Raft River Wants Cheap Water Power

A survey is being carried on in the Raft River valley concerning the feasibility of pumping water from underground sources for the irrigation of approximately 30,000 acres of new virgin land in that territory. Harold T. Stearns of the government reclamation department has been authorized to bring up the valley with a party of men on this project.

The movement is being pushed by settlers of the valley. It is contended that if the government grants to the Idaho Power company a portion of the surplus water power generated at American Falls reservoir, an economical water supply for the settlers will not be lacking. It is also contended that the government should have serious problems do not have cheap water power and that the government has appropriated plentiful electric power and the colonization projects are settled.

The surplus power to be generated at the proposed American Falls dam is estimated to be in excess of 100,000 kilowatts. It is contended that the necessary and natural means of bringing Raft River valley's 30,000 acres under cultivation. Since the government has appropriated \$1,200,000 for this purpose, and the money lying unused because of the government's estimate that the plant cannot be built until the surplus water power has been found, settlers in that section stand to profit very much.
