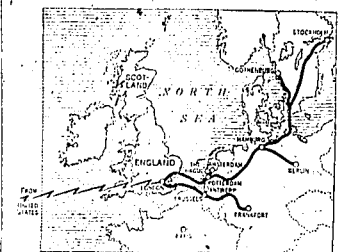
**FORMING BAND**

## Transatlantic Telephone Service Extended—Rates Greatly Reduced



Following the recent extension of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company's transatlantic telephone service to important cities on the continent of Europe, a reduction of 40% in minute rates has been made on all calls across the ocean. Under the new schedule, which affects a forty per cent cut in the basic rate between New York and London, it is now possible to talk a third of the way around the globe for \$21.25 a minute. This is over the direct established between Los Angeles and Stockholm, Sweden, bringing a distance of more than 8,000 miles.

For this sum the telephone subscriber has the use of approximately 2,500 miles of land wire, and two submarine cables totaling 15,000 miles in length, and the exclusive use of a radiophone circuit 2,500 miles long.

When service was opened between New York and London for the first three minutes, or 75¢ a minute, an transatlantic service was extended to the rest of the United States the usual toll rates were added to calls originating outside New York, thus giving all overseas traffic a handout. Additional charges were also made for calls to Belgium, Holland, Germany and Sweden, when service was opened recently to these countries. The increase in the number of Transatlantic calls after the reduced rates became effective indicates that a number of commercial and industrial organizations have accepted the radiophone as a satisfactory method of doing business overseas. While New York and London have made sixty per cent more calls during the past year, the service has also been used by forty-one states of the Union and nearly all sections of Great Britain.

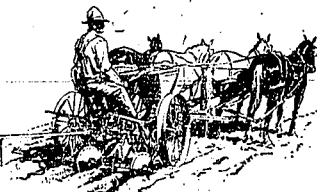

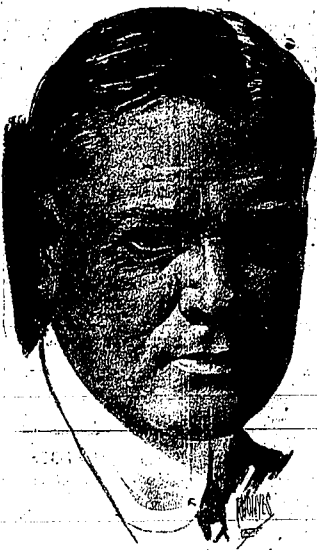

HERBERT HOOVER

This series will embrace all the leading candidates for nomination. Alfred B. Smith, Democrat, was pictured last week and this week Herbert Hoover, Republican, is delineated. Hereafter, on alternate weeks, both Democratic and Republican presidential possibilities will be represented in the series.

Herbert Hoover was born in Iowa in 1874, the son of a blacksmith. His mother was a teacher in a Quaker meeting house. He was orphaned at 9 and brought up by relatives in Oregon; he worked his way through Stanford University; he worked with a pick in the mines, and later was assistant in the office of a San Francisco engineer.

At 23 he was manager of a large British mine in Australia; at 25 Director General of the Imperial Mines of China. He was a chief figure in the defense of Tientsin in the Boxer Revolution, and during the next fifteen years headed vast mining enterprises in various quarters of the world.

He purchased an abandoned mine in Burma and gave this up at the outbreak of the war because to keep it he would have had to become a British citizen. So at the age of 40 his public career began.

He won recognition as Chairman of the Commission for Relief in Belgium. Upon America's entry into the war Hoover became the United States Food Administrator. After the war, he was appointed Chairman of the Supreme Economic Council of the Allies. He organized the American Relief Administration to save lives in Russia during 1920-21. Since 1921 Hoover has been Secretary of Commerce.

In addition to his work as a cabinet member, Hoover has a multitude of other tasks. He is Director of the Mississippi Flood Relief and various other national movements.

Hoover is six feet tall and of powerful physique. He makes a deep impression as a speaker. It is said that he is rather shy, very quiet and very modest. Though he is

an exceedingly busy man, it is not difficult for anyone to secure an audience with him.

HAS JUSTICE GONE STALE?

The verdict in the case of Harry F. Sinclair, charged with conspiracy to defraud the government in connection with the Teapot Dome lease, came as a great surprise to the country. The Supreme Court of the United States, by unanimous decision, had voided the lease as fraudulent and the United States Circuit Court of Appeals, also by unanimous decision held that the transaction between Sinclair and Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the Interior Department, was shot through with fraud and corruption.

The verdict of the District of Columbia Jury emphasizes the claim that a millionaire cannot be convicted on a charge of conspiracy. After more than four years of prosecution Doherty, Sinclair, and Fall, the three principals in this scandalous Teapot Dome affair are declared innocent by a jury of their peers. Albert B. Fall, former Secretary of the Interior faces trial on charges of conspiracy similar to those pressed against Mr. Sinclair but the case may now be discontinued.

Because justice seems to have gone stale and everybody is disgusted it is probable that all other cases, including the 189 oil leases of public oil lands in the Salt Creek field of Wyoming, adjoining Teapot Dome, granted principally to the Midwest Refining Co., of which Henry M. Blackmer was president will all be discontinued—not because of lack of evidence, but because of lack of interest where powerful interests are concerned.

VARIED VIEWS ON FARM RELIEF

A painstaking survey made by the New York Times seems to indicate that there is a lessened demand among the farmers of the country for the McNary-Haugen bill or similar farm relief legislation.

These reports are to the effect generally that the farmers are more prosperous and that many of them do not care much about Federal relief measures.

These reports certainly present an optimistic view when compared with that of B. F. Yonkeum of New York, who is urging the Democratic party to write a strong agricultural plank into its platform because, he contends, the prosperity of the nation is endangered by the condition of the farmer today. Farming must be restored to a prosperous condition, he says, or the nation as a whole will suffer.

According to the recent survey farmers of New England are opposed to the McNary-Haugen bill or similar legislation. Farmers of Ohio are divided on the matter, while farmers of Indiana and Illinois are for legislation.

Some demand for legislation is reported from Missouri and Arkansas. Kansas and Nebraska farmers seem to favor legislation. There is little interest in Florida, and some other states are divided in their opinion, including Louisiana and Texas.

The survey seems to indicate that the movement for farm relief legislation, which has absorbed Congress for several sessions, is constricting more and more into a sectional rather than a national demand.
