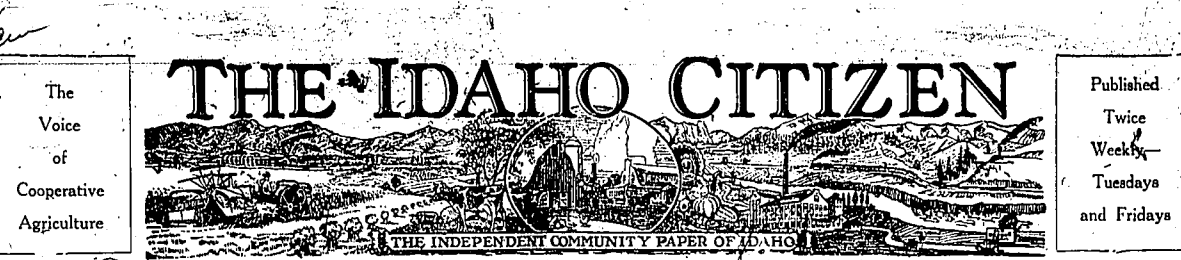

The matter of an appointment to fill the vacancy made by the death of the late United States Senator Gooding is provided by the state statutes which say:

Whoever occupies 462, U. S. Senator. Wherever any vacancy shall occur in the office of United States senator from the state of Idaho by death, resignation or otherwise, the governor shall have the power and it is hereby authorized and empowered to fill such vacancy, and the person so appointed shall hold his office until such time as a United States senator is regularly elected to fill such vacancy.

### SENATOR FRANK R. GOODING

All Idaho mourns the passing of United States Senator Frank R. Gooding, who came to America as an immigrant boy and lived to be governor of the great State of Idaho and later its fifth president.

It cannot be said that he has done much for the state—he had to. Senator Borah's cyclone has a very manly job to perform at Washington—he must look after the state's interests while the senator gives his attention to the remote matters of international relations, etc.

He died at what was perhaps the peak of career. Not being involved in a political campaign, he had not been the object of the customary political attacks for two years and had four years yet to serve of his present term.

The pity of it is that he could not live on, even after he had completed his term in congress. Here was one of Idaho's early pioneers, who had the courage, the vision, and the foresight to realize the future. Unlike many of his brother pioneers, he prospered, sought political preferment and attained it. Furthermore, he never deserted Idaho, and fate decided that he would die within her borders.

Denied many of the privileges of education he overcame such handicaps and has left an indelible imprint to mark his labors in life.

### POLITICAL RAMBLINGS

Just what Mr. Thomas has ever done to merit such honor, of course manipulating the G. O. P. spoils, would be welcome information to a long-suffering constituency.

Claud Stewart, who has long served the county well as assessor, will not seek the nomination this year, which should be cheering news to the Democrats, for they have just not been able to defeat that man and have not had a Bourbon in the assessor's office since long long ago.

Well, it's a free country and the season is still open. All of you folks who want to get your feet wet and satisfy any long pent-up ambitions to "run" for something, can now do so if you have the necessary mazuma for fitting fee!

### MEXICO'S GOOD WILL ENVOY

All hail to Mexico's own Lindbergh! Captain Equilo Carranza has shown the stuff of which he is made! He successfully completed a flight from Mexico City to Washington, where he was the guest of President Coolidge. This flight was a touching expression of good will and friendship from Mexico. It is said that Mexico is more stung over this accomplishment of peace than it has been over any other event in its history.

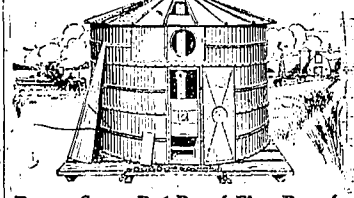

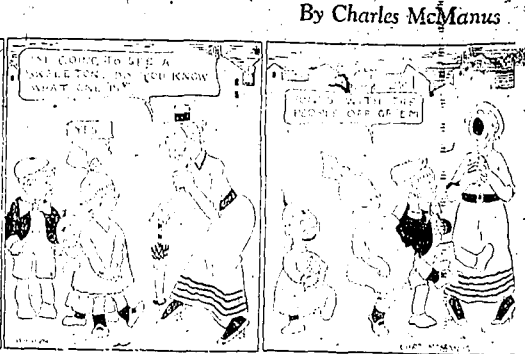

OMAHA, Neb.—The National Livestock and Meat board representing livestock producers, commission men, packers, and retailers, which was organized in 1922 to further the interests of the entire livestock and meat industry, has followed closely the program as drawn up at the very beginning by its organizers. Furthermore, the board has found it possible to develop a number of new outstanding lines of work due to the excellent assistance afforded it by all groups of the industry.

These facts were emphasized today by R. C. Pollock, general manager of the board, in his report to the directors assembled here for their annual meeting. The session opened yesterday morning and will be closed tonight with the election of officers.

Mr. Pollock sketched briefly and concisely the work of the board during the past fiscal year. His report indicated that the organization already has accomplished far more than had been expected in so short a time and that the future will bring further and wider progress in this effort on behalf of meat.

It was brought out that the board's program of education has meant reached thousands of the United States, high schools, colleges and universities with greater effect than ever before and that its research has revealed information of a revolutionary character in the field of food.

The first type of work touched upon by the general manager was that of special programs carried on in the interests of the beef, lamb, pork, and lamb industries.

The board, with the cooperation of various other agencies of the industry, has instrumental in bringing a quick end to an attempt started by the Boston Hotel association to boycott beef.

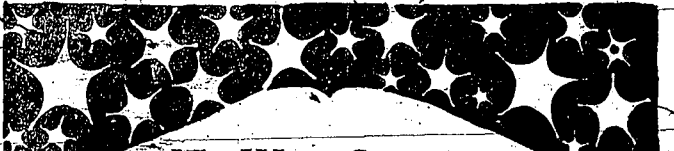
