Figure is Exclusive of Personal Property

Equalization Board Announces

Assessed valuation of the state of Idaho, exclusive of the personal property roll, was fixed by the board of equalization at \$464,219,128 on Sept. 3, 1928. The state auditor and secretary of the board, announced Saturday.

This figure compared with \$488,800,000 in 1927.

The personal property roll will amount to about \$27,000,000 and will bring the valuation of the state to more than \$490,000,000.

A total of \$2,834,423 in taxes will be raised from this property this year compared with \$2,842,191 last year. The amount to be collected will be apportioned among the counties on a basis of assessed valuation.

The compilation revealed a decrease in real property valuation of \$1,000,000, and a decrease in personal property of \$240,219,928 this year. This decrease was partly offset, in the valuation of public utilities.

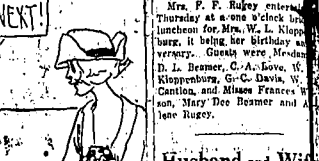

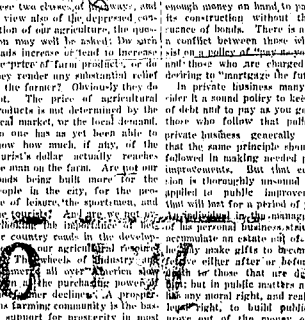

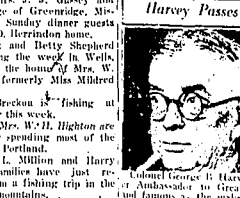

SIGNIFICANT ANNIVERSARY

Yesterday America paid tribute to Labor. Along with Christmas, Thanksgiving, day, Independence day and a very few other dates marking either the anniversary of important events or commemorating great institutions, Labor Day shares signal honor.

This was the forty-sixth anniversary of a holiday which originated in America, but which, in less than half a century has become International in scope. For that is the date of the annual celebration of Labor day and its advent recalls the little group of workers in New York city who on May 8, 1882, heard the suggestion which eventually resulted in the addition of this holiday to our national calendar.

Only the mechanics remain to be devised. I propose to substitute action for inaction and friendliness for hostility."
