

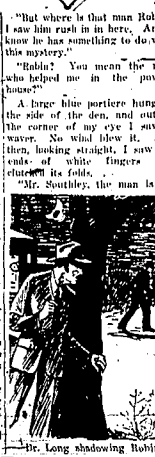

### LITTLE POLITICAL INTEREST

There is very little interest in politics in Twin Falls county; this despite the fact that the biennial county primaries is less than a month away and that a president is to be chosen this fall.

Some will dispute the statement that there is little interest in politics, but they have failed to analyze the situation.

To begin with there have been three political parties in the field in this county for the past decade; this year there are but two, chiefly on account of indifference and lack of interest.

With 15 elective county offices to be filled this year, the Democratic party has candidates nominated for but eight of these places. Of the eight there are contests for only two positions; that of sheriff and of commissioner from the second district.

While the Republicans have a complete ticket in the field more than half the offices are uncontested; that is, in eight instances out of 16 there is but a single candidate for each office.

Very little interest is being paid to registration despite the fact that the registration books close on the 28th day of this month, just a little over two weeks away.

It is freely predicted that the primary vote will be light and candidates will have to exert unusual effort to "get out the vote," because "the vote" is too busy with things other than elections.

The situation will be different this fall; there will be more interest in the greatest popular vote ever polled in the nation.

But right now in this community, interest is not running very high.

### THE FARM FLOCK

Diversified farming has provided more economic and profitable dividend of labor throughout the year on the farms than any other endeavor. In this livestock has played a leading part and especially the farm flock of sheep.

The small bands of sheep carried on farms can easily increase the net annual income by two or three dollars per acre without materially increasing the labor or a large additional expense. Their work as scavengers in cleaning the farm of weeds pays the labor. They, of course, need some shelter in winter and during lambing and to make them produce good meaty early maturing lambs for market a good pure-bred ram should be used.

It is nothing uncommon to travel through a farm section to see the choicest of ewes, the kind that will produce the best of commercial lambs, but they don't become a scrub ram is being used. This is further proved when farm lambs go on eastern markets and over 95 per cent sell from 50 cents to \$1.00 per hundred less than range lambs. The ram is truthfully half the lamp crop. A good pure-bred ram costs but a little more than a scrub and over its period of usefulness will many time repay the extra cost. For a long time the range man has realized the value of pure-bred rams and you can always see him at ram sales where purebred rams are sold. The small flock owners should also realize the value of good pure-bred rams.

### IDAHO'S BANKING

This is the first of a series of seven articles reviewed through the Pacific Slope News Agency dealing with the economic development of Idaho over the past few years.

Capital is fundamental anywhere. It is nowhere more important than in a rapidly growing region like Idaho. The changing position of the banks of this state during the last five years is therefore of special interest.

In 1923 the total deposits of state and national banks in Idaho were \$81,012,600; in 1924, \$81,703,900; in 1925, \$88,250,800; in 1926, \$90,352,900 and in 1927, \$97,294,900.

That is a gain of more than 20 per cent in five years. On the other side of the picture is the increasing ability of Idaho people to get on their own individual credit. Total loans of national and state banks in the state declined from \$7,495,000 in 1923 to \$4,810,700 in 1927—more than 15 per cent in five years.

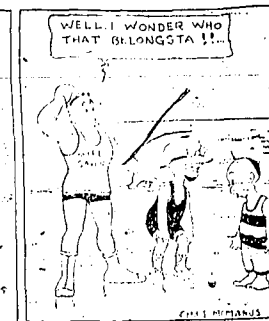
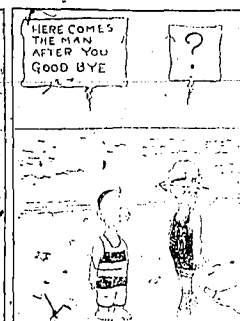
