or leased. No one has yet suggested abandoning it.

Here is an institution created by the county, and now owned and operated by the county for the public good. It costs money, certainly, but those who use it must be allowed to pay for services rendered, just the same as almost any other service that one gets from the county, the city, the state, the government.

There may be logical arguments in favor of the disposal of the hospital. Here are some in favor of the county keeping it.

The health of the people should come first. The expense of operating the institution is not unduly burdensome.

If it does not pay, the only way it can be made to pay is by increasing charges. If it were sold to private parties it would have to be made self-supporting and the only way this could be done would be through the method of exacting more charges from patients. These patients for the most part would be Twin Falls county residents. In other words, Twin Falls county people will go on paying the upkeep of the hospital, either through a small tax, or by direct charges.

This is one of the finest institutions Twin Falls county has. It is a wonderful idea and is performing wonderful service daily.

Perhaps it is not a moneymaker for the county, but neither is the jail, or the courthouse.

It is agreed that the bureau of weed control is a fine public service; why not health control, too?

We have a county agent to oversee crop certification work, to help fight plant disease and to assist in improving the quality of our livestock and poultry. Surely humans are deserving of similar consideration for a fee.

Of course there are many other reasons why the hospital should continue to be operated by the county.

It must be treated from a business and economic standpoint, but these should not transcend the humanitarian arguments.

It is not too early to mold public opinion on the question, for it appears that the taxpayers will be called upon to vote on the subject this fall.

EVENTUALLY, WHY NOT NOW?

The march of progress dictates that every important center keep abreast of the times in civic conveniences. No one has the assurance that the planes would stop here if there was a suitable airport near Twin Falls, but it is certain they cannot be expected to without proper handling facilities.

The air service is expanding rapidly. More and more it is coming into use as a means of rapid travel. Landburgh and his associates in the air have proved its permanency.

Twin Falls is proud that it is connected with the outside world by railroads, mail, telegraph, telephone, and radio. Of course it is just a matter of time until we have connection by airplane.

Nineteen twenty-eight should see definite steps taken for a useable airport for Twin Falls.

WRITES CONCERNING BOX BILL NOW BEFORE CONGRESS

Editor, Idaho Citizen. Dear Sir, We have two recent estimates of the United States present Mexican population. One is three million. The other is four million. Even the lower one is alarming. It is a reminder we ought to dwell near over another color problem that most students agree, remains still unsolved.

The article you ask, "Who will dig our ditches if immigration be restricted?" The Scientific American answers emphatically, "It declares one old time intelligent American on his big ditch digging machine, does the work of 400 men in 10 days. That truth, however, is highly intelligent. This efficiency enables us to maintain the best wage standard in the world. This is the only way that not only wage earners, but farmers, professional men, business men, etc."

The great menace to its continuance is the possible impairment of that very intelligence. The intelligent Mexican of white stock does not come here. The person who is an American, has an average intelligence quotient of only 70. Unfortunately he multiplies rapidly. In one time American family average 3 children and multiply from 2 to one American capable will be represented in the 5th generation by only 243 children. One Mexican child in the same generation will be represented by 16,000 children. Thus American culture will disappear. Greece and Rome both decayed through not grasping this biological law about such differential birth rates.

Therefore, over the three million people already here should be sufficient to stimulate the immediate passage by Congress of the Box Bill. This will place all Latin America under the quota.

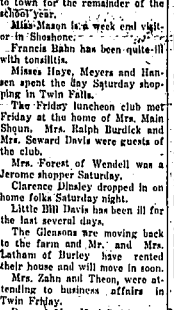

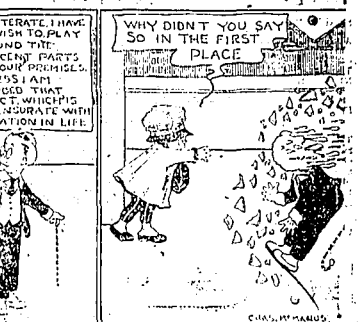
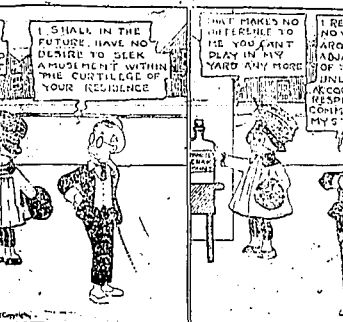
