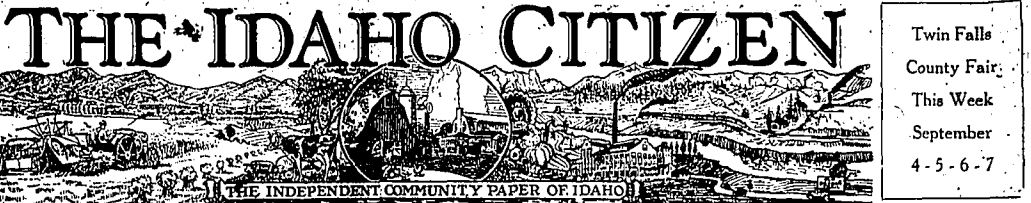

"The One-Legged Beaver Of The Shoshone Falls"

DURING the early spring of 1876 I built and placed my first boat, a skiff, in Snake river just above the falls. I had previously located the land on which the falls of the south side and was anxious to investigate and see what I could find on the north side. None of my acquaintances had a any knowledge of the north side of the river, and the latest maps described it as unexplored.

I pushed my boat into the water about where the present ferry lands on the south side, and went ashore at the present north side ferry landing. Here I found a small plateau of almost level land, several yards in diameter, that bordered the river on the south, and on the west lay a deep body of cold spring water which was held back by a beaver dam at the mouth of the stream.

On this plateau I found many of the signs and marks of beaver, muskrat, and other animals, numerous arrow heads, and piles of chips from obsidian, which showed that the Indians had used this place to make arrow heads. It was unusual to find this place in the track of a beaver dam, but the willow. They were too small to be used as lodges as they were only about four and a half or five feet high with room for just one person sitting position. In most of these wicker-up frames were lava rocks which showed signs of having been in the fire.

There was a way of crossing the body of water held by the beaver dam; but I found a dim trail that led around to the head of the stream and connected at this point with a trail leading to the top of the hill. It was a crude trail, but undoubtedly the Indians had been able to get the beaver down it as they were evidence that horses had used it of the flat.

Little was known by a government Indian interpreter that, according to an old Indian legend, the God of Beautiful Waters, with arrows, held forth at Shoshone Falls, and it was here that the medicine men endeavored to cure the sickness of the Indians. The medicine men performed magical acts for all ailments.

The government interpreter, who was a squawman and had lived for years among the Indians, also told me that during the winter of 1868 and '70, an epidemic of smallpox had broken out among the Indians. The medicine men used this beaver dam to cure the sickness of the Indians. The Indians came in great numbers to be treated.

During 1871 I made numerous trips to the north side, and it was on one of these trips that I had occasion to visit for the first time the Devil's Corral and the beautiful Bluk lakes. I found very little signs of Indians around the Devil's Corral, and was told by the "squaw man" that on an occasion of the beaver dam, the beaver dam was destroyed by the Indians. The region was infested by evil spirits.

At Blue Lake, however, there were many signs of Indians, and during my early experience in Snake river canyon beginning with 1876, and for several years later, very few Indians visited the canyon excepting at Blue Lake, which was a favorite resort of the Great Spirit and his people. They were able to gather great quantities of fresh-water clams (muscle shell). Piles of clam shells can still be found where the Indians held their "dances".

HOW TO GET OUT THE VOTE

Found: A good way to get out the vote! In at least two school elections held in this county Tuesday an unusually large vote was run up as the result of the spreading of what turned out to be false rumors.

What is of importance is that when the word was passed in these two school districts that some opposition was being made to the candidacies of the incumbents whose names had been filed for reelection, friends of the school got busy and began hauling in voters.

When the votes were counted; it was found at Twin Falls and at Filer; the so-called opposition ticket was a pure myth; the old board members had been reelected unanimously; and the net result was a large vote, increased interest in the matter of electing school trustees and community benefit in general.

This may not be an ideal way to stimulate interest on the part of voters in exercising the franchise but it proves that competition and rivalry are purifying factors in the body politic even if these factors are wholly imaginary.

One of those persons who is always figuring out things has recently declared that Americans buy seven pounds of candy to one book. We presume that this is intended as a bit of sarcasm upon American intellectuality.

AN AGE OF MACHINERY

Now the Department of Agriculture reports that this year the wheat of whole counties in Kansas will be handled by the new combine harvester. In Twin Falls county combines are rapidly coming into use.

In one operation, this machine moves across the field cutting and threshing the wheat.

In fifteen days of actual work, two men by the use of the combine can harvest from four to five hundred acres of grain. This new machine makes it possible to accomplish work in one-fourth the time needed formerly.

Truly the machine age is a boon to the farmers.

KEEP TAXES DOWN

The best advice that can be given to communities anxious to expand and develop industrially is keep taxes down.

High tax rates and industrial development do not go together. The community that is too fast in providing "improvements" by excessive taxation is foredoomed to restricted growth.

Industry today is going in a new and interesting direction—toward decentralization. Where once only centrally located cities had an opportunity to become industrially great, the country town has an important share in the new movement.

There are small towns today that tomorrow will be outstanding industrial centers. And chief among the advantages they must offer will be a low tax rate.

There are other towns which can offer many expensive attractions. Yet they will be passed over by industry, because they have made the mistake of spending money lavishly with resulting high tax rates.

Responsible taxes invite progress, development and prosperity. High taxes discourage the investor and builder.

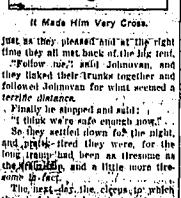

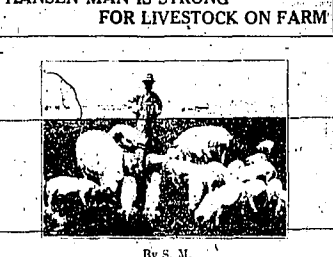
