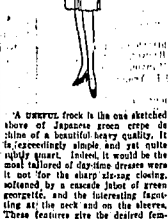

HARLEQUIN
2 cups blood orange juice
1/2 cup lemon juice
1 cup sugar
1 cup heavy cream
1/2 cup powdered sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup grain salt
2-3 cup nuts
Mix fruit juices and sugar, and put meats, cut in fine pieces, and pour over the first mixture until mold is full to overflowing. Cover with buttered paper, then with cover of mold; pack in ice and salt, using two parts ice to one part salt and stand three hours. Unmold and cut in slices for serving. Dried macaroni crumbs may be used in place of nut-meats.

LEMON JUNKET IN PRUNE
1 pkg. lemon junket
1/2 cups stewed prunes
1 pint milk
White rice
Sugar
Put the stewed prunes through a colander into a large bowl; add the milk and the white rice and mix well with wire whisk 10 minutes. Fill salt dessert glass half full. Spoon the junket powder in the jelly mold; warm milk and pour carefully into glass, holding a spoon flat over the whip to catch the milk as it is poured in. This careful pouring will keep the whip from floating. Let set in warm room until firm. Chill a little on top over top.

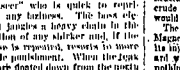

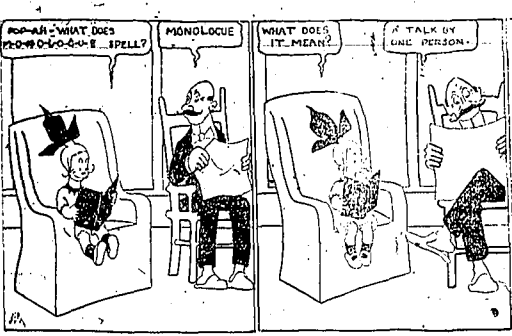

Despite the loss of many fish as a result of the necessary draining of Magic reservoir early in September to repair the control tower at the dam, fishing is said to be still good there. Opening of the trap gates and the release of the water at a slower rate of speed contributed very beneficially to saving the fish to the fisherman in the big pool. These big openings will re-stock the reservoir within a comparatively short time. It is expected, so the sportsmen of south Idaho may still find plenty of diversion with hook and line.

Captain of the Magic Dam Canal company, the Twin Falls and game department, sportsmen's organizations and individuals of the north side territory above the dam to be a splendid thing in reducing the losses to the minimum and providing for the filling of the reservoir with fish, making it as good a fishing place as ever, and without the waste of so many of them as occurred four years ago.

Counties Band To Save Sheep

Sheepmen of Cassia and Minidoka counties organized a predatory animal control league last week to take advantage of the funds provided by the state for payment of bounties on predators. Idaho has a substantial appropriation lying idle because very few of the counties in the state have agreed to the medium of the predatory animal board.

Linden, Gooding and Jerome counties organized during the summer months. One county was one of the first organized, leaving Twin Falls county as the last to join in the movement. Twin Falls without means of securing bounties as the state has provided for.

Pets of predatory animals must have at least three feet and be delivered to the board with a bill of sale. The funds are raised by tax on the sheepmen. It was they who started the movement to prevent the great losses they have suffered from depredations by animals.

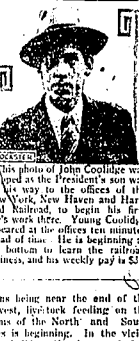

NORTHERN IDAHO WOULD PROTECT CHINA PHEASANTS

Sportsmen in northern Idaho are favoring the idea of increasing the cost of fish and game licenses throughout the state for the purpose of raising \$1000 with which to build additional pens for wintering the 1500 Chinese pheasants at the state game farm at Lapwai, southeast of Moscow.

Since it is not a good policy to winter the birds in the same pens as those in which breeding is carried on in the spring, it has become necessary to consider some means of providing additional quarters. The present pens are here of vegetation and the birds are fighting, creating a danger of losing some of them. Increased license fees is considered the fairest way of raising the funds, since it would distribute the cost equal-
