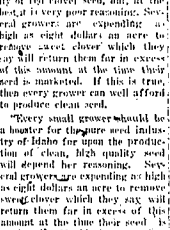
In these cases regarding sweet clover should take place before there is any change of seed. This is especially true of the yellow blossom variety, since it is much earlier than the white blossom. Where fields are badly infested and where erugging of the first growth of alfalfa would not be practical, close clipping is advised, which will have a tendency to somewhat reduce the load of sweet clover, which can then be easily regrown from the second growth of alfalfa.

Other inseparable weeds should also be given attention. Dodder, lambsquarters, curled dock and pigweed are among the worst.

It will take the constant attention of growers to keep their fields clean of these weeds but repeated results have shown that the price received for clean seed more than pays for cleaning.

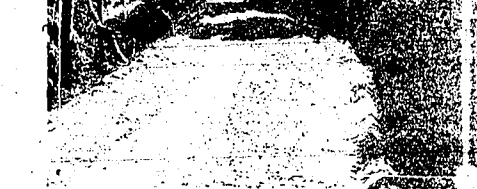

Idaho a Dairying State

FEW of its citizens realize the great strides the dairy industry has made in Idaho during the past few years. Comparatively unknown as a dairying state a half dozen years ago, Idaho is today fast taking its place as one of the leading milk producing states.

The state has today approximately 170,000 cows which produce an average of 4500 pounds of milk, making the total annual production 765,000,000 pounds, the larger percent of which goes to California markets.

The great majority of these 170,000 dairy cows are in Southern Idaho, the Snake River valley furnishing much of them. A plentiful climate and an abundance of cheap good feed, there should be twice as many cows in Southern Idaho as there are today, regardless of the almost phenomenal increase of the past few years. — Minidoka County News.

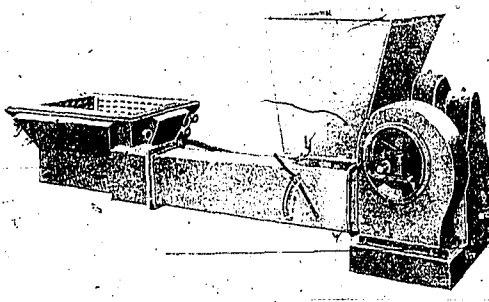

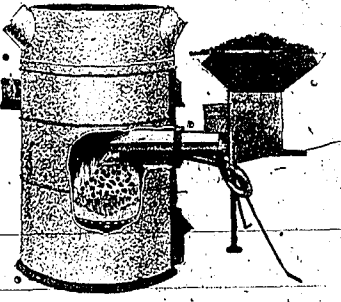
